LADY CAV SOCCER "WON'T BE DEFINED" BY CONTROVERSIAL WEST SECTIONAL LOSS

In the TSSAA record books, the official score of the West Sectional 8 girls soccer match will read Brighton 1, Crockett County 0.

But perhaps an asterisk should be placed next to the Crockett "0" – to denote that the Lady Cavaliers did score, but the goal was disallowed by the game officials because of a controversial offsides call.

Photographic evidence accompanying this post shows no Crockett player was actually offsides, but the call was made and it will stand. Brighton – a quality team that played well and executed a solid game plan – will move on to the TSSAA State Tournament, while the Lady Cavs' historic season ends with an 11-6 record.

While the loss hurts, Coach Carli Branson says the final score is not what defined this 2024 team.

"This loss does not define us a team," she said. "Being at the Sectional defines us as a team. Brighton is a skilled team and I do not want to take anything away from their win and the heart to play the full 80 (minutes) as well. It's an accomplishment for their team and we wish them the best at State." What was called on the Lady Cav goal can be compared to what one can see in the photographic section of this post, where the reader can look at what cameras caught from two different angles.

But the focus now belongs to the spectacular growth and achievement produced by this gritty Lady Cavalier team, so ably coached by Branson, Joey Soriano, and Jennie Agee. The first Crockett girls soccer squad to ever make it to a Sectional match basically played the talented Lady Cardinals to a standstill, holding a team that had scored 15 goals in two Region 8-AA Tournament games to a single tally.

That single tally came on a late first-half breakaway by Brooke McClelland, who managed to outrace the Lady Cav defense and punch a wide-open shot past Crockett goalkeeper Amaria Walker - the first-year player who thwarted everything else that got near the net Saturday, making several impressive stops.

While the Lady Cavs mounted a couple of second-half threats, Brighton was able to neutralize them because of a distinct advantage in overall team speed. The Lady Cardinals got to a vast majority of the 50-50 balls first and controlled possession time well with crisp passes.

All in all, Crockett's girls should feel extremely good about what they accomplished in the 11-6 season (with three of those defeats coming to powerhouse South Gibson County). The Lady Cav program is on a definite upswing, as their runner-up finish in both the district and region tournaments demonstrate – and with several talented freshmen added next year from a stellar CCMS team, "up" is the likely direction it will take.

Branson's assessment of the season deserves to be quoted verbatim.

"Growth - that is the word chosen for this season," she said. "It has been a journey filled with challenges, triumphs, and, most importantly, growth. From the first whistle to the last, we have encountered hurdles that tested our resolve and moments that sparked our passion. There were times when the odds were against us, when fatigue set in, and when doubt crept into our minds.

"But through it all, one thing remained constant: our determination. We pushed yourselves and each other, showing what it truly means to be part of a team. It's not just about the goals we scored or the games won – it's about the character we developed along the way. Each practice and each match was an opportunity not only to improve our skills but to strengthen our bond as teammates. We supported one another, celebrated each other's successes, and lifted each other up during the tough moments. That is what defines us as a team.

"As we close out this chapter, I want the players to remember the lessons learned - the hard work, the discipline, and the unwavering spirit that brought us together. These qualities will serve them well, not just on the field but in all aspects of life. They have shown that with determination and teamwork, there is no limit to what they can achieve. I am proud to coach such a dedicated and passionate group of young athletes."

Defender Chayse Lewis described what it has been like for the seniors who will graduate in the spring.

"Six years ago I found the sport I love," she said. "Six years ago I started this long journey to where I ended today. Six years ago my life changed for the better. Soccer is not just a sport to me – it gave me lifelong friends and hundreds of bus rides singing and laughing with them. Soccer gave me memories that I will keep with me forever. I will forever be proud of all the accomplishments Lady Cavalier soccer made this year. I will forever be thankful for the opportunity God gave us this season."

Assistant referees placed on either sideline in opposite halves are in charge of flagging an offside infringement with the main referee then responsible for enforcing the decision. Note that Thornton is NOT closer to the goal line than the ball here. (Photo by Robin Waddey)
