School Safety and Security

As a District, our number one priority is to provide our students, faculty, and staff with a healthy and safe place to learn. This past fall we had an onsite safety and security evaluation completed by a reputable security and safety consulting firm. This evaluation resulted in a list of further steps the District could take to improve our current safety and security measures.



One of the many items we are focusing on is

the establishment of a secure main entry point. We have waited quite some time for the construction to be completed and are delighted to report that after April break all students and visitors will begin using the new entrance.

In addition, new lockers were installed over the February break. Students in grades 7-12 were all issued individual lockers and expectations have been shared with them on proper locker usage. Please refer to the article specific to lockers in this newsletter.

Facilities Improvement

The 2021-22 and 2022-23 Capital Outlay Projects included interior door replacements, athletic exterior door replacement, and athletic entryway floor replacement. The work for the athletic exterior door replacement will occur this summer. It is important that we continually update and improve our facilities for our students' safety and security.

Professional Development for our Staff

Dr. Melissa Sadin visited our staff on March 17th and presented on The Science of Happiness: From Roots to Results. This discussion revolved around resilience, gratitude, laughter, hope, and self-care. We are in the business of taking care of and instructing our students. It is especially important that, as a district, we are also taking care of the adults who take care of our students. During our Professional Development Day our bus drivers had the chance for more training on safely supporting our students with Mr. Dunham. Overall, the day occurred because of the thoughtful planning of the Wellness Committee (Ms. Emily Kazmierczak, Mr. Matthew LaBrake, Mrs. Alison Locke, Mr. Alex Marino, Ms. Leanna Pfeffer) led by Mrs. Behringer, our Assistant Principal. Several of our staff (Mrs. Butcher, Mrs. Hannah Mazzuto, Mrs. Lil Lechner, Mrs. Jody Thiel, and Ms. Emily Kazmierczak) led and/or facilitated our sessions. A huge thank you goes to everyone for their dedication to West Valley CSD.

Budget Planning for 2023-2024

We will continue to await details from Albany related to the New York State budget for school districts. Once the official data is released, we will build our budget for the 2023-24 school year. I encourage you to attend our board meetings, as we continue to have presentations related to the budget for the next school year.

STUDENT LOCKERS

West Valley Central School is excited to share that the new middle school and high school lockers were installed over the February recess and students started using them over the last two weeks. This has been a highly anticipated change but will still take some time to adjust to. Mandated guidelines put in place during the COVID-19 pandemic and recent construction projects stalled the use of West Valley's old lockers and caused secondary students to carry their backpacks throughout the school day.

The primary concern of the current Capital Project has been on improving our school's safety and security. The new student lockers are a part of that plan. Having classrooms, aisles, and hallways clear of any obstructions greatly improves our ability to enter and exit a space in emergency situations. Being free of a heavy backpack during the school day also improves the physical well-being of students by not burdening them with weighted bags throughout the day.

It is now a requirement for students in grades 7-12 to store their backpacks, hats, jackets, boots, etc. in their locker when they arrive to school until the end of the last period before leaving school. There are three minutes in between classes for students to go to their lockers. Administrators, teachers, and staff will continue to work with students on planning and managing their locker time as we work through this change. When students return from Spring break there will only be four days left in the 3rd quarter! The final stretch of the school year begins with the start of the 4th quarter on April 17. April and the beginning of May are extremely important as we look forward to 100% of our students participating in the NYS 3-8 ELA and Math assessments.

As we enter the final quarter of the school year and students are preparing for their end-of-year assessments, students and staff are also planning for the 2023-24 school year. In my January newsletter article, I

had outlined a new process for determining student electives.

This past month, students worked with teachers on brainstorming new course ideas. Students and teachers also completed an interest survey to help develop our course electives for next school year. Once we write new course descriptions, determine the length of courses, and finalize the amount of credit for each course, we will be sharing a summary with families that can be used to have conversations at home about what course electives a student may want to take next school year.

The final step of course requests will occur when students formally meet with Mr. LaBrake to discuss their course schedule for the 2023-24 school year. Please keep in

mind that we will be asking students to make elective choices above and beyond the total number of classes required. This is because the placement of required courses in the Master Schedule may not allow a student to be available for a given elective. Having more options provides greater flexibility to build a student's schedule.

While this process may seem a little lengthy, we feel the extra time devoted to gaining interests and ideas from students allows us to build course offerings that reflect current trends among our students and meet more of their learning goals. education seat are available beginning March 21, 2023, in the district office from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., Monday through Friday, except holidays.

When the petition is picked up, you will need to *identify what specific seat* you would like to run for.

There are three (3) seats open for election to the Board of Education.

- Five-year term, currently held by Michael Harmony (term expires on June 30, 2023).
- **Five-year term,** currently held by Gary Niesyty (term expires on June 30, 2023).
- Four years remaining on the original 5-year term, it is currently held by George Kazmierczak until May 16th, 2023 (BOE appointed due to resignation). If elected to this seat your term will start May 16th after the vote is certified through June 30, 2027.

The petition requires signatures and residences of at least 25 qualified voters. On the petition the candidate's name and residence should be on each page of the petition.

Signed petitions must be filed with Carolyn Boberg, District Clerk by 5:00 p.m. on April 17, 2023.

To qualify to be a board candidate you must meet the following criteria:


- A citizen of the United States,
- Eighteen (18) years of age or older,
- Able to read and write,
- A legal resident of the district for a continuous and uninterrupted period of at least one (1) year prior to the election,
- Cannot be an employee of the West Valley Central School District,
- The only member of his/her family (that is, cannot be a member of the same household) on the West Valley Central School District Board,
- May not simultaneously hold another incompatible public office, including, but not limited to Superintendent, clerk, tax collector, treasurer or librarian, or an employee of the Board. In union free and central school districts, however, a Board member may be appointed clerk of the board and of the district.
- Must not have been removed from a school district office within one (1) year preceding the date of appointment or election to the Board.

We are so proud of all of West Valley's new inductees! Congratulations!






PROJECT: PLAY, LEARN, REPEAT Pre-K is the place to be

ART CORNER

The art rooms at West Valley are marching right into spring. At the elementary level, our pre-schoolers have read the story "The Dot" by Peter H. Reynolds and made their mark making their own dot. They are vibrant and colorful, perfect for spring! In Kindergarten, students finished drawing rabbits and added texture by sponge painting their backgrounds. Fifth graders have been creating their own zentangles. Zentangles are drawing repetitive, and oftentimes intricate, patterns. They are said to be very therapeutic and meditative. The zentangle backgrounds were



created in black and white, and were then overlapped with a large paintbrush painted with watercolor. They were mounted onto their zentangles to create a nice, three-dimensional effect.

Our middle schoolers have also been busy! Our sixth grade students just finished a project called "My personality hoodie." The hoodies they designed incorporated several different facts about themselves using words and symbolism. It was a great lesson for students to show off their individual identities. And lastly, our seventh grade students are starting a fibers unit by weaving their own looms.

In the high school, our photography students have been exploring more digital editing and manipulation, using their photographs they took from the first semester. Our animation students have completed their first two flipbooks and are now working on papercut animations. Our sculpture students have just finished creating taxidermy heads made out of paper mache of an animal of their choice. Studio in Art students are now beginning to design mandalas—an art method that is a meditative process that provides a form of therapy.

Art Club has teamed up with the elementary teachers and

have started creating decorations for this year's upcoming PARP carnival. This year's theme is Dinosaurs!

Lastly, our Celebrity Artist for the month is Gabrielle Hickey, a senior at West Valley. Gabby will be attending JCC after high school, majoring in Studio Art. Naturally, art is her favorite subject as she has been actively involved in Art Club throughout her high school career. She also has played softball for the last three years. ABSENTEE BALLOTS

West Valley Central School District is required by law to make absentee ballots available to qualified district voters for our May 16th, 2023, Annual School Budget, purchase of a 65-Passesger Bus funded by the Transportation Reserve Fund, and board members election. Call Carolyn Boberg, District Clerk at 942-3100 ext. 4102 for an application or question.

A qualified district voter must request in advance an **application** for **absentee ballots** and select the reason you will not be able to appear in person on May 16th, 2023, to vote in person on this particular day.

(a) are/or will be a patient in the hospital, or unable to appear personally at the polling place on such day because of illness or physical disability or,
(b) duties, occupation, business, or studies will require him/her to be outside of the country/county or city of their residence on such day, or
(c) on vacation outside the country/county or city of his residence on such day; or,
(d) absent from his voting residence because detained in jail awaiting action by a grand jury or awaiting trial or is confined in prison after conviction for an offense other than a felony.
(e) COVID concern

The district clerk must receive the *application* at least seven days before May 16th (if the ballots need to be mailed to you), this will give ample time to be returned to the district). Completed absentee ballots will be accepted by Carolyn Boberg until 5pm on May 16th, in the gymnasium.
