Summary of Findings

- 2. Is in grades 7-12 and did not maintain a 70 average in two or more subjects in the foundation curriculum during a semester in the preceding or current school year OR is not maintaining a 70 average in two or more foundation subjects in the current semester.
- 3. Did not perform satisfactorily on a state assessment instrument, and has not in the previous or current school year performed on that instrument or another appropriate instrument at a level equal to at least 110 percent of the level of satisfactory performance on that instrument.
- 4. Is in pre-kindergarten grade 3 and did not perform satisfactorily on a readiness test/assessment given during the current school year.
- 5. Is pregnant or is a parent.
- 6. Has been placed in an DAEP during the preceding or current school year.
- 7. Has been expelled during the preceding or current school year.
- 8. Is currently on parole, probation, deferred prosecution, or other conditional release.
- 9. Was previously reported through PEIMS to have dropped out of school.
- 10. Is a student of limited English proficiency.
- 11. Is in the custody or care of DPRS or has, during the current school year, been referred to DPRS.
- 12. Is homeless.
- 13. Resided in the preceding school year or resides in the current school year in a residential placement facility in a district. Such facilities include: a detention facility, substance abuse treatment facility, emergency shelter, psychiatric hospital, halfway house, cottage home operation, specialized childcare home, or general residential operation.
- 14. Has been incarcerated or has a parent or guardian who has been incarcerated within the lifetime of the student, in a penal institution.
