Superintendent's Corner September 2018 Mr. Eric Lawton

Welcome back to the 2018-19 school year! We are looking forward to seeing all of the enthusiastic students returning to our school. It has been pretty quiet during the summer except for the sounds of cleaning and repairing and getting the school ready for another exciting year.

We have an updated code of conduct that we will be sharing with students and staff along with an adjusted school safety plan. Our bell schedule has been adjusted to allow more time for students to use their lockers during passing time. One other change this year is a grant that we received that will provide a free breakfast and lunch to every student at West Valley.

We have also had some staff changes over the summer. Ms. Butler retired and Mrs. Roland will be moving into her classroom. With Mrs. Martin moving to Clarence High School, we welcome Mrs. Budde to our English department. We also welcome Mr. Gelen who will be replacing Mr. Winchip in the physical education department and as our athletic director.

We are continuing with our technology plan. Students will have one to one technology. This means every student in grades 5-12 will have a lap top computer. We have Interactive Clear Touch boards in over 80% of the classrooms. We are converting to a new copy machine printing that will remove expensive classroom printers and go to more centrally located machines that will drastically decrease the cost per page for printing.

We still offer 56 college credits for our high school students. 53 of these credits will be taught by our teachers and one 3 credit course is available through distance learning. We are continuing with our clubs and afterschool activities including mentoring, girls on the right track, boys on the run, chess club, art club, NHS, NJHS, Student Council, ,Jr. Musical, Spanish Club, SADD, Academic Challenge, Tech. Ed Club, Lego League, K-3 Steam, Ski Club, Trap Club, Jazz Band, Marching Band, Library Club, and Safety Patrol. We continue to offer athletics through Ellicottville and Franklinville.

Our Board of Education held a community workshop on August 14th to allow members of the community to voice their opinions on the school and the future of our community. We will hold a follow-up workshop to provide answers to the questions posed. We will send out a flyer with the date for our next meeting.

I am looking forward to seeing you all in September, until then I wish you a safe, happy and healthy rest of the summer.

Welcome back students, parents, staff, and community members! It is with great excitement that we await the start of a new school year and another opportunity to help our students reach their highest potential and realize their dreams. I am looking forward to

students filling our hallways and classrooms on **Wednesday**, **September 5**th, our first student day. I am truly excited about this upcoming school year.

Throughout the summer, we have worked diligently to prepare for another successful school year. We have adjusted our student bell schedule to increase the amount of passing time between classes to three minutes from two minutes. This additional time will provide more time for teachers in the elementary to travel with students when they are changing classes. Additionally, this additional minute will allow 7-12 students additional time to utilize their lockers. In an effort to improve safety and student mobility, students in grades 7-12 will not be permitted to carry their book bags throughout the day.

For this school year we will continue to offer students a wide range of opportunities at all levels. Outside of the core requirements secondary students will have access to 56 college credit bearing classes, Career and Technical Education, and a variety of electives. Elementary students will continue to enjoy a well-rounded education that includes instruction in the Arts, Physical Education, Library, and Computers.

All of our extra-curricular activities seek to provide enrichment opportunities that are available to all of our students and build upon the learning that occurs during the regular school day. We will continue to have our Lego League program, Mentoring Program, Girls on the Run, Boys on the Right Track, Academic Challenge, SADD, Student Council, Trap Club, Athletics, and many more opportunities for students to participate in outside of the school day.

I am very excited about the opportunities for our students in the upcoming school year and we will continue to work with the school community to offer our current and future students nothing but the best. I look forward to seeing students, staff, parents, and community members at our Open House on September 12th (Elementary PK-6: 5:45-6:45pm, Secondary 7-12: 7:00-8:00pm). I hope that everyone has enjoyed their summer and I look forward to the 1st day of students on **Wednesday**, **September 5th**.

Julianna Noto, class of 2018, was selected to participate in the School of Visual Arts of the New York State Summer School of the Arts Program held at SUNY Fredonia. Julianna thoroughly enjoyed this experience and recommends that other students with a passion for art to apply.

The New York State Summer School of the Arts (NYSSSA), School of Visual Arts, is a 4-week residential arts program for high school students of New York State and is administered by the New York State Education Department. Under the artistic direction of Professor Yayoi Asoma, approximately ninety students with exceptional talent in the Visual Arts are selected each year through a rigorous statewide screening process to participate in the School of Visual Arts of the New York State Summer School of the Arts. This program is held at the State University of New York at Fredonia.

During this four-week summer program all students work intensively in two areas of study, including drawing & painting, landscape drawing & painting, figure studies, printmaking, sculpture studies, and mixed media and for a total of five hours daily, five days each week. In addition, students have the opportunity to work in open studios in the evenings during the four-week program. A number of visiting artists spend several days as artists-inresidence for the program. These artists present and discuss their work, critique student efforts, and involve students in creative group activities. Students are required to attend visiting artists' lecture/discussions, as well as lectures presented by members of the faculty, in addition to a field trip to the Albright Knox Art Gallery in Buffalo.

Part of the funding for this four week summer program came from the Elisa B. Hughey Scholarship for the Arts. The scholarship providers are willing to offer finances again to a West Valley high school student who is accepted into the NYSSSA Program. Anyone interested in this opportunity for the summer of 2019 please see Mr. LaBrake.

I had an opportunity to connect with Ms. Courtney Walters, West Valley graduate from 2014, and discuss how she started her career as a published writer. Courtney published her first work of literature in July 2018, *Human Frescoes*, a book of poetry.

How would you describe your book and where is it available?

"Human Frescoes is a small book of poetry, taking a look at different ways we perceive the people around us. I'm hoping that, despite the personal nature of the poems, the reader can still find themselves and the people in their lives between the words – and from that, can gain a new

understanding of the many layers that one person can hold. It is currently available on Amazon – in both paperback and eBook form."

What inspired you to write these poems?

"Poetry has always been cathartic for me. When looking at moving on from my abusive child-hood, finding myself as a queer Christian, and celebrating the fact that I can still have a heart of love after a major heartbreak... poetry seemed like the only way to do that. My roots at West Valley definitely inspired me to keep believing in myself, the teachers there were one of a kind. I was very blessed."

What advice do you have for other young adults who find themselves experiencing hardships?

"As cliché and cheesy as it sounds, never give up hope. And if you can't find that hope externally... create it yourself. Find something that you can make or do that brings you joy and a reason to keep getting up in the morning and wrestling with this beast called 'life'."

Courtney graduated from Houghton College in 2017 with a Bachelor degree in Communication and a minor in writing. She is currently substitute teaching and writing her first novel. She hopes to continue writing and become a journalist in the future.

FALL 2018 WESTERN NEW YORK COLLEGE CONSORTIUM OF HIGHER EDUCATION

On Thursday, October 4, 2018, in the Auditorium, from 10:00 am to 10:45 am, the Western New York Consortium of Higher Education (which consists of 20 colleges) will visit West Valley Central School. The colleges that will be in attendance are two and four-year, private or public institutions. The college representatives will talk with our students regarding future academic opportunities. This is an excellent chance for 10th - 12th grade students to either begin thinking about "higher" education (i.e. gathering lots of free materials and asking questions), or confirming their choices of what college they wish to attend next fall. The colleges attending are: Alfred State College, Alfred University, Bryant and Stratton College, Buffalo State College, Canisius College, Daemen College, D'Youville College, Erie Community College, Fredonia State College, Genesee Community College, Hilbert College, Houghton College, Jamestown Community College, Medaille College, Niagara County Community College, Niagara University, Saint Bonaventure University, Trocaire College, University at Buffalo, and Villa Maria College.

2018 PSAT/NMSQT REGISTRATION ANNOUNCEMENT

On Wednesday, October 10, 2018, our school will administer the PSAT/NMSQT (Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test/ National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test) for 10th and 11th graders. The cost per student is \$16.00, and checks are to be made payable to WEST VALLEY CENTRAL SCHOOL. The <u>deadline</u> to sign up and pay for the test is **Friday, October 5, 2018** in the Guidance Office. Even if your child is not considering college at this time, he or she should take this test. Just taking it can encourage a student to start thinking seriously about life after high school, goals, and the education necessary to reach those goals.

- It measures the reading, math, and writing skills needed for college (and for success in most jobs and careers in today's world). After the test, a score report will show the students' results in each of the sections. It will also target areas that need improvement before retaking/taking the PSAT/SAT standardized tests.
- This test gives students a chance to see how their skills compare with those of other students who will apply to college.
- For 11th graders only, it is the first step in entering the National Merit Scholarship Corporation competitions for scholarships and recognition.
- The Student Search Service gives PSAT/NMSQT test takers the option to voluntarily place their names and addresses in a pool of college-bound students interested in receiving admission and financial aid information from certified colleges, universities, and scholarship agencies.
- Lastly, it provides practice for the SAT exams, which most juniors take for the first time in the spring.

Please encourage your son or daughter to sign up for the PSAT/NMSQT. The time to start thinking about further education beyond high school is <u>now!</u>

The 20th Annual Financial Aid Night In OCTOBER!!!

Please attend the "20**th Annual Financial Aid Night"** at West Valley Central School. At 6:00 p.m. on Wednesday, October 17, 2018, in the cafeteria, Michelle Schram (Assistant Director of Financial Aid from Saint Bonaventure University) will provide information for 11th and 12th graders and their parents on the financial aid process including; completion of the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) forms, grants, scholarships, and various student and parent loans.

Financial aid is money that comes in many forms. It generally consists of a combination of grants (actual cash that you do not have to pay back), scholarships (actual cash awarded for academic achievement), and loans (must be paid back). These types of aid come from a variety of sources: the college itself, individual states, private donors, and the Federal Government (by far the largest source of aid). Once you've filled out the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) via the internet (http://www.fafsa.ed.gov/) colleges will extend to you the types of aid for which you are eligible.

Other "SAT Fee" information (i.e. SAT Subject Tests, scores by phone, extra score reports to a college, test center and date changes...etc.) is available at http://sat.collegeboard.org/register/sat-fees.

In order to register for the SAT Exam use the following website: www.sat.org/register. It is very important that when a student applies for the SAT's online that they write down all their passwords, and print a copy of the confirmation page (last page); this is the admission ticket for the day of the test. If a student has test modifications and/or thinks they qualify for a fee-waiver please see Mr. LaBrake before applying for the SAT's.

Select which scores you want to send to your score recipients on-line through the following website: http://sat.collegeboard.org/register/sat-score-choice. Score Choice gives you the option gives you the option to choose which scores (by test date for the SAT and by individual test for SAT Subject TestsTM) you send to colleges — in accordance with an institution's stated score-use practice. If you decide not to use Score Choice, all of your scores will be sent to your recipients. Students should still feel comfortable sending all scores, since most colleges consider a student's best score. (Continued on the following page...)

You must provide a photo with your registration, which will become part of your Admission Ticket. If you are not easily recognizable in your photo, you will not be admitted to the test center: http://sat.collegeboard.org/register/photo-requirements.

Any seniors interested in attending a college (**fall of 2019**) that requires the SAT's who have not tested, or wish to test again, should test either the **August 25th** or **October 6th**. Information about the SAT's are available in the Guidance Office. See Mr. LaBrake for assistance with registering for the SAT's.

ACT with Writing costs \$62.50 and the late fee is \$29.50. Students must check with individual colleges to see if they will accept the ACT "No Writing" exam for \$46.00. Other "ACT Fee" information (i.e. refunds, test center and date changes...etc.) is available at www.actstudent.org/regist/actfees.html. To register online for the ACT, go to www.actstudent.org.

No test centers are scheduled in New York for February 9th and July 13th of 2019.

You will need a credit card to register online. If a student has test modifications and/or thinks they might qualify for a fee-waiver see Mr. LaBrake before applying for the ACT's. As part of ACT's <u>test security requirements</u>, you must now provide a recent photo of yourself in order to complete your test registration. This photo will be used for identification and test security purposes. This photo will print on your ticket and on the score report that is automatically sent to your high school. Free Lunch and Breakfast for All Students

Beginning with the 2018-2019 through the 2021-2022 school year all West Valley students will be eligible for free lunch and breakfast regardless of income. This has been made possible through the Community Eligibility Program (CEP). CEP is a federal program that operates throughout the United States and is meant to provide opportunities for schools in areas that have higher rates of poverty. One goal of the CEP program is to increase participation in schools' lunch and breakfast programs. The District was notified by the New York State Education Department this past Spring that it was eligible to apply for the program.

As part of this program free and reduced applications will no longer be collected. However, the District will be collecting income information for programs such as the holiday baskets, warm the children, trading post programs, summer camps that participate in the child nutrition program, PSAT and advanced placement program fee waivers, GED program applications, and local education programs held at BOCES. Applications for these programs will be going out in the mail to parents.
