
March is also the beginning of budget season and we are putting together a budget that meets the needs of our students and is fiscally responsible to our taxpayers. Please come down to our board meetings and later to our budget hearing as we explain every line of the budget. Thanks to the efforts of Senator Cathy Young, we were able to get double the PILOT payment last year from the State for the Demonstration Project. Unfortunately that was not put into the governor's budget again this year so it was a one-time payment. We will use this money to keep our budget in check for the future.

As student return from their February break we are entering a critical point in the school year for their learning. With the exception of our March 22nd Superintendent's Conference Day and any snow days we will have 7 weeks of uninterrupted school days. This is the longest stretch in the school year without a break and an opportunity for students to have tremendous growth. During this time of the year we students in grades 3-8 will be preparing for the 3-8 assessments. The 3-8 Assessments for ELA will be administered on Tuesday, April 2nd and Wednesday, April 3rd with make-up days to follow. The state assessments will continue with the changes over the last few years including: unlimited time to complete, a reduction of questions, and a reduction of days from three to two. West Valley students will continue to take paper-based assessments but will be continuing to prepare for the requirement of implementing computer-based assessments.

We have seen growth in our 3-8 assessments over the last three years. Specifically in the Elementary we have gone from ranking 159 in 2016 to ranking 114 in 2018, moving ahead of 45 different schools. I believe that with all of our students participating and giving their best effort we will be able to show how our students are performing with respect to 3-8 assessments and continue our improvement. Regardless of state assessments, we continue to provide a well-rounded education that allows students to receive instruction and opportunities that contribute to a positive learning experience at West Valley that prepares them for success after graduation.

We are excited about the many opportunities throughout the month of March for our students. On March 1st 8th grade students will be participating in an afterschool team building activity at Holiday Valley Tubing Park. Our SADD club will be hosting a movie night on March 15th, Pre-K students will attend a performance at Shea's on March 19th, and students in grades 9-12 will attend Science Exploration Day at the University of Buffalo on March 20th. Additionally some of our Chorus and Band students will participate in their respective Junior/Senior High Festivals on March 15th/16th and March 22nd/23rd respectively. There are many other opportunities and learning experiences that will be happening for our students during the school day at West Valley. All of these experiences together help us to provide a broad education to our students that engages them and allows them opportunities to explore their interests for determining their future goals.

School District Tax Code Number

The New York State resident income tax returns (IT-200 and IT-201) require you to enter the name and code number of the public school district where you were a resident as of December 31 for the tax year 2018. The school district name and code for entry on state income tax forms are: West Valley Central School District code is 690. It is important to put this number on your tax return because it helps determine the amount of State Aid we receive for the school district.

In Mr. Kenworthy's SUPA Personal Finance class, each student was given \$50,000 in play money to invest in stocks starting on November 20, 2018. Every student was to pick 5 to 10 stocks with one guideline: Buy low, sell high! Although grades were based on record-keeping and not the amount of money each student lost or made, there was a competitive nature to the project. Students were required to tally their stocks each week. The final tally was conducted on January 15, and the two winners were Delaney Neuman and Becca Smith, with money totals of \$50,554 and \$50,352 respectively. Over this time period, there was a major correction in the market which caused most students to lose money. It's amazing that both young investors were able to come out ahead given market conditions!

The students in Pre-K – 5^{th} grade had a great time at the Elementary Fun Night sponsored by the PTO. Students had the opportunity to participate in activities throughout the school.
