NEVER FORGET

On Patriot Day, the Seneca Valley Junior Reserve Officers' Training Corps (JROTC) honored the memories of the lives lost on Sept. 11, 2001, and of every hero who gave their life since that day to protect our safety and freedom. The annual commemorative event recognized the innocent men, women and children who lost their lives on an airplane, at the World Trade Center, at the Pentagon, in Somerset County and on the streets of New York.

JROTC Cadets also commended the civil servants, firefighters, police officers and military personnel who dedicated and lost their lives serving the American people in a time of crisis.









Seneca Valley students reflected and honored Patriot Day by connecting lessons and various activities in tribute to 9/11.

At Rowan Elementary School, students participated in a 9/11 memorial flag ceremony and presented "The Pledge of Allegiance." Second grade students in Ms. Angela Cardillo's class practiced oral presentation skills and celebrated American patriotism by reciting passages from the book, "My Favorite Flag," to parents and visitors.

Ryan Gloyer Middle School (RGMS) students honored the day with six moments of silence at the times marking key moments of 9/11. The observances reflect the official 9/11 anniversary commemoration ceremony held at the World Trade Center for victims' families.

Today and every day we are grateful for our military service personnel, past and present, and the families who support them. It was our honor to recognize these outstanding individuals for






























A GOOD DAY, THE SV3 WAY!

staff and parents to ensure that school is a place where every student feels valued, supported and empowered to reach their full potential."


Ms. Parker replaces Dr. Jenay Sharp Leach who left the District at the end of the 2022-23 school year. ■








'FINDING NEMO JR.'

FALL SPORTS UPDATES

CROSS-COUNTRY - Boys and Girls (Head Coach: Steve Strelick)

Raider cross-country opened their season at the annual Red, White & Blue Invitational on September 9. In the boys varsity race, junior Max Smith finished 12th out of 243 runners, and senior Ethan Barnett finished 30th. As a team, Seneca Valley finished sixth out of 32 teams. In the opening two Section meets, the boys defeated Pine-Richland 24-34 but fell to Butler 29-26. In the girls varsity race at the Red, White & Blue Invitational, senior Samantha Moury finished 36th out of 234 runners, and junior Sydney Heltzell finished 44th.





As a team, the Raiders finished 16th out of 32 teams. In Section meets against Butler and Pine-Richland, the girls team swept results, defeating Butler 27-28, and Pine-Richland 20-41.

FOOTBALL (Head Coach Ron Butschle)

A noticeably young Raider football squad has opened the season with four difficult losses. Following the loss of 28 graduating seniors last year, this year's squad features many starters seeing varsity action for the first time in their careers. The Raiders have a key 6A matchup with Mt. Lebanon, which will go a long way in determining post-season playoff standings.

GOLF – Boys (Head Coach Dean Leventopoulos)

The boys varsity golf team opened their season with a second-place finish at the Sewickley invite. The team is currently 5–6 in match play with two remaining matches and the SV Invitational remaining before the WPIAL individual postseason competition begins.

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




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GOLF - Girls (Head Coach Brian Pesavento)

Under first-year head coach Brian Pesavento, Raider girls varsity golf is currently 10-2 overall and sitting in second place in section play with a 7-2 mark. In addition to their outstanding matchplay record, the team recently won their own Climb the Ridge Invitational. Lihini Ranaweera took top honors with a 71, and Madison Sharek finished third overall with a 76 to post the



team to a second consecutive Climb the Ridge tournament title. Like their male counterparts, the Raiders have two remaining matches left, and their WPIAL team championship fate rests on those results. They, too, will begin WPIAL individual postseason competition at the end of September.

SOCCER - Boys (Head Coach George Williams)

Once again, Raider boys soccer is off to an undefeated start, sitting at 8-0 and tied for first in section standings. The boys are currently ranked No. 1 in the WPIAL and No. 3 in the state. The United Soccer Coaches Association currently has Seneca Valley ranked 10th nationally. What is becoming a customary start to their season, the Raiders won the annual Intersection Kickoff Tournament and are 6-0 in section play. They have scored 36 goals on the season, with only six against.



SOCCER – Girls (Head Coach Mark Perry)

Raider girls soccer is off to a fantastic start, scoring 39 goals while only giving up three





in their 7-0 start. The girls are tied for first in section play and, despite this impressive start, are currently ranked fourth in the WPIAL. Senior goalkeeper Mia Humphreys posted four shutouts in the first seven games. Senior Ayla Ward and sophomore Ashlee Libby lead a potent front-line attack.

TENNIS (Head Coach Eric Grove)

Raider girls varsity tennis is currently 6-4 overall and 3-2 in section play. At the time of this writing, the Raiders are tied for third place in section play and only the top four teams qualify for the WPIAL team championships. Senior Kylie Staudt is having a fabulous season, having recently qualified for the WPIAL individual championships based on her fourth-place finish at the sectional tournament. Kylie is the first representative from SV in 15 years to compete in the girls WPIAL individual tournament.



VOLLEYBALL (Head Coach Brett Poirier)

After a loss in the Canon-Mac tournament semifinals to start the season, Raider girls varsity volleyball has not lost a match. Currently, the team is undefeated in match play with a 5-0 record, and, in mid-September, the team traveled to Westminster, Maryland, for a tournament where they went 10-0 and brought home the trophy. The Raiders are currently tied for first place in their section and the Western PA Volleyball Coaches Association has them ranked No.2.



- The PIAA mandates the CIPPE Section 6 form as the only permissible form for doctor's signature.
- All required paperwork for 2023-24 athletic participation is available on Parent Portal or Athletics website. Paperwork includes PIAA CIPPE Sections 1, 2, 5, & 6 and Drug Test Consent Form.
- IF a student played in a fall sport, the only paperwork needed is PIAA CIPPE Section 7 and, if applicable, PIAA CIPPE Section 8 these forms can be dated no earlier than Oct. 6, 2023.
- All student-athletes must register in the Parent Portal under "Sports Registration" before the start of each season.
- Tryouts are <u>mandatory</u>. Student-athletes are expected to attend every tryout session.

BECOME A GOLD CARD MEMBER

Seneca Valley residents 62 years of age or older are invited to apply to become a member of the Seneca Valley School District Gold Card Club. Membership entitles card holders to attend home athletic events, music, dramatic and other school productions.*

Athletic schedules and District events are listed via the athletic/activities calendar on the website.

Membership is free and proof of residency is required at the time of application. Acceptable proof of residency includes: a copy of a valid PA driver's license or identification card with a Seneca Valley School District community address, lease, or utility bill (name of the application must match the name on the license/identification). A Gold Card application can be made by mail and must include a copy of proof of residency.

To use a Seneca Valley Gold Card:

- You must carry your card with you and present it to admissions personnel when you wish to use it.
- Remember that use at some fine art performances, including the SV All-School Musical, require reserved seating, so call ahead to check or confirm your reservation.

Alex Karika, SV '12, is a pilot for the U.S. Navy and a recent Hall of Fame inductee for her participation in volleyball and basketball. She was recruited to play volleyball at the U.S. Naval Academy. We asked her to catch us up on what she is doing and how Seneca Valley influenced her life and career.

Q: Catch us up. Tell us what you're doing today:

A: I am a naval aviator (pilot). I fly helicopters, specifically the MH-60S (the Navy's version of the Army Blackhawk). I am currently stationed at Naval Air Station (NAS) North Island in San Diego, California, and my squadron is called Helicopter Sea Combat Weapons School Pacific. My current role is a Weapons and Tactics Officer (WTI). I help instruct and evaluate fleet pilots in all MH-60S mission sets and advanced helicopter tactics.

Q: Please share with us some information about your family.

A: My parents now live in Charleston, South Carolina, and my sister lives in Philadelphia. They continue to support me every day, and I am so grateful and thankful for them.

Q: What might (someone) be surprised to know about you?

A: I have an orange kitten named Theodore who is the exact orange cat stereotype. I love him dearly.

Q: How did Seneca Valley help you become the person you are today, both personally and professionally?

A: Seneca Valley taught me many lessons that have stayed with me throughout my life. I was a varsity athlete my entire time at Seneca Valley, and that contributed to many of the life lessons I learned. A few that stick out to me are time management, discipline, communication and perseverance. Balancing both academics and athletics can be challenging, but finding a healthy way to do both is truly a blessing.

Q: What do you think makes Seneca Valley such a special place to learn and grow?





A: I think Seneca Valley does a great job of providing a wonderful atmosphere for learning and growing. There are so many different opportunities for students to get involved in extracurriculars. And, of course, the school spirit can't be beat.

Q: Who was your favorite teacher/coach/ SV staff member?

A: I had too many amazing staff members to just list one. I am very grateful for all my coaches and teachers. They truly helped me in many ways. Whether it was explaining a math problem differently so it made sense to my brain or teaching me a new skill on the court and helping me perfect it, they were always there and willing to put in extra time where needed.

HOW DO I PROTECT MY YOUNG CHILD FROM CYBERBULLYING?



- Have clear rules about interacting online.
- Talk about which private information should not be shared. This includes full name, date of birth, gender, home address, school name and family members' names.
- Set limits and supervise online activities closely while still supporting your child as they become more independent.
- Choose high-quality, age-appropriate entertainment. At their
 age, it isn't appropriate to watch anything that models negative
 behavior without lessons or consequences. Encourage your kids
 to respect different experiences and identities by watching and
 playing diverse movies, shows, games and apps.

You can also help them learn how to recognize and respond to cyberbullying:

- Explain to your kids what cyberbullying is. It's repeated and unwanted mean or hurtful words or behavior that happens online.
- Practice respectful communication and boundaries (like "don't be mean to others"). Also teach them to be kind and compassionate.
 These skills will come in handy both on- and offline.




- Let them know that supporting a friend who is being bullied can make a big difference.
 - If they think they're being bullied, your kids should follow the steps of STOP:
 - STOP using the device.
- TELL an adult who you trust what happened.
- Get the OK from an adult before going back on the app or website where the bullying happened.
- PAUSE to think about how you feel. After talking to an adult, would it be helpful to talk to the person who was being mean?
