Attendance

Attendance is so important. We are monitoring attendance carefully this year. Research has shown that student who have good attendance do better in school than those who miss frequently. Students who miss more than 10% of the school year struggle because of missed instruction.

Our goal this year is to help families and students achieve good attendance. Chronic absenteeism is defined as students missing 10% or more of a school year. That means students can only miss 17 days or less a year!

Thank you for working with us to ensure your child has good attendance!

Instructional Service Council News

ISC is a group of KCS administrators and staff, Board of Education members and community members that includes parents and business professionals. The council meets several times each year to discuss and give feedback about the curriculum and instructional practices in Kettering City Schools. Here are some highlights from our first meeting.

Safety & Wellness

- The district has a safety and threat assessment team at every building.
- This year we are having Full Scale Safety Exercises at each building. Schools will be evacuated and walk to reunification site. The purpose of this drill is to practice what student's do if evacuation is necessary and and what the roles are within staff and administrative teams.
- Website Safety Updates are on ketteringschools.org. Pop-ups will be used for very important notifications (new safety features built into the webpage). SROs are also included on the school website photos, names, email addresses.
- Transportation "Zonar" software- Wayfinder used for pre-checks, and for route information with student photos on it. Wayfinder will show the route and students at each bus stop. This will help substitute bus drivers and ensure safety for staff and students. The system will keep track of where the bus is located for safety issues and even monitor speeds.

Quality Learning Environment

- 2023-2024 Report Card Rating System is 1-5 stars KCSD received a rating of 4.5 stars
- KCSD has consistently earned higher scores on the report card when compared to similar school districts. Thanks to amazing kids, staff, and supportive parents!
- There has been a gradual increase in overall student achievement. We do a little bit better every year!
- Increase in graduation rate for 2023-2024.
- Initiatives to continue our growth: work on improving the 14.9% chronic absenteeism (for any reason excused or unexcused); curriculums; instructional practices

Dyslexia Law Update and Science of Reading Staff PD

- Science of Reading Professional Development is required by the state. All staff including administrators will complete required training by June 30, 2025, many have already completed.
- Dyslexia Tier I Screener
- Screened grades 1-3 last year (2023-2024)
- Only grade 1 students are screened this year (last year's KG)
- Screening is used to identify possible AT RISK dyslexic tendencies

Career Pathways

- KCS Career Navigation and Workforce Development position is funded by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation. Program fosters career awareness in elementary school, career exploration in middle school, and hands-on experiences in high school.
- District career focuses for each month changes, for example: September is Skilled Trades and Construction; November is Healthcare; December is IT
- Feedback was collected by students, parents, and businesses. Students shared a high percentage
 of engagement and relation to what they are learning in school and helped them get ideas about
 the future.

A HEALTH FLYER FOR PARENTS

When students miss too many days of school, they fall behind and struggle to keep up with their classmates. Whether the days missed are due to illness, truancy or for any other reason, the end result for the student is the same — learning time is lost. Children and adolescents will get sick at times and may need to stay at home, but we want to work with you to help minimize the number of days your student misses school.

Missed Days Add Up Quickly!

- Just a few missed days a month adds up to several school weeks missed in a year.
- Both excused and unexcused absences can make it more difficult for your child to keep up with other students, especially in math and reading.
- Kindergarten and first grade are critical for your child. Missing school during these early years makes it more difficult
 for children to learn in later years and they often have trouble reading by the end of third grade.

Work with Your Child and Your School

- As the parent, be strong with your child and don't let your child stay home when it is not necessary. This will help
 your child succeed. Acetaminophen and Ibuprofen can be given at school with a signed OTC form by parents.
- If your child has a chronic disease, make sure that the school staff is aware of the disease so the staff can assist
 your child if he or she becomes ill. Information about your child's chronic disease should be noted on the school
 emergency or health information card.
- For students with asthma: if your child has asthma, the school needs an Asthma Action Plan completed by his or her doctor that includes permission to carry an inhaler at school. Make sure that all supplies (inhaler, spacer, etc.) needed to manage your child's asthma are at the school.
- For students with diabetes: if your child has diabetes, the school needs a Diabetes Management Plan completed by
 his or her doctor. Make sure that all supplies (insulin, blood sugar meter, test strips) needed to manage your child's
 diabetes are at the school.
- Provide the school with a reliable phone number. Keep an open line of communication with school staff and teachers. The more the school knows about your child's health, the better prepared everyone will be to work together for your child.

Helpful Ideas:

- Make appointments with the doctor or dentist in the late afternoon so your child misses as little school as possible.
- If your child must miss school, make sure you get his or her homework assignments and follow up to see if the work is completed and turned in.
- Call the school as soon as you know your child will be absent and tell school staff why your child will be out and for how long. Contact the school nurse if your child will be absent for an extended period.
- Be prepared to get a doctor's note when requested by school personnel.
- If you need medical advice after business hours, most doctors' offices have answering services 24 hours a day to assist you.
- If your child has an emergency, call 911.
