



HHS 22-23 Student Expectations & Procedures

Here at Hahnville High School, we strive to continually embody integrity, growth, and pride in all we do. As a tiger family, we are committed to remaining **Fierce. Noble. Strong. Together!** As such, we believe in our HHS students' commitment to adhering to the following expectations:

- Student Expectation #1: Students are expected to embody professionalism in speech and appearance at all times.
- Student Expectation #2: Students are expected to practice responsible digital citizenship, including the use of technology at appropriate times.
- Student Expectation #3: Students are expected to be in-class at all times, except when provided with an approved hall pass.
- Student Expectation #4: Students are expected to be alert and actively engaged in learning.
- Student Expectation #5: Students are expected to exhibit self-discipline, maintain composure, and practice appropriate conflict resolution skills.

Please reference the specific procedures and guidance below as it pertains to our five student expectations:

22-23 HHS Dress Code

- The Hahnville High School student dress code is:
 - o Only khaki or navy blue pants, shorts, or skirts shall be worn
 - Shorts and skirts must be no shorter than 2 inches above the knee
 - o No jeans, leggings or athletic pants are allowed, unless specifically permitted.
 - The approved shirts include: white or purple collared shirts, Satellite Center shirts, HHS Student of the Month shirts, or the approved HHS uniform t-shirts (please see below).





- Other HHS-related shirts may be worn at specified days only (e.g. HHS School Spirit day, etc.).
- Due to safety concerns, shirts must remain tucked during the school day.
- Outerwear that does not zip or button all the way down the front must be solid purple, white, OR Hahnville-related.
 - Long-sleeve shirts do not constitute outerwear.
- Beginning the 22-23 school year, no hooded garments will be permitted.
 - Hats may be worn outside of school buildings during inclement weather.
 Hats worn indoors will be confiscated.
- Due to safety concerns, all shoes must have a hard sole, as well as a back. No Crocs/croc-like shoes, slides, house slippers, or flip-flops are allowed.





- If a student is not wearing an appropriate shirt, bottoms, or footwear, the illegal item will be confiscated and an appropriate item issued (if applicable). The confiscated item will be returned to the student at the end of the school day.
- Any student failing to comply by the stated guidelines will be sent to In-School Suspension. A parent will be called to assist in resolving the issue.

HHS School IDs

- Student IDs must be worn at all times around the neck using the approved lanyard.
- Students who arrive at school without their ID must go to the front office to receive an ID replacement sticker. The sticker must be worn throughout the day.
- If a student loses the replacement sticker, they will be issued a replacement ID and lanyard, and they will be charged \$5.
- After receiving 3 replacement ID stickers, the student will be issued a replacement ID and will be charged \$5.

Phones and Earbuds/Headphones

- Due to each student being provided an individual Chromebook for the completion of learning and relevant assignments, the need for cell phone use during class is mitigated.
 Cell phones are not to be used during instructional times.
- All students in possession of a cell phone will be required to turn it in at the beginning of each class to a designated storage area in the classroom. This area will be secured and monitored by the teacher, and will be out of student reach. Students will individually retrieve phones at the end of class.
- Cell phone use is only permitted during transitions between classes and at lunch. Use of cell phones in the hallways during instructional time is prohibited. If visible, items will be collected per the HHS cell phone and personal device policy.
- HHS will provide each teacher with a class set of earbuds to be used for instructional purposes only. The use of earbuds or headphones is not to occur at any point during the school day (even at lunch), unless specifically instructed by the teacher.

Hall Passes

- To maximize teaching and learning throughout the school day, it is important that all students remain in class.
 - If a student must leave a class for any reason, she/he must have an agenda pass or teacher-provided pass.
- Students are allotted 6 bathroom passes per quarter. These passes are located in the student agenda.
- Students are encouraged to use the bathroom between classes and during lunch. If a student runs out of passes for the quarter, the teacher will allow the student to go to the restroom; however, a morning detention will be issued.
 - Students with medical issues who require frequent bathroom use should turn in the appropriate documentation to the school nurse so that a nurse's pass can be issued.
- If the issue persists, a parent/guardian conference with administration and a counselor will be held to discuss the issue and possible solutions.
- Administrators will be circulating around campus and will be verifying hall passes. Students without a valid hall pass will be escorted back to class.





Searches

All members of the tiger family are expected to arrive at school with the appropriate
focus necessary to succeed. To ensure that distractions are minimized and the
safety of all maximized, students, student belongings, and student vehicles
parked on school campus may be subject to random searches.

Student Parking

- The signed "HHS Parking Permit" agreement that all students and parents submit prior to being issued a parking permit will be strictly enforced. Please review the agreement with your son or daughter as it relates to the expectations of student drivers.
- Students parking illegally on-campus will be booted. A parental conference will be required prior to removing the boot. Appropriate school consequences will be applied.

Vapes/Electronic Cigarettes

- Underage vape use continues to be a nationwide epidemic. Please encourage your son or daughter to engage in wise and appropriate decision-making
- By the beginning of the 22-23 school year, vape sensors will have been installed in HHS bathrooms.
- The use of vapes and electronic cigarettes on school grounds is strictly prohibited.
- 1st time offenders will be issued mandatory attendance in a vape education program.
 Parental involvement may be required. Appropriate school consequences (including assignment to ADAPT) will be issued.

SCPPS Student Code of Conduct & Violence Prevention Program

- The SCPPS Student Code of Conduct and Violence Prevention Program has been updated for the 22-23 school year. As a reminder, students are expected to engage in productive and healthy habits that are conducive to success. As such, our focus remains on teaching and learning; engaging in physical altercations and using tobacco-related products are strictly prohibited on school grounds.
- In addition to vape deterrent programs (e.g. video campaigns, presentations, and other educational events), students found to be in possession of a vape device while on school grounds will be subject to the following:
 - 1st Vape Offense
 - 3-day assignment to ADAPT & Vape Deterrent Education Intervention w/ Ochsner representative
 - 2nd Vape Offense
 - 6-day assignment to ADAPT & additional sessions w/ Ochsner representative
 - 3rd Vape Offense
 - 9-day assignment to ADAPT & vape education intervention with SCPPS
 Child Welfare & Attendance representatives.
- Students engaging in physical altercations (e.g. "fights") will be subject to the following:
 - 1st Offense
 - 5-day assignment to ADAPT & restorative practice sessions with SCPPS Child Welfare & Attendance representatives.
 - 2nd Offense





- 7-day assignment to ADAPT & restorative practice sessions with SCPPS Child Welfare & Attendance representatives.
- Referral to District Attorney/courts
- Filing of applicable charges

3rd Offense

- 9-day assignment to ADAPT & restorative practice sessions with SCPPS Child Welfare & Attendance representatives.
- Referral to District Attorney/courts
- Filing of applicable charges
- Please note that beginning with the 22-23 school year, these offenses are cumulative over the course of the student's high school enrollment, and parents/guardians must transport students to the ADAPT site at the start of each assignment. "Major" events, such as students not responding to adult intervention to end the physical aggression, or injury to school employee can result in an expulsion recommendation and assignment to long-term ADAPT pending hearing.
- Any student found to record or post video on social media of any physical or verbal altercations will be subject to a 3-day assignment to ADAPT.

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
