MESSAGE FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT By Dr. Taweepon Farrar

It's hard to believe that March 8, 2021, was my first day as West Valley Central School District's Superintendent. In our January Newsletter, I reflected on ALL that has happened since my arrival. It was a long list! As I embark on the beginning of my third year, I am extremely proud of the growth of our students, staff, and community. I also recognize there is still room for improvement and more growth! I do plan to revisit my initial entry plan by having



individual meetings again with all staff. This will help us deepen our knowledge of what did and did not occur; what we did well; what we didn't do well; and what we can do better.

Curriculum/Instruction/Academic Support

The New York State Education Department designated our district as a Target district in 2020. This designation is defined as having one or more student subgroups performing at a level 1. Since my arrival, we have focused on developing a comprehensive plan for curriculum, instruction, and academic support for staff and students. ELA and Math have been the primary content of focus along with best instructional strategies. We have developed and implemented a robust multi-tiered system of supports for all students. Special Education best practices has also been a focus. The addition of integrated coteaching as part of the special education continuum has been integral to our success. The transition from Cleartrack to IEP Direct better supports and streamlines Special Education timelines and law.

I am proud to say that with all these efforts, West Valley Central School District is no longer a "Target" Designated district. We are now a district in good academic standing. Our goal now is to increase our student achievement while providing a comprehensive program for our students.

Budget

We have approached the time to begin developing our budget for the 2023-2024 school year. Our interim business administrator, Rick Mancuso, presented a first glance at the budget at the February Board meeting. The goals and direction for developing the budget are:

- Create a budget that maintains and enhances core values and programmatic requirements.
- Be mindful of the tax impact on our community and keep the tax burden at or below New York state's tax cap as applied to our District.
- Create an atmosphere that returns West Valley to being a school of destination.

More details will follow over the next several months that will lead to the annual budget vote in May. I encourage all of you to read our forthcoming newsletters that will detail more of the budget as it gets developed as well as attend future board meetings.

Capital Project

As I mentioned previously, the completion of the Capital Project 2021 was delayed slightly due to materials and labor shortages. We do anticipate the majority of the project being completed this month with a few minor details that will be completed before the school year ends. We will be excited to showcase the new entryway as you come to the district to vote in May!

Summary:

My reflection upon my first two years has been powerful. The work we do every day is knowing that each and every child matters. I feel blessed to have this opportunity and continue to pledge to our students, staff, and community to positively lead our district with integrity, resourcefulness, and pride.

SPRING GROWTH *By Mr. Amodeo, Principal/Curriculum Coordinator*

The month of March begins one of the longer uninterrupted stretches of the school year. It is also the beginning of Spring and the opportunity for new growth. This is the same in our classrooms. We often see children achieve some of their largest gains during this time of the school year.

We are excited for the opportunity to have our students demonstrate their growth when the NYS 3-8 ELA and Math assessments are given on April 18 and May 2, respectively. For the 2022-23 school year, West Valley has been designated as a school in good standing across all student groups. One of the keys that allows us to be a school in good standing is our NYS 3-8 Assessment participation rate (the percentage of students who take the assessments). Over the last two years we have had 100% and 99% of our students take the assessments. Although the assessments in the last two years were impacted by the pandemic, we have been able to use the data to design professional development for our teachers and help close gaps in student learning by aligning our curriculum. It continues to be of critical importance that all of our students participate in the assessments to allow us the best opportunity to adapt to student needs.

We are in the second year of curriculum development for ELA and the first year of curriculum development for Math. We are looking forward to our students "showing what they know" and seeing the benefits of the hard work our teachers and students have been doing all year long. BOARD CORNER

Are you interested in running for the Board of Education?

Petitions to be a candidate for a board of education seat are available beginning March 21, 2023 in the district office from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., Monday through Friday, except holidays.

When the petition is picked up, you will need to *identify what specific seat* you would like to run for.

There are three (3) seats open for election to the Board of Education.

- **Five-year term**, currently held by Michael Harmony (term expires on June 30, 2023).
- **Five-year term,** currently held by Gary Niesyty (term expires on June 30, 2023).
- Three years remaining on the original 5-year term, currently held by George Kazmierczak until May 16th, 2023 (BOE appointed due to resignation).

If elected to this seat your term will start May 16th, 2023 after the vote is certified.

The petition requires signatures and residences of at least 25 qualified voters. The candidate's name and residence should be on each page of the petition.


Signed petitions must be filed with Carolyn Boberg, District Clerk by 5:00 p.m. on April 17, 2023.

<u>To qualify to be a board candidate you must meet the following</u> <u>criteria:</u>

- A citizen of the United States,
- Eighteen (18) years of age or older,
- Able to read and write,
- A legal resident of the district for a continuous and uninterrupted period of at least one (1) year prior to the election,
- Cannot be an employee of the West Valley Central School District,
- The only member of his/her family (that is, cannot be a member of the same household) on the West Valley Central School District Board,
- May not simultaneously hold another incompatible public office, including, but not limited to Superintendent, clerk, tax collector, treasurer or librarian, or an employee of the Board. In union free and central school districts, however, a Board member may be appointed clerk of the board and of the district.
- Must not have been removed from a school district office within one (1) year preceding the date of appointment or election to the Board.

ART CORNER

So many exciting things are happening in the art department! At the elementary level, Pre-K and Kindergarten just did a project using line, shape, and color for Valentine's Day. Our fifth graders learned how to draw and shade in 3D. They had a choice to draw a box of chocolate or make a box that was filled with Valentine's Day surprises. The sixth-grade group learned about artist Chris Riggs. They recreated his work with many heart cutouts onto black paper. Riggs is a pop artist who uses bright colors. The seventh grade just completed their gold scratch art. Students selected a famous person of their choice for this project.

At the secondary level, Photography is learning how to photograph simple items like eggs and bubbles to evoke a mood and work on composition. Students in SUPA Animation enrolled in a pilot course from Syracuse University. They are just starting to learn about the basics of animation and have created their first animated flipbook. When they complete the course, they will receive college credit. The sculpture class is making paper mache taxidermy heads. Studio in Art is learning about the principles of design and are starting with pattern. They are creating their own pixelated patterns that are designed with bright colors. Students in Painting and Drawing learned about a full composition taking up space. They are now drawing a scene with two sets of characters battling each other.

Our featured celebrity artist this month is a fifth-grade student, Hope Niesyty. Hope's favorite color is turquoise. She is the youngest of three and loves tacos. She told me her favorite book is "A Wolf Called Wonderer." Hope loves to draw animals. She has many different drawings of her fourteen pets. She told me some day she wants to be a veterinarian and sell her own artwork. She is very passionate about her drawings.

3RD GRADE LEARNING

Ms. Westfall's 3rd graders are currently learning about animals and their classifications, including mammals, reptiles, amphibians, birds, and fish. They also studied the habitats they live in. In order to bring the students to a closer understanding of



the animal world, Jaclyn Butcher was invited to bring her collection of specimens and discuss the animal world with them. She first shared her experiences at SUNY Cobleskill and the variety of animals she was able to learn about by going out to the rivers and forests in the area for her classes. She even told about her herpetology class where the students were able to bring the snakes to class that are kept there and handle them while the teacher taught the lesson! Miss Butcher brought many objects to show the kids and let them touch and handle some of them. Among them were an elk skull, a fisher pelt, many different feathers, a covote skull, a turtle shell, and photos of her experiences as a licensed falconer. The students asked some great questions! The most interesting thing they learned was the difference between a venomous animal and a poisonous animal. An animal is venomous if it bites something and an animal is poisonous if something bites or touches it and gets sick. Many thanks to Miss Butcher for taking the time to share her knowledge with these young animal enthusiasts!



















Did you know? The Aztecs were one of the first civilizations that had children attend school.






Temple: used for religious practices, including human sacrifices


