Superintendent's Corner May 2019 Mr. Eric Lawton

In the Board of education meetings we have heard complaints about the high tax levy in West Valley. We have been working on maintaining or reducing the tax levy for the past 7 years. In the 2013-14 school year the tax on true value rate was \$23.83 per thousand. If our budget passes as proposed, the tax rate next year will be \$18.87 per thousand. This is a decrease of almost \$5.00 per thousand. Our goal is to set a rate that we can maintain. We do not want to lower the rate too much and then have to raise it next year.

Community Day is a major event in the beginning of May. On May 10th our students and staff will be participating in a community beautification program. We will be working around the school and community. We will be picking up debris and garbage around the highways and throughout the town. We will be cleaning, painting, and helping our neighbors with their projects. This has been a valuable experience for students and staff to be working side by side for the bet-terment of our community.

On May 13th we will be presenting the 2019-20 West Valley School Budget at the annual budget hearing in the auditorium at 7:00 PM. On May 21st we will hold the vote on the Budget, school bus purchases and election of one Board of Education Member. The election will be open for voters from noon until 9:00 PM. in our gymnasium. We will have official registrars located at the WVCS athletic entrance as we found this to have easier access for our community members. Please take the opportunity to have your voice heard and vote.

Principal's Corner May 2019 Mr. Daniel Amodeo

On April 16th our Board of Education adopted a budget for the 2019-2020 school year. As the school budget directly supports the academic program at West Valley, I would like to take this opportunity to share highlights of our academic program for the 2019-2020 school year.

• Maintain current college courses: SUPA Biology (8 credits), SUPA Chemistry (8 credits), SUPA Economics (3 credits), SUPA Cybersecurity (3 credits), Houghton English (6 credits), Psychology (3 credits), GCC Physics (4 credits), JCC Elementary Statistics (3 credits), JCC Pre-Calculus (4 credits), JCC Calculus (8 credits), SUPA U.S. History (6 credits).

• The number of college course credits available to students in their Junior and Senior year is equivalent to 56 credits, or almost two years of college credits. This is a great financial benefit to our students and families. Although NYS has budgeted for free college tuition to SUNY schools there are strings attached that may not allow all students to access this opportunity and our program continues to provide an avenue to make college a more affordable option for all students.

• NYS Mandated Mental Health Education for students in grades K-12.

• Maintain state required and recommended contact time for Elementary electives including PE every day for grades K-3, twenty weeks of art, twenty weeks of music, library and computer instruction.

• Lego League Robotics and Elementary STEAM club (K-3).

• Girls on The Run and Boys on the Right Track after-school programs.

• Positive Behavior Intervention and Supports (PBIS) a school wide behavior, social skills, and character education program.

• Response to Intervention (RtI) in grades K-6 and an Instructional Support Team for grades 7-12.

• Special Education Programs to include a 12:1:1 (K-2), 12:1:1 (3-5), Elementary Consultant Teacher and Resource Room program, and Secondary Consultant Teacher and Resource Room program.

In addition to the program highlights above, there are many other initiatives, extra-curricular programs and curriculum based opportunities that we will be continuing and looking to improve. On behalf of the students and staff, I would like to thank the West Valley community for its continued support of our program. With your support, we are able to continue to provide West Valley students with a well-rounded education that prepares them to be productive members of society with 21st century skills.

ANNUAL BUDGET HEARING

Monday, May 13, 2019 WVCS Auditorium 7:00 pm

ANNUAL BUDGET, VEHICLE and BOARD MEMBER VOTE

The budget vote, vehicle purchases and election will be held on **Tuesday**, **May 21, 2019 from noon until 9pm** in the **WVCS GYMNASIUM**.

The district will rent the electronic voting machines from Cattaraugus County.

There is one seat open for election to the Board of Education. The seat is currently held by George Kazmierczak, is a 5-year vacancy resulting from the term expiration on June 30, 2019.

To be a qualified, board candidate:

* A citizen of the United States;

* Eighteen (18) years of age or older;

* Able to read and write;

* A legal resident of the District for a continuous and uninterrupted period of at least one (1) year prior to the election;

* Cannot be an employee of the West Valley Central School District;

* The only member of his/her family (that is, cannot be a member of the same household) on the West Valley Central School District Board;

* May not simultaneously hold another incompatible public office, including, but not limited to Superintendent, clerk, tax collector, treasurer or librarian, or an employee of the Board.

* In union free and central school districts, however, a Board member may be appointed clerk of the Board and of the District.

* Must not have been removed from a school district office within one (1) year preceding the date of appointment or election to the Board.

Absentee Ballots

West Valley Central School District is required by law to make absentee ballots available to qualified voters for the May 21st Annual Budget Vote, School Vehicles Vote and Board of Education Election. Call Carolyn Boberg, District Clerk at 942-3100 ext. 4102 for an application or if you have any questions.

An individual who is unable to appear to vote in person on the day of the school district election may submit an application for an absentee ballot. Such person is eligible to vote by absentee ballot if he or she is, or will be: (a) a patient in a hospital, or unable to appear personally at the polling place on such day because of illness or physical disability or (b) because his duties, occupation, business or studies will require him to be outside of the county or city of his residence on such day, (c) because he will be on vacation outside the county or city of his residence on such day; or, (d) absent from his voting residence because he is detained in jail awaiting action by a grand jury or awaiting trial or is confined in prison after conviction for an offense other than a felony.

The district clerk must receive the <u>application</u> for absentee ballots at least seven days before the election (if the ballots need to be mailed to the voter). Completed absentee ballots accepted until 5pm on May 21^{st} , in the District Office.

VOTER REGISTRATION

Voter registration will be held in the district office on May 9th from 3pm - 7pm.

Please bring personal identification with you to register to vote.

<u>If you are not registered, you may not cast a ballot.</u> Please take the time to register. If you are in doubt, you may call the District Clerk, Carolyn Boberg at 942-3100 ext. 4102 to determine your status.

To be qualified to vote, you must be:

(1) A citizen of the United States;

(2) Eighteen (18) years of age or older;

(3) A resident within the District for a period of thirty (30) days preceding the next meeting at which he/ she offers to vote,


(4) A registered voter with the school or the county. A college student whose legal residence is in the school district is eligible to vote.

School District Tax Code Number

The New York State resident income tax returns (IT-200 and IT-201) require you to enter the name and code number of the public school district where you were a resident as of December 31 for the tax year 2018. The school district name and code for entry on state income tax forms are: West Valley Central School District code is 690. It is important to put this number on your tax return because it helps determine the amount of State Aid we receive for the school district.



tion and answer portion during the event. Students from all over the world had the opportunity to ask Dr. Goodall and her team questions. Our students enjoyed this awesome opportunity.






