DEAR COYOTES: A MESSAGE FROM MS. ADRIANNE

Greetings, families and friends!

While the weather doesn't seem to agree with me, we are nearly in November, and slowly but surely winding down the Fall Semester curriculum.

The Fall Semester curriculum is built around our Goal Projects for students in ELA and Math. When we met with parents earlier this month, our objective was to share data with you about student baselines from August–September— as in, what do we know based on early assessments, and where do we want to go by December. In December, you'll receive a report card via email which will include student data in Mobius, Math Groups, Sophie, Writing, and Reading. It will also have student scores from the middle–of–the–year iReady and/or iStation assessments. Additionally, this report card will contextualize student outcomes on their goal projects: what were their goals, what did they do to reach them, and to what extent did they reach those goals?

In some cases, we may schedule a conference with you to look at intervention data and student needs, and this may be under the umbrella of the Student Assistance Team (SAT). Those SAT/ intervention meetings will be scheduled as applicable in December. You are always invited to reach out to teachers for a conference, too.

As we head into Art and Poetry season, our classrooms will shift some attention to producing fine art and writing for the big Art and Poetry night on December 19th. This event will be from 5pm-7pm this year. We can't wait to see everyone there.


HIGH SCHOOL MEET AND GREET SUCCESS

Thank you to everyone who attended our High School Meet and Greet. We had 11 High Schools in attendance, and a significant turn out from our Middle School cohort.

One thing that stuck out to me as I talked to our High School guests was how fondly these High School administrators speak of Coyote Willow students who have entered their programs. They note that our kids know HOW to learn, how to interact, and how to engage in lessons.

One of the High School administrators said that despite the fact that their program offers 6th-8th grade, they tell parents that they should consider CWFS for Middle School, rather than their program for Middle School. This administrator said "you all prepare them for High School better than most anyone could... even us."

We know CWFS families have many options for Middle School-- many great ones! But we are extremely proud of our Middle School cohort and our work in readying kids for High School and Beyond!

The K-2 Team put together an incredible rotation of centers for the K-2 classes on Freaky Friday.


















COUNSELOR'S CORNER WITH MRS. V

October 2024 Counselor's Corner With Mrs. V.

Bullying -Prevention and Upstander Strategies K-8

Mindset focus is on resect, support and inclusion of self and others. We are working on the social skill of making ethical decisions and feeling a sense of social responsibility. In 2014, the Centers for Disease Control and Department of Education released the first federal definition of bulling. The definition includes three core elements: Unwanted aggressive behavior, observed or perceived power imbalance, and repetition or high likelihood of repetition of bullying behaviors.

October is National Bullying Awareness Month.

There are a multitude of resources available to families and schools. www.stopbullying.gov is the gold standard when searching for information and tools to start the conversation about bullying. http://www.pacer.org/bullying/ also has a variety of resources for families and online activities for kids of all ages.

Table Talk Tips for Families:

Start early. Parent/child talks are essential. Teach kids to respect others before they start school. Teach your children how to be assertive. Encourage your children to express their feelings clearly. Stop bullying when you see it.

Listen and support children who speak up. Telling an adult about bullying is not easy for children. Tell your children to take action when they see bullying behavior. Encourage them to speak up. Be an UPSTANDER, not a bystander.

If your child has a social, emotional or specific family need, please do not hesitate to reach out to your child's teacher so I can visit with them, or contact me directly. I am here to help your child reach their full potential including a healthy balance of mental, social/emotional and physical well-being.
