

On Friday, September 10, Mr. Amodeo led our entire student body and staff in a remembrance of the 20-year anniversary of 9/11.





As a school board member, you hold positions as:

- An individual school board member
- A member of the district governance team composed of school board members and the superintendent
- A member of a board made of other members

The Board focuses on ENDS - vision, goals, and policy *What? Why? How Well? How Much?*

The Superintendent (as CEO) focuses on <u>MEANS</u> - objectives, plans, actions, recommendations *How? When? Where? By Whom?*

In other words, the board oversees the education of students and is responsible for school district operations but does not directly run the district's day-to-day operations.

Major responsibilities of a board member:

- Set the District's Direction drawing upon the community, the board describes a shared vision, and established goals, standards and strategy to transform vision into reality
- **Ensure Alignment** of strategy, resources, policies, programs, and processes with district goals
- Assess & Account for Progress using comprehensive data, thorough deliberation, and open communication
- **Continuously Improve** the district accentuating and reinforcing the positive, and correcting the negative

To represent well, to fulfill public trust, to lead...

Major roles of a board member:

- Representative of the entire community
- Steward of the district's resources
- Leader of the district
- Advocate for public education

23RD ANNUAL FINANCIAL AID NIGHT TUES., OCT. 19 AT 6:00 P.M. AT WVCS

A representative from Jamestown Community College's Financial Aid Office will provide information for 11th and 12th graders and their parents/guardians on the financial aid process including completion of the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) forms, grants, scholarships, and various student and parent loans.

Financial aid is money that comes in many forms. It generally consists of a combination of grants (actual cash that you do not have to pay back), scholarships (actual cash awarded for academic achievement), and loans (must be paid back). These types of aid come from a variety of sources: the college itself, individual states, private donors, and the Federal Government (by far the largest source of aid). Once you've filled out the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA): http://www.fafsa.ed.gov/ colleges will extend to you the types of aid for which you are eligible.

PSAT - TUES., OCT. 26

On Tuesday, October 26 our school will administer the PSAT/NMSQT (Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test/ National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test) for 10th and 11th graders. The cost per student is \$18.00, and checks are to be made payable to WEST VALLEY CENTRAL SCHOOL. The *deadline* to sign up and pay for the test is **Monday, October 18** in the Guidance Office or with Mrs. Westfall. Even if your child is not considering college at this time, he or she should take this test. Just taking it can encourage a student to start thinking seriously about life after high school, goals, and the education necessary to reach those goals.

- 1. It measures the reading, math, and writing skills needed for college (and for success in most jobs and careers in today's world). After the test, a score report will show the students' results in each of the sections. It will also target areas that need improvement before re-taking/taking the PSAT/SAT standardized tests.
- 2. This test gives students a chance to see how their skills compare with those of other students who will apply to college.
- For 11th graders only, it is the first step in entering the National Merit Scholarship Corporation competitions for scholarships and recognition.
- 4. The Student Search Service gives PSAT/NMSQT test takers the option to voluntarily place their names and addresses in a pool of college-bound students interested in receiving admission and financial aid information from certified colleges, universities, and scholarship agencies.
- 5. Lastly, it provides practice for the SAT exams, which most juniors take for the first time in the spring.
- 6. Please encourage your son or daughter to sign up for the PSAT/NMSQT.

The time to start thinking about further education beyond high school is *now*!



ASVAB Career Exploration Program for 10th - 12th graders Wednesday, December 1, 2021

Dear Parents/Guardians,

West Valley Central School will be administering the ASVAB assessment instrument, which is part of the ASVAB Career Exploration Program (CEP), to any <u>interested</u> students in grades 10-12 on **Wednesday, December 1, 2021** from 8:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. Please have your son/daughter sign up in the Guidance Office with Mr. LaBrake by Friday, November 19th. This test is in an invaluable tool to help your child with his/her future educational and career plans.

The ASVAB CEP will help your student:

- To learn more about themselves and the world of work
- Explore occupations in line with their interests and skills
- Develop an effective strategy to realize their career and education goals

One of the scores of the ASVAB is the military services' entrance score which may be used by your child to explore career options in the military. Your child's name and ASVAB CEP Scores will be released to the military unless you choose not to have their name released. Even if your child's name is released to the military, by no means is your child obligated to the military service.

The ASVAB CEP's website (www.asvabprogram.com) offers great information regarding the program to include a brief video summary explaining the process and benefits of the program. Please call me with additional questions, 716-942-3100, extension 4148.

Mrs. Lechner and Mrs. Mazzuto are eager to provide art-enriching experiences for their students and look forward to a successful year.




















CELEBRATING INTERNATIONAL DOT DAY IN THE LIBRARY


