SCHOOL BOARD CORNER

HOW THE BOARD AGENDA IS DEVELOPED

Board meetings are the place where the board conducts its business in public. Even though an agenda is not required for school board meetings, it is good business practice to use one. The use of an agenda will help the board stay focused, and ensure that meetings are productive, orderly, and don't drag on indefinitely without purpose. Board members, employees of the school district, and residents of the school district may suggest agenda items by contacting the Superintendent, who in turn will communicate the suggestions to the President of the Board.

To ensure there will not be any surprises on the agenda it is helpful for the President, Vice President, and Superintendent to set time aside on the Wednesday before the meeting to discuss potential agenda items. The Board President should also seek input from and communicate with all other board members so that everyone understands the purpose of the agenda items brought before them. The district clerk ensures that board members and administrators have the agenda to view by 5:00 p.m. on Thursday. This gives them ample time for any additions, changes, or deletions to the agenda before it is sent out to the public on Friday. The board meetings are typically held the 3rd Tuesday of each month.

There are times that the agenda is amended at the meeting. Item(s) could be brought to the board's attention on the day of the meeting that would be beneficial for the district to act on at the current meeting instead of waiting for the next meeting. It is not a practice that is encouraged on a regular basis, but sometimes it is unavoidable.

The board is transitioning to a consent agenda format from the traditional agenda. A benefit of using a consent agenda for routine items helps move the meeting forward and keeps the participants engaged. Items will be grouped within the designated sections of the agenda that are similar in nature and will be voted on as one. Generally, consent agenda items are considered self-explanatory and non-controversial. Board Docs is the program the district will be using in the future to store board meeting information. This program is easier to maneuver for researching historical information, more user friendly, and provides a quicker turnaround time for the District Clerk to prepare documents.

Board Norms

- The board will always prioritize the needs of students.
- District decisions will be made with a "no surprises" approach and with highest levels of transparency where items are discussed openly and shared with all stakeholders.
- Communications between the stakeholders of the board shall remain timely and inclusive of all stakeholders.
- All individual board stakeholders will publicly support final decisions of the board, regardless of personal opinion.
- Board stakeholders will treat all with respect and expect the same in return.

Board Goals

- The Board of Education will engage with and communicate to the school community in multiple manners on a broad variety of issues including program, facilities, and budget.
- The Board of Education will engage the community in a prideful culture by developing mission and vision statements that lead to a brand for West Valley Central School.
- The Board of Education will increase achievement by setting an expectation of the value of assessments, so the district meets NY State Education Department participation rates.
- The Board of Education will present a five-year facility plan and a five-year fiscal plan that builds community understanding and delivers community buy-in.

WEST VALLEY ELA CURRICULUM WORK PROGRESSING

West Valley continues its work to improve student performance and growth in English Language Arts. This work began in the summer of 2020 with our teachers looking at student assessment results, the materials we were using, and our instructional methods. We continued this work throughout last school year in partnership with CA BOCES.

One of the decisions that we made as a district in the summer of 2020 was for our teachers to use the same materials and resources. To meet this goal, we have purchased new materials for our teachers and students to use for this year and years to come.

Beginning this summer, we have partnered independently with Angela Stockman, an ELA curriculum specialist. Over the summer and through this past October, all ELA teachers PK-12 participated in these trainings to analyze what content

and standards were being implemented. This work included the identification of the texts that would be used and the skills that could be taught and assessed throughout the year.

This work in the summer and through the early part of the school year helps us to “align” our curriculum. Aligning the curriculum means there is a sequence of content and skills as students move from one grade level to the next. As students move through the grade levels, the complexity of content and skills increases. Having the same resources across all grade levels assists our teachers to better identify areas where students may be struggling and what skills may need to be addressed from one grade level to the next. It also helps to ensure that our students have access to a variety of texts where they can interact with different perspectives, viewpoints, characters, cultures, and experiences.

Presently, all the work our ELA teachers have been doing outside of the classroom and the work they will continue with Angela Stockman through January and March of 2022 is called “curriculum mapping.” Curriculum mapping simply means that our teachers are mapping the beginning point of instruction and the end point of instruction with many stops along the way.

In addition to this work in ELA, our teachers have been receiving professional development on Explicit Direct Instruction. This is a teaching strategy that can best be summarized as “I do, We do, and You do.” This means that when new content or skills are being taught the teacher first demonstrates, then the class as a whole group practices while the teacher provides feedback. The final step is for students to complete a task independently, with teacher support, as needed, that demonstrates their understanding or proficiency. There are more pieces to Explicit Direct Instruction that our teachers will be working towards implementing. These include student engagement strategies, checks for understanding, and modifying instruction to meet the needs of individual or groups of students.

All that we are doing this year, and that we have planned for upcoming years, highlights our efforts at improving our students’ performance and growth. The commitment to improvement that our teachers have demonstrated has been amazing. Given their commitment and work ethic, we are excited to see the benefits of these initiatives in our students’ achievement.


KINDERGARTEN STEAM


found materials. Ceramics students just finished creating the "Monsters from Kindergarten" drawings and 8th graders are currently working on a weaving project.

CROSS COUNTRY END OF THE YEAR

The 2021 Cross Country season wrapped up with our final two meets, the CCAA league meet on Friday, October 29th at Bemus Point Golf Club, and Sectionals at Knox Farms State Park on November 3rd. The CCAA league meet incorporated all cross country schools across Chautauqua and Cattaraugus counties. Overall, 17 schools attended this season ending meet. Representing West Valley were Jack Tharnish, Victoria Parish, Slater Smith, Josh Kowalski, and Olivia Harmony. Mother nature provided quite the challenge throwing consistently hard rain, freezing temperatures, and strong winds. Nonetheless, all students put forth their best effort and posted great times considering the conditions. Olivia

Harmony ended her Girls Modified year with a strong first place finish outpacing 43 other competitors. The next nearest competitor was over 30 seconds behind her 14:58 finishing time. Next year, Olivia will be joining the Varsity Team. Victoria Parish and Jack Tharnish went on to attend sectionals the following Friday at Knox Farm State Park. Jack Tharnish finished 18th of 54 of the top Class D competitors with a 5k time of 19:16. Victoria Parish finished 32nd out of 45 of the top Class D competitors with a 5k time of 26:57.

Overall, this season students showed incredible growth. Victoria Parish and Jack Tharnish were our Freshman veterans of the program. Both students had two years of experience under their belts when West Valley was merged with Springville. This year West Valley decided to start our first ever Cross Country program. Victoria and Jack

provided a lot of leadership to some of the newer students to Cross Country. Olivia Harmony quickly became a leader in the modified realm of the sport. She consistently ran right alongside of the first-place boys finisher and at every local meet she placed first for modified girls. She even won an invitational meet in the modified division! Slater Smith and Josh Kowalski joined cross country a little later in the season and their energetic spirit and determination really rounded out the team's cohesiveness. Throughout the season all teammates showed great sportsmanship, tenacity, and resilience. Next year, West Valley will be hosting its own league meet. Over the summer, students will be working hard at laying out and preparing our very own course. For a first-year program West Valley had a lot of success. **#WeAreWestValley**
