MESSAGE FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT

Budget 2024-2025 (Next School Year)

As I mentioned in the March newsletter, Governor Hochul proposed the elimination of the Save Harmless in Foundation Aid for school districts for the 2024-25 school year. This proposal was not well received not only by our school district but by over 330 school districts who also face a proposed reduction in Foundation Aid. In addition, the Senate and Assembly presented their budget bills in which both houses have rejected the governor's



proposal to eliminate Save Harmless from the Foundation Aid formula. This is optimistic news for rural school districts. The state budget should be passed on or around April 1 and then we should know more definitely what our state aid will be.

We take pride in building a budget that will provide the best educational program for our students. Please know that when the Board of Education adopts the budget at the April 16 meeting, it will be a fiscally sound and responsible budget. Mark your calendars for the budget hearing on May 14 and then for the vote on May 21.

Last year, we learned that several of our community members did not vote for the school budget because they are not registered voters. You do not have to be a registered voter with the county to vote for our school budget. You can register with the school district directly to be able to vote only on the school budget each year by proving that you are a full-time resident in our district and over the age of 18. Please call Mrs. Boberg at 716-942-3100 ext. 4102 for more details on the verification process.

Facilities Improvement

The 2024-25 Capital Outlay Project includes masonry and stairwell work as well as more door replacements. The work for these improvements will occur this summer. It is important that we continually update and improve our facilities for the safety and security of our students and staff.

3-Year-old Program

The Healthy Kids Program, which is housed here in the district, has officially hired a director for the 3-year-old program and an extended before- and after-school program. This will be open to all West Valley community members as well as those from surrounding communities if space is available. SUMMER AND NEXT SCHOOL YEAR PLANNING

Weekend Backpack Program will not affect your family's eligibility for other food assistance programs (such as SNAP, WIC, or food pantry access).

ARE YOU INTERESTED IN RUNNING FOR THE BOARD OF EDUCATION?

Petitions to be a candidate for a board of education seat are available beginning March 19 in the district office from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., Monday through Friday, except holidays.

There is one (1) seat open for election to the Board of Education, a **Five-year term**, currently held by Tracy Chai (term expires on June 30, 2024). If elected to this seat your term will start July 1, 2024.

The petition requires signatures and residences of at least 25 qualified voters. The candidate's name and residence should be on the petition

Signed petitions must be filed with Carolyn Boberg, District Clerk, by 5:00 p.m. on April 22, 2024.

To qualify to be a board candidate you must meet the following criteria:

- A citizen of the United States,
- Eighteen (18) years of age or older,
- Able to read and write,
- A legal resident of the district for a continuous and uninterrupted period of at least one (1) year prior to the election,
- Cannot be an employee of the West Valley Central School District,
- The only member of his/her family (that is, cannot be a member of the same household) on the West Valley Central School District Board,
- May not simultaneously hold another incompatible public office, including, but not limited to Superintendent, clerk, tax collector, treasurer or librarian, or an employee of the Board. In union free and central school districts, however, a Board member may be appointed clerk of the board and of the district.
- Must not have been removed from a school district office within one (1) year preceding the date of appointment or election to the Board.

SCHOOL DISTRICT TAX CODE NUMBER

The New York State resident income tax returns (IT-200 and IT-201) require you to enter the name and code number of the public-school district where you were a resident as of December 31 for the tax year 2023. The school district name and code for entry on state income tax forms are:

<u>District Name</u>: West Valley Central School District District Code: 690

It is important to put this number on your tax return because it helps determine the amount of State Aid we receive for the school district.



PERSONAL REGISTRATION

Registration will be held in the district office on May 7 from 3:00-7:00 p.m. Please bring personal identification and proof of address with you to register. You may register for state, county, and school elections online at the Department of Motor Vehicles website. If you are interested on just school elections you can either call the District Clerk at 942-3100, ext. 4102 or come to Personal Registration on May 7.

If you are not registered, you may not cast a ballot. Please take the time to register; everyone's vote is important. If you are in doubt, call Carolyn Boberg, District Clerk at 942-3100 ext. 4102 to determine your status.

If you have voted in recent years your name will be on the list. To qualify to vote, you must be:

- 1. a citizen of the United States,
- 2. eighteen (18) years of age or older,
- 3. a resident within the district for a period of thirty (30) days preceding the next meeting at which he/she offers to vote,
- a college student whose legal residence is in the school district.
- on the Personal Registration of Voters list for West Valley Central School District at the Cattaraugus County Board of Elections.

ABSENTEE BALLOTS

West Valley Central School District is required by law to make absentee ballots available to qualified district voters for the May 21, 2024, Annual School Budget, purchase of a 21-Passenger Bus with 3 wheelchair capability, funded by the (Transportation Reserve Fund), and board member election. Call Carolyn Boberg, District Clerk at 942-3100 ext. 4102 for an application or questions.

A qualified district voter must request an application for absentee ballots in advance and select the reason they will not be able to appear in person on May 21.

- (a) are/or will be a patient in the hospital, or unable to appear personally at the polling place on such day because of illness or physical disability or,
- (b) duties, occupation, business, or studies will require him/her to be outside of the country/county or city of their residence on such day, or
- (c) on vacation outside the country/county or city of his residence on such day; or,
- (d) absent from their voting residence because detained in jail awaiting action by a grand jury or awaiting trial or is confined in prison after conviction for an offense other than a felony.

The district clerk must receive the application at least seven days before May 21, 2024 (if the ballots need to be mailed to you); this will give ample time to be returned to the district. Completed absentee ballots will be accepted by Carolyn Boberg until 5:00 p.m. on May 21 in the District Office.

WVCS HEALTH CORNER

CURRENT NEW YORK STATE COVID UPDATE

As of March 7, 2024, the New York State Department of Health issued new guidelines and recommendations for positive or confirmed COVID infections. These new guidelines discuss when to stay home and when to go back to normal activities.

- Individuals should stay home and away from others, including people they live with who are not sick, if they have respiratory symptoms that are not from a known cause. This includes fever, chills, fatigue, cough, runny nose, and headache.
- Individuals can go back to normal activities when, for at least 24 hours, both are true: Symptoms are overall getting better and there is no longer a fever without fever-reducing medication.
- When going back to normal activities, individuals should take added precautions over the next five days. This includes cleaner air, hygiene, masks, physical distance, and additional testing if around others (especially older people, young children, and those with a weak immune system). Children under 2 should never wear a mask. Healthcare providers should discuss with their patients about how long a child under 2 should stay home.
- Keep in mind that people may still be able to spread the virus that made them sick, even if they are feeling better, so it is important to take extra precautions after resuming normal activities.
- If individuals develop a fever or start to feel worse, they should stay home and away from others again. They should use the same criteria for returning to normal activities as when they first had symptoms and take added precautions over the next 5 days.

It is important to note that these guidelines should also be followed for influenza or respiratory syncytial virus (RSV) and are for non-healthcare settings. If you have further questions or concerns, it is important to speak with your primary care physician.




NEVER FORGET


















SECOND GRADE NEWS
































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
