As we embark on the new year, we have some exciting changes and additions to our district.

DISTRICT DESIGNATION

Back in 2020, West Valley was designated by the New York State Education Department as a Target school in the areas of math and English language arts for students with disabilities. In the last newsletter, Mr. Amodeo and I talked a lot about the work the school and teachers have been doing to become better for our students. I can officially say that we no longer have that designation and are deemed to be a district and school in good academic standing. One of our goals is to continue that work and to increase our student achievement.

NEW STAFF

We have filled almost all the vacancies we recently had open. We welcome a new science teacher, maintenance mechanic, two laborers, and a bus driver. Please meet our new staff in this newsletter.

FACILITIES IMPROVEMENTS/UPDATES

Capital Improvement Project

We are coming close to the completion of the capital project of 2021. The original completion date was by Christmas, but because of material delays and labor shortages, it was pushed to a February Break completion.

Smart Schools Bond Act

This project of upgrading our infrastructure related to technology has recently started. In addition, we are adding a new alarm and security system.

Capital Outlay Project 2021-2022

This project involved door replacements for all of the second floor and some of the first-floor doors. We are waiting for two replacement doors and one magnetic stop for stairwell doors which were on back order. Once they arrive and are installed, this outlay project will be complete.

Capital Outlay Project 2023

Due to the delay of the previous outlay project, this project will be completed during the summer of 2023. This outlay project will focus on the current gym entrance.

Federal Funding Grant

We will be replacing the windows in the front of the main building with this grant. We are hoping for a summer 2023 or fall 2023 installation.

I am excited to share that we will be a host site for the Healthy Kids Program to have a full day 3-year-old program and an extended before- and after- school program. This will be open to all West Valley community members as well as the surrounding communities if space is available. Thank you to all the families that completed the survey for extended care. 

During the months of November and December, students in kindergarten, 5th and 6th grade have been studying robots and how they impact our world. Students discovered that all robots sense, think, and act. After learning about how robotic engineers use biomimicry when developing robots, the 5th, and 6th graders used Cublets (block style robots) to replicate certain animal behaviors. The kindergarten students learned the difference between humans and robots. They also used Cublets to create different types of robots. The New Year is well under way and the art room is buzzing with creativity. Our elementary students have been inspired by the winter season. 


