MESSAGE FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT

It's hard to believe that March 8, 2021, was my first day as West Valley Central School District's Superintendent. So much has occurred since my arrival that I felt it was important to reflect upon my first year. Before I reflect, I feel it would be important to understand why



we reflect. We reflect to expand on our understanding of our experiences. It helps us deepen our knowledge of what did and what did not occur; what we did well; what we didn't do well; and what we can do better. This process provided me the opportunity to step back and look at the work we have done for our students, staff, and community.

Here are a FEW highlights of my first year in reflection:

Athletics/Extracurricular Activities

Prior to my arrival, all our West Valley student athletes traveled to other school districts to join their teams. While there are still sports such as Soccer, Swim, and Varsity Basketball where our students compete and still travel, we focused on bringing back to West Valley CSD some sports we knew we could sustain.

- In the Spring of 2021, we brought back our own Track & Field team and Girls' Varsity Softball Team.
- In the Fall of 2021, we brought back Cross Country.
- In the Winter of 2021 and 2022, we brought back both Girls' and Boys' Modified Basketball Teams.
- In the Winter of 2022, we brought back Girls' Cheerleading.

We will continue to support these sports for this Spring and into the 2022-2023 School Year!

Curriculum/Instruction/Academic Support

We have focused on developing a comprehensive plan for curriculum, instruction, and academic support for staff and students. ELA has been the primary content of focus along with best instructional strategies. We have developed and implemented a robust multi-tiered system for supports for all students. Special Education best practices has also been a focus. We transitioned from Cleartrack to IEP Direct as a management system that will better support and streamline Special Education timelines and law.

Leadership Team

Over the past year, there was an opportunity to restructure our administrative team. We eliminated the title Director of Special Education and created the title Assistant Principal/CSE and CPSE Chairperson. This restructure allows our building level administrative team to focus and collaborate for ALL students and to support ALL staff. This past summer we had a retreat for our administrators to re-vitalize our roles as leaders and focus on leadership coaching. Our administrative team now has focused weekly leadership meetings and regular check-ins to continue to build our collaboration and communication. There is no doubt this restructure had an immediate positive impact on our district.

Grants

West Valley CSD was awarded the Healthy Schools Grant. This grant, led by

Erie 1 BOCES, has helped streamline a Wellness Committee and our district policies. I have taken the lead on most of the other grants to ensure we are utilizing federal and state funds in the most efficient way for our students. The grants will allow us to purchase comprehensive ELA and Writing curriculum, Science curriculum, and Math and STEM curriculum. We will also be hiring a full-time social worker.

Board of Education

We recently completed an updated Board Policy Manual designed to accomplish the following: a) State a position taken by the District; b) Grant the authority to act; c) Be sufficiently detailed to give adequate direction; d) Be achievable within the real environment of the school and community; e) Provide for impartial procedures.

Much of the policy manual had not been updated since 2006. That's a long time and so much has changed! The policy manual has been reviewed, adjusted, and adopted. You can find the manual on our website under the Board of Education section.

Since my arrival, we also have successfully negotiated our teachers' contract. This accomplishment allows us to move forward working collaboratively as a school community to focus on teaching and learning in and out of the classroom.

Facilities

Planning and preparation have been in full swing the last few months as the beginning of construction will soon be upon us. This is an exciting time for our students, staff, and community.

We also had the opportunity to create and hire a Laborer position. This position has been instrumental in increasing the efficacy of our maintenance, grounds keeping and cleaning departments.

School Culture

There is strong evidence in research that a positive school culture contributes to improved student and staff performance, reduced student discipline, and increased extracurricular participation. Knowing this, we have worked extra hard my first year to focus on this both at the student level and staff level. One way we have worked on the "West Valley brand" has been increasing school spirit and moving forward with purpose. Tops in Springville now has our West Valley gear for sale! Most importantly, though, I have been proactively building positive relationships with students, staff, and the community.

In Summary

My reflection upon my first year has been powerful. I feel blessed to have this opportunity and pledge to our students, staff, and community to positively lead our district with integrity, resourcefulness, and pride. I am excited to see what this next year brings!

WEST VALLEY TEACHERS IMPROVING THEIR PRACTICE

Last month's newsletter shared that our Support Plan developed in collaboration with Erie 1 BOCES Regional Partnership was approved. One of the priorities of our Support Plan was a focus on instruction. West Valley's Elementary and Special Education teachers have participated in an 11-hour Professional Development opportunity on Explicit Instruction over the February break.

The components of Explicit Instruction can include:

- Chunking or breaking down of complex skills,
- Focus student attention on important content through modeling and think-

aloud,

- Systematic supports such as: I do, We do, You do,
- Provide opportunities for student responses and teacher feedback and,
- Create purposeful practice opportunities

When observing our teachers in realtime, the components of Explicit Instruction are present in daily lessons. In many cases it is second nature and of course good teaching. This Professional Development has affirmed our instructional practice and will also provide opportunities for continued improvement. Similar to a baseball player perfecting their swing, our teachers are dedicated to perfecting their instruction for the benefit of our students.

Over the next several weeks we will collaborate with each other and the Erie 1 BOCES Regional Partnership towards finding opportunities where we can get better. This collaboration will occur weekly through team meetings, peer observations, discussions, and data collection. We strive to be excellent where excellence is always trying to do our best and then better.




TECHNOLOGY WITH MR. PERGER

POSITIVE PARENTING TIPS FOR HEALTHY CHILD DEVELOPMENT

Middle Childhood (6-8 years of age)

Developmental Milestones

Middle childhood brings many changes in a child's life. By this time, children can dress themselves, catch a ball more easily using only their hands, and tie their shoes. Having independence from family becomes more important now. Events such as starting school bring children this age into regular contact with the larger world. Friendships become more and more important. Physical, social, and mental skills develop quickly at this time. This is a critical for children to develop confidence in all areas of life, such as through friends, schoolwork, and sports.

Here is some information on how children develop during middle childhood.

Emotional/Social Changes

Children in this age group might:

- Show more independence from parents and family.
- Start to think about the future.
- Understand more about his or her place in the world.
- Pay more attention to friendships and teamwork.
- Want to be liked and accepted by friends.

Thinking and Learning

Children in this age group might:

- Show rapid development of mental skills
- Learn better ways to describe experiences and talk about thoughts and feelings.
- Have less focus on one's self and more concern for other.

Positive Parenting Tips

Following are some things you, as a parent, can do to help your child during this time:

- Show affection for your child. Recognize her accomplishments.
- Help your child develop a sense of responsibility - ask him to help with housework tasks, such as setting the table.
- Talk with your child about school, friends, and things she looks forward to in the future.

- Talk with your child about respecting others. Encourage him to help people in need.
- Help your child set her own achievable goals - she'll learn to take pride in herself and rely less on approval or reward from others.
- Help your child learning patience by letting others go first or by finishing a task before going out to play. Encourage him to think about possible consequences before acting.
- Make clear rules and stick to them, such as how long your child can watch TV or when she has to go to bed. Be clear about what behavior is okay and what is not okay.
- Do fun things together as a family, such as playing games, reading, and going to events in your community.
- Get involved with your child's school. Meet the teachers and staff and get to understand their learning goals and how you and the school can work together to help your child do well.
- Continue reading to your child. As your child learns to read, take turns reading to each other.
- Use discipline to guide and protect your child, rather than punishment to make him feel bad about himself.
 Follow up any discussion about what not to do with a discussion of what to do instead.
- Praise your child for good behavior.
 It's best to focus praise more on what your child does ("you worked hard to figure this out") than on traits she can't change ("you are smart").
- Support your child in taking on new challenges. Encourage her to solve problems, such as a disagreement with another child, on her own.
- Encourage your child to join school and community groups, such as a team sports, or to take advantage of volunteer opportunities.

Child Safety First

More physical ability and more independence can put children at risk for injuries from falls and other accidents. Motor vehicle crashes are the most common cause of death from unintentional injury among children this age.

 Protect your child properly in the car. For detailed information, see the American Academy of Pediatrics' Car Safety Seats: A Guide for Families.

- Teach your child to watch out for traffic and how to be safe when walking to school, riding a bike, and playing outside.
- Make sure your child understands water safety, and always supervise her when she's swimming or playing near water.
- Supervise your child when he's engaged in risky activities, such as climbing.
- Talk with your child about how to ask for help when she needs it.
- Keep potentially harmful household products, tools, equipment, and firearms out of your child's reach.

Healthy Bodies

- Parents can help make schools healthier. Work with your child's school to limit access to foods and drinks with added sugar, solid fat, and salt that can be purchased outside the school lunch program.
- Make sure your child has 1 hour or more of physical activity each day.
- Limit screen time for your child to no more than 1 to 2 hours per day of quality programming, at home, school, or afterschool care.
- Practice healthy eating habits and physical activity early. Encourage active play, and be a role model by eating healthy at family mealtimes and having an active lifestyle.

A SCHOOL BUS STORY: WEST VALLEY BUS #88 ENJOYS RETIREMENT ACROSS THE ATLANTIC

Have you ever wondered what happens to a school bus once it retires?

West Valley Central School's Bus number 88 served the district well for 14 years, logging 115,493 miles transporting students across the rural countryside around West Valley, NY, a town of 561 residents in Cattaraugus County, about 40 miles from Buffalo.

Ruth Ann Courtney, who's been driving school buses for 29 years, claimed bus 88 as her own. "I wanted bus 88 because '8' is my lucky number," she shared. "I loved that bus and ended up driving it for six years. I cried when it went down the road for the last time."

Upon Bus 88's decommissioning in July of 2021, it was sold to Don Brown's Bus Sales in Johnstown, NY. Located near Albany, NY, Don Brown's sells and services new and pre-owned school buses, commercial buses, and shuttle buses. "We've sold buses all over the country and even the world," said Nick Tarbox, regional sales manager at Don Brown's. "Our buses have ended up on practically every continent. It's quite common for private individuals to purchase old buses and convert them into various applications to fit their lifestyle."

Bus 88 was found by one such private individual, Steve Rowe, from the country of England in the United Kingdom.

Steve and his wife, Joanne, have lived their entire lives in the quaint seaside town of Torquay in Devon, England. He works at a local hospital in the patient transport service, and she is a teacher's assistant at a school for special needs children.

The Bus 88 story began with Steve's long-time dream of converting an old school bus into an RV that his family could tour around the English Countryside.

"It's quite rare to see a school bus on an English street," Steve noted. "In England, children either walk to school, take public transport, or are driven by their parents. For us, a school bus is a very iconic thing. They turn a few heads when they go trundling down our small narrow streets over here."

Joanne wasn't immediately on board with the plan. "It took some time to convince her of the idea," said Steve. "After a few months of showing her pictures of converted school buses she eventually caught the vision."

After purchasing the bus, the Rowes had it shipped to England on a container vessel. Bus 88 rode the waves across the Atlantic and arrived on English shores at the Port of Southampton in November of 2021, where it was transported to London for servicing and registration. The bus made its final passage to Torquay and arrived at the Rowes' residence in December.

From the start, Steve was interested in learning more about the bus's back story. "It's been nice to find out where the bus was from and to learn a little bit of its history," shared Steve. He contacted West Valley Central School

via their Facebook page last summer, and began corresponding with Bryan Hansen, technology director and PR coordinator at the school. "When I received the message on Facebook, I wasn't sure if it was even real," Bryan commented, "but I took a chance and responded back, and it has led us to discovering the unique story of our old bus. Steve is a wonderful guy and I'm looking forward to the continued journey of Bus 88."

Steve plans on completing the bus renovation work himself, including the installation of a bedroom, kitchen, bathroom, living room, and even solar panels. So far, he's removed the seats from the bus, finding a small fortune in lunch money dropped by the children of West Valley over the years.
