MESSAGE FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT

The results of the Spring 2022 3-8 Math and ELA NYS Assessments have recently been released. While I am proud to say our participation rate was nearly perfect with 100% participation in ELA and 99% participation in Math, we have much work to do. While we do have data from the 2022 assessments, we need more than one data set to make significant



assumptions. "Due to the ongoing impacts of COVID-19, it may not be appropriate to compare 2021-22 NYS standardized assessment results with results from prior years," the New York State Education Department said in a news release in October. "And due to a 2018 change to the two-session test design and the performance standard review process, the 2017 Grades 3-8 ELA and math results should not be compared with subsequent results."

Nonetheless, we can learn a lot and begin to focus on specific areas. We did not expect our rankings to increase by leaps in one year. I do expect that we shall begin to see increases in the next couple of years in our rankings. This summer, we began intensive professional development that our staff has not endured before. It was a challenge for them as change often is, but they have accepted that challenge. We should be very proud of our teachers! I know I am. Our primary focus is developing a comprehensive and rigorous ELA and Math curriculum in addition to a very comprehensive multi-tiered system to monitor student progress. Our teachers are continuing that work on the curriculum guided by experts in

those specific fields. We have also infused integrated co-teaching coupled with specially designed instruction for our special education students which has not been present at West Valley CSD previously. There is no doubt we have started seeing some student growth immediately within the classrooms.

In last month's newsletter, there were highlights of our students accessing our STEM curriculum. The district started this school year to begin infusing the WOZ ED curriculum pathways: coding, robotics, engineering, animation, and augmented reality/virtual reality (AR/VR). Mrs. Thiel has taken the lead on this work and has done a tremendous job so far. Steve Wozniak, co-founder of Apple, recognized West Valley CSD along with 41 other districts across the nation for our beginning efforts with the STEM program. We will continue to develop and progress through the curriculum.

There is no doubt the West Valley CSD spirit has skyrocketed. Sports are back and we have high participation. Our student athletes are excelling both on and off the field/court. We had a very successful Fall Sports night where our athletes were recognized. We look forward to our Winter season of sports with basketball and bowling. We also have all our extracurricular clubs in full swing!

The year 2022 has been a successful year. We have grown in and out of the classroom. I look forward to continuing to move forward!

BOARD CORNER

How the Board Agenda is Developed.

Board meetings are the place where the board conducts its business in public. Even though an agenda is not required for school board meetings, it is good business practice to use one. The use of an agenda will help the board stay focused, and ensure that meetings are productive, orderly, and don't drag on indefinitely without purpose. Board members, employees of the school district, and residents of the school district may suggest agenda items by contacting the Superintendent, who in turn will communicate the suggestion to the President of the Board.

To ensure there will not be any surprises on the agenda it is helpful for the President, Vice President, and Superintendent to set time aside on the Wednesday before the meeting to discuss potential agenda items.

The Board President should also seek input from and communicate with all other board members so that everyone understands the purpose of the agenda items brought before them. The district clerk ensures that board members and administrators have the agenda to view by 5 p.m. on Thursday. This gives them ample time for any additions, changes, or deletions to the agenda before it is sent out to the public on Friday. The board meetings are typically held the 3rd Tuesday of each month and there are times that the agenda is amended at the meeting. Item(s) could be brought to the board's attention on the day of the meeting that would be beneficial for the district to act on at the current meeting than to wait for the next. It is not a practice that is encouraged on a regular basis, but sometimes it is unavoidable.

The board is transitioning to a consent agenda format from the traditional agenda. Benefits of using a consent agenda for routine items within the agenda help move the meeting forward and get the participants engaged. Items will be grouped within the designated sections of the agenda that are similar in nature and will be voted on as one. Generally, consent agenda items are considered self-explanatory and noncontroversial. Board Docs is the program the district is using to store board meeting information. This program is easier to maneuver for researching historical information, more user friendly and offers a quicker turnaround time for the District Clerk to prepare documents.



AMERICAN MATHEMATICAL COMPETITION (AMC)

On Thursday, November 10, high school students had the opportunity to participate in the American Mathematical Competitions (AMC) held at SUNY Fredonia.

The AMC 10 covers high school curriculum through 10th grade, and the AMC 12 covers the entire high school curriculum (trigonometry, advanced algebra, and advanced geometry, but excluding calculus).

The AMC, a 75-minute paper-and-pencil test, is a no-stakes competition, since the results are not reported to teachers or schools, and success on the AMC can lead to opportunities to participate in further competitions, including all the way up to the International Math Olympiad!

Participating in the AMC can also be a notable accomplishment when applying to college. Participants in the AMC 12 were Jacob Coluci, Ben Fisher, Kasper Heitman, and Jordan Manaher. Maggie Parish participated in the AMC 10.

WEST VALLEY EXPANDS CURRICULUM

West Valley continues its work to improve student performance and growth. This work began in the summer of 2020 with evaluating student assessment results, the materials we used, and our instructional methods. In the 2021-2022 school year we implemented the same curriculum materials from PK-6 and started determining the progression of skills and concepts from one grade level to the next.

Our work in ELA has expanded this school year to include the building of assessments that are aligned to the standards students will be tested on. Creating common assessments across grade levels will aid our teachers in determining what skills or concepts students are mastering or struggling with. It helps us to better identify any gaps in our instruction and where we may need to focus our teaching.

While we continue our curriculum work in ELA, we have expanded this work to include Math and Science for the 2022-2023 school year. Our work in Math for this year is focused on building "spiraled" assessments. These assessments continually test students on the most important skills and concepts throughout the year. Providing students with the opportunity for repetition of skills and concepts throughout the year assists in building their math fluency and memory recollection. These assessments will provide the foundation for our alignment work in the coming years.

Finally, as the NYS science standards have been updated our students will begin taking new assessments in the Spring of 2024. To prepare our students and staff we have determined a singular curriculum, Amplify Science, to be used in grades 5-8. Our science teachers will participate in professional development around this resource as well as professional development through CA BOCES on the required Science Investigations (mini labs) that will be a part of the new assessments in 2024.

All the work we are doing this year, and that we have planned for upcoming years, highlights our efforts at improving our students' performance and growth. We recognize the importance of this work but also understand that it will take time for this work and the changes we are making to bear fruit.

In closing, I would like to wish our entire school community a Happy Holiday season and a Happy New Year.




