It is called The Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps, also known as the JROTC. Forming this class wasn't done alone, but was done by many people who came together and made this happen. The JROTC class is one of the most important classes that makes Salmen great today. The knowledge from the classes' leaders and other students working together to form this strong class.

Sergeant Haywood Harrison is one of the teachers of the JROTC class. Mr. Harrison is a teacher at Salmen High School in his second year, he also did 5 years in the army, then retired. While in the military, he considered the bigger picture of what should happen after retirement. He wants to take his life experience and express it to next generations and make students better citizens and better leaders. Harrison feels that the JROTC class is not a boot camp, instead, it gives you the tools you may need in life. 
Thoughts on the First Quarter

In a World Where You Can Be Anything, Be Kind!





American Indian Heritage Month originated in 1990 after the U.S. Congress had approved it. The President at the time, George H.W. Bush had made it official by signing a joint decision officially declaring November as National American Indian Heritage Month. Originally, a holiday that honored American Indians first started as merely a day in 1915. Also, since the year 1916 when New York was the foundational state to officially recognize American Indian Day, therefore they have been an ongoing effort



to honor the significant contributions and accomplishments of Native Americans. When it came to 1976, in the celebration of the country's 200th anniversary, S.J. Res. 209 had given the president, Gerald Ford, the authority to declare October 10th-16th, 1976 as "Native American Awareness Week". Then when the following 10 years came, in 1986 Congress passed S.J. Res. 390, which requested the president to designate November 23rd-30th, 1987, as "American Indian Week." Later, these traditions were carried on by Congress in following years, designating one week during the autumn season as "Native American Indian Heritage Week." American Indian Heritage holidays have always been important in order to officially seal a day to honor the important roles of the American Indians. After all, they had helped with the foundation and expansion of the US. Undoubtedly, it is right that they received an entire month being set aside for their help and recognition.

Overall, this month is committed to increasing awareness about the barriers indigenous individuals had to experience throughout history and today, and the attempts they had made to overcome these obstacles. As of 2021, the United States has over 574 Tribes that have been officially recognized by the federal government. However, there are still many more that are fighting for acknowledgment. While a notable number of Native Americans still live on reservations, around

71 percent of them reside in cities and urban areas. To date, Native Americans make up about 2.5 percent of the total U.S. population.



Even though American Indians and Alaska Natives are part of the broader society, much of the history has been either forgotten or ignored. This is why American Indian Heritage Month is significant. This month could be a time to remember the indigenous people of America or to learn more about them. It's

important during November to honor not only the rich heritage left behind by indigenous history creators, but also to acknowledge those who still affect our society, guiding their communities, and affecting our culture in the present day.

The Day of the Dead, also known as Dia De Los Muertos, starts back in its early roots from the Aztec people who now thrive in Central Mexico. According to History.com, the Aztecs used skulls as a way to honor the dead before the celebrations started. The skulls that they used to this day are used as a key symbol in a tradition that has been going on for centuries to honor those who have passed. Dia De Los Muertos involves family and friends getting together to pay respects and to remember friends and family members who have died; making this holiday very emotional at times. The Day of the Dead mainly happens in



Mexico but is also celebrated in different places like Michoacán and Oaxaca. The holiday also occurs during the Christian period of Allhallowtide. Some argue that Indigenous Mexican or ancient Aztec influences account for the custom, which has become a way to remember those forebears of Mexican culture. The Day of the Dead is widely seen as having a festive characteristic.

In the past, and still today, people celebrate by building altars in their homes with Ofrendas that have their loved ones picture in a frame with a candle and some items they might have left behind. They'd light the candles and gather items the passed relatives enjoyed and fill the Ofrendas with them, decorated with Marigolds. The families tell old jokes about the dead and offer tamales, water, chiles, Pan De Muerto which is a "specific type of bread for the occasion" and various other treats to enjoy the celebration. In Mexico, families clean



the graves at cemeteries, preparing for the spirit to come. The Mexican holiday takes place on November 1st and 2nd. The holiday is also known for having pre-Hispanic roots and for being a blend of Indigenous traditions

and Catholicism, resulting in such a unique and rich cultural

celebration. Bands perform and people dance to please the visiting souls. Back then, Copal incense was used to lure in old spirits. They would also paint skulls that they'd mold with sugar and clay and write the names of their ancestors on the forehead. The altars include the "elements of life" food to be used as earth, water, "Papel Picado" for wind and a candle for fire. They also used colorful tissue paper that had cut out designs to decorate the town and the Ofrendas.

Overall, the Day of the Dead is a deeply cherished tradition that embodies the values of remembrance, togetherness, and cultural pride within the Hispanic communities. Its' significance symbolizes that it is a crucial part of the Hispanic heritage and a time-honored tradition that continues to be celebrated with passion and admiration.


