

DISTRICT PLACES FINISHING TOUCHES ON \$3,875,000 CAPITAL PROJECT

SAFETY | SECURITY | NEW COMMUNITY PLAYGROUND | MAINTAIN FACILITY | IMPROVEMENTS

When the Board, administration and staff started to assess the need for a project during the 2019-20 school year they used the District's Building Condition Survey as a guide to identify areas and items that needed updates or improvements. The Building Condition Survey is a study performed by architects every five years as a way for the State Education Department to monitor and track the potential needs of school districts across the State. It provides the District a guide for items that need to be replaced, improved or fixed. Planning for the capital project was started last year but with COVID-19 and other changes it was placed on hold. In the last few months, the project has been activated once more.

Since the District has not done any substantial work to the buildings since 1999, there are a lot of items that need to be addressed. Like our own homes, after 21 years of letting things go, the list of items that need to be addressed has grown much longer. As you review the scope of the project, you will see that many of the items simply need upgrades and in some cases replacements. Lighting, flooring, roof, doors, lockers, sinks, heating units, ventilation and the fire alarm system are many of the items the project will address.

As the project started to take shape, it became abundantly clear that establishing a secure single point of entry was something the school was missing. Everyone felt strongly that changes were needed to improve District safety and security. These changes will require some remodeling inside and outside the building in order to establish a secure entrance for all students, staff, parents and visitors.

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WHAT'S HAPPENING IN PHYSICAL EDUCATION?

Students in grades 4-12 have had the opportunity to practice their archery skills in Physical Education class this semester. This is the first time West Valley has participated in an archery unit and many of the students have been thrilled and successful. Archery is an excellent individual activity that promotes a safe environment and allows students to develop new skills while working on developing math and other educational skills. Mrs. Lindberg has led the archery unit and is constantly finding new ways to challenge her students. She has placed different objects on the archery targets such as balloons and stickers and has given away countless prizes. Students have learned about archery safety, different parts of the bow as well as the archery scoring system.



Initially, another \$1,700,000 to \$2,000,000 worth of items were identified by architects on the Building Condition Survey and reported to the State as areas that require attention. When the Board started to review the list, they narrowed the scope to those things that needed the most immediate attention.

The District plans to bring the capital project before the voters on Tuesday, March 9, 2021.

Project Highlights (major items):

- > Remodel several science classrooms upgrading lab areas
- Construct a new playground
- > Remodel nurse's office
- ➤ Replace lockers and install ~130 new ones
- Reconfigure the general office areas to take better advantage of the space.
- Add a secure entrance canopy and vestibule between the original building and the gym.
- ➤ Replace some flooring (carpet and tile)
- ➤ Install new LED lighting in classrooms
- ➤ Remove existing ACT and replace ceilings and grid
- Fire Alarm System: add classroom strobes, replace wiring and power supplies
- Replace gym and auditorium lighting with energy efficient LED lights
- Remove and replace exhaust fan in kitchen
- > Replace classroom sinks (elementary)
- Provide ventilation for weight room
- Add air conditioning to library

Bus Garage

- > Replace entire roof
- Provide new insulated overhead doors

Beyond the costs associated with safety, security, as well as a new community playground, most of the project deals with general maintenance, upgrades and improvements. The Board has a responsibility to maintain the building for the benefit of the students and staff who are here every day. As nobody knows what the future holds, it is important to maintain the value and integrity of the building by keeping it up to date.

In the future, there will be several public meetings scheduled with Zoom capabilities also available. If you have questions about the project, please do not hesitate to call me at the school (716-942-3100).

The entire project will result in no increase in taxes as the Board will use money from the "Capital Reserve Fund" to cover the local share. A more detailed publication about the project will be sent out in February.

TARGETED SUPPORT PLAN APPROVED AT WEST VALLEY

Throughout the last several months and while continuing to provide in-person instruction, West Valley has been working with Erie 1 BOCES and the New York State Department of Education to develop a support plan towards improving our students' achievement and performance.

Support Plan

A comprehensive needs assessment with our facilitators from Erie 1 BOCES included a review of our school's data, instruction at the classroom (Tier 1), remediation (Tier 2), and special education levels (Tier 3). The needs assessment conducted also investigated our processes and procedures for monitoring and addressing student achievement.

In completing the needs assessment, we were able to identify our priorities and activities for the 2020-2021 School Year.

Determined Priorities and Activities

Instruction

- Establishing a Leadership Team and Coordination between the Leadership Team, K-6 General
- Education Faculty, K-6 Special Education Faculty, CABOCES Instructional Coaches and the Partnership
- ➤ Differentiated Professional Development to include: Explicit Instruction (EI), Specially Designed Instruction (SDI), IEP implementation
- ➤ Coaching in the use and implementation of instructional strategies
- ➤ Technical assistance for finding, selecting, and implementing evidence-based practices (EBP) to address instructional problems

Data-based decision-making

- ➤ Technical assistance for developing and implementing data and progress monitoring tools
- Professional development and coaching for implementation of data-based instructional decision-making
- Individual and group learning based on ongoing assessment and feedback

This Support Plan is complementary to our overall District Comprehensive Improvement Plan (DCIP) that will be submitted to NYSED for review later in the month. Our designation as a Targeted School for student performance in 3-8 ELA and Math in the student subgroup of Special Education requires that we work with multiple agencies. Therefore, the Support Plan developed with Erie 1 BOCES satisfies the Individuals with Disabilities Act (IDEA) portion of what we need to do. The DCIP will satisfy the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) part while Mrs. Gugino is working with the Special Education Quality Assurance department (SEQA) through NYSED to ensure effective processes and procedures within our Special Education Department.

We are excited to move forward with improving our students' performance and recognize that what we put into place now will form the foundations for future successes in the short term and successes that are sustainable.







Facts about COVID-19 vaccines

Vaccines (shots) are one of the tools we have to fight the COVID-19 pandemic.



To stop this pandemic, we need to use all of our prevention tools. Vaccines are one of the most effective tools to protect your health and prevent disease. Vaccines work with your body's natural defenses so **your body will be ready to fight the virus**, if you are exposed (also called immunity). Other steps, like wearing a mask that covers your nose and mouth and staying at least 6 feet away from other people you don't live with, also help stop the spread of COVID-19.

Studies show that COVID-19 **vaccines are very effective** at keeping you from getting COVID-19. Experts also think that getting a COVID-19 vaccine may help keep you from getting seriously ill even if you do get COVID-19. These vaccines cannot give you the disease itself.



The vaccines are safe. The U.S. vaccine safety system makes sure that all vaccines are as safe as possible. All the COVID-19 vaccines that are being used have gone through the same safety tests and meet the same standards as any other vaccines produced through the years. A system in place across the entire country that allows CDC to watch for safety issues and make sure the vaccines stay safe.



Different types of COVID-19 vaccines will be available.

Most of these vaccines are given in two shots, one at a time and spaced apart. The first shot gets your body ready. The second shot is given at least three weeks later to make sure you have full protection. If you are told you need two shots, make sure that you get both of them. The vaccines may work in slightly different ways, but all types of the vaccines will help protect you.

The vaccines may cause side effects in some people, like sore muscles, feeling tired, or mild fever. These reactions mean the vaccine is working to help teach your body how to fight COVID-19 if you are exposed. For most people, these side effects will last no longer than a day or two. Having these types of side effects does NOT mean that you have COVID-19. If you have questions about your health after your shot, call your doctor, nurse, or clinic. As with any medicine, it is rare but possible to have a serious reaction, such as not being able to breathe. It is very unlikely that this will happen, but if it does, call 911 or go to the nearest emergency room.



When you get the vaccine, you *and* your healthcare worker will both need to wear masks.

CDC recommends that during the pandemic, people wear a mask that covers their nose and mouth when in contact with others outside their household, when in healthcare facilities, and when receiving any vaccine, including a COVID-19 vaccine.



Even after you get your vaccine, you will need to keep wearing a mask that covers your nose **and** mouth, washing your hands often, and staying at least 6 feet away from other people you do not live with. This gives you and others the best protection from catching the virus. Right now, experts don't know how long the vaccine will protect you, so it's a good idea to continue following the guidelines from CDC and your health department. **We also know not everyone will be able to get vaccinated right away, so it's still important to protect yourself and others.**



FIFTH GRADERS LEARN TO CODE IN LIBRARY

The fifth grade students have started working on a coding unit in library. West Valley received a set of 10 Microbits (small codable microcomputers) from the Eisenhower Grant. As an introduction to the unit, the students practiced creating codes and downloading them to their Microbit. We have been discussing what data is, what types of data exist, and how to protect our data. As part of this unit, students will be learning how to code their Microbit into a sensor that will collect temperature data throughout the school. The students are developing 21st Century Skills and learning all while having fun and being creative.

Tech 8




NEW CONFERENCE ROOM
