Gators break 40 in lopsided Homecoming victory

In the first quarter, the two teams fought back and forth to gain possession of the ball during the start of the game. The Eagles however quickly scored10 points against the Gators by completing a touchdown and successfully kicking the extra point.

Only 20 seconds after the Eagles scored a touchdown, Quarterback Cooper Babin turned the game around and ran in a 27 yard touchdown through the middle. Jace Fierro then kicked the ball into the endzone, leaving the score at 7-10. The two teams continued to run the ball until the end of the quarter.

with the Eagles kicking a field goal, putting the Eagles further in the lead, 7-13.. However, Cooper Babin passed the ball to wide receiver Timothy Johnson, who ran in an 11



yard touchdown for the Gators putting the score at 14-13, allowing the Gators to be in the lead.

The Eagles continued to pass the ball in an attempt to score. However, defense backer Caleb Ricks intercepted their pass, leaving the ball in the Gators' possession. In regards to this, Ricks said, "Don't count on the next man to do your job, you need to do your job. We just have to play the 48 minutes and pull off the win."

Shortly after this interception, Timothy Johnson achieved another seven yard touchdown, allowing the Gators to continue leading with the score of 21-13 for the end of the quarter. Johnson expresses his happiness about how the game went and felt that this game will be memorable for him. He says, "I'm glad to see all of my younger teammates happy for me and especially Coach Babin."

Third quarter began with the Gators running the ball towards the endzone. Wide receiver Timothy Johnson managed to score his third touchdown of the night, resulting in the score being 28-13. However, a minute later the Eagles managed to run in a touchdown, making the gap tighter with 28-20. 
Students who participate in or have joined this organization find that it teaches them many life

The streets were filled with several fans walking back and forth from the Superdome and along the main streets of NOLA. Some dangerous streets, such as Bourbon Street were filled with large groups of fans gathering around to sing Swift's songs. Hotels and places to stay were very limited around the whole city of NOLA for all

three nights of the show since the hotels had been booked to full capacities months before.

Over the three days, Swift performed 44 songs, rotating the two songs she performs differently during the acoustic section each night with multiple costume

changes throughout the show. To open up the Eras Tour each night, Swift's opener, Gracie Abrams performed a 40-minute set of her latest hits and songs from her previous albums while waiting for Swift to take the stage. Swift also brought out Sabrina Carpenter as a special guest on night two to perform a duet of her hit songs, "Espresso" and "Please Please

each night for three and a half hours, lasting until near midnight. For each show day, the Smoothie King Center and Champions Square sold merchandise for the concert. This kept the audience entertained during the long wait lines for hours leading up to the show. The Eras Tour brought over 500 million dollars in economic revenue for the city of New Orleans from this weekend. Taylor Swift also donated to Louisiana food banks, providing 75,000 meals for the hungry.



The Beginnings of Halloween

In the modern sense,
Halloween is a holiday celebrated
across the world, where people dress
in costumes, children walk door to
door asking for candy, and the
mysterious and macabre is celebrated.
This holiday's origins can be traced
back to the Celtic festival of Samhain
(pronounced sow-in), celebrated the
night of October 31. Wearing
costumes and acknowledging the dead
are common Halloween traditions
likely stemming the Samhain festival.

The Celts were

The Celts were Indo-European peoples that existed roughly two thousand years ago in what is now Ireland, Northern France, and The U.K. The Celtic New Year started November 1 and was associated with human death, resulting from the end of crop harvest and the

beginning of a dark and cold winter. The Samhain festival was celebrated the night before the Celtic New Year and was seen as a time when the living could interact with the spirits of the dead.

Celtic priests known as Druids would build large bonfires where people would gather crops and animals as sacrifices to their deities. One example of a modern Halloween tradition that can be traced back to this event is the wearing of costumes. The Celts wore costumes consisting of animal skins and animal heads while they attempted to foretell each other's futures.

After the Roman Empire gained control over a majority of Celtic territory, two Roman festivals incorporated ideas from the Celtic festival of Samhain. Feralia was a festival in late October to

commemorate the dead and celebrate the goddess of fruit and trees, Pomona. It is believed that the tradition of bobbing for apples on Halloween came from this festival. All Saints' Day was a catholic feast on November 1 to honor all Christian martyrs and saints. All Souls' Day was a celebration held on November 2 combining ideas of All Saints' Day and Samhain. Much like Samhain, All Souls' Day consisted of bonfires, and parades of people in costumes of saints, devils and angels. All Saint's Day was also known as All-hallows or All-hallowmas. This originates from the Middle English word Alholowmesse, meaning All Saint's Day. The night before All Saint's Day and the traditional night of the Samhain celebration developed the name, All-Hallows Eve, eventually evolving into the name Halloween.

Election Day, on Tuesday, November 5, is the last day that United States citizens can vote in the 2024 Presidential election.

With Election day around the corner, many young, eligible U.S. citizens find out too late that they

cannot cast their vote because they forgot to register.

This is why it is important for STA students who wish to have a say in their country's democracy to know how to register. Some people think that it is difficult to register, but it's actually a simple five minute process.

If a student is 17 years or older, they can register to vote. Students can visit Louisiana Online Voter

Registration and fill out the information. Some of the information you need may require help from a parent or guardian.

When you register, you can choose to register with a particular party which would allow you to vote in the primary election too, which determines the candidate which will run in the general election. You can also choose not to associate with any party.

Unfortunately, if a student registers to vote from this point on, they will not be able to vote in the 2024 Presidential election. In Louisiana, you must register 30 days in advance to be eligible to vote. The good news is that once you register to vote in the U.S., you never have to do it again, so you will be setting yourself up for every future election.

In the beginning of every school year, the Registrar visits STA to help students, who are 17 and older, register to vote.

Students can find out their polling place by visiting the same website, clicking on the "Polling Locations & Changes" and clicking "Voter Portal", and filling in the information accordingly.
