Dedication of the Hamden High School Stadium in honor of Coach Carbone:

Honoring the man who guided all of us through the roughest transitional years of our lives is but a small step to give back the love that he gave us.

I played at HHS from the fall of '88 to Thanksgiving '91

Support for naming the stadium:

Coach ran the football program as an extension of family. He was most often the most intelligent person in whatever room he was in. Although Coach occasionally “flexed” his extensive vocabulary, his genius was in reaching everyone in a way that made people from all the neighborhoods of Hamden feel the tie of family and that we could run through a brick wall to bring pride to our teams. Coach did this with exceptionally clear directives and made the bond of sweat the sole unifier in my era. Nobody worked harder or gave more to the people of Hamden than Coach Carbone. Naming the stadium after him is a magnificent idea.

Fond memory/lesson learned: Narrowing this is a challenge. In a way, walking the track with him during PhysEd where he would make the complicated seem simple. He could make any opponent seem beatable and always did so by adhering to fundamentals and effort.

To really nail the strongest lesson learned, I think of the collective passion with which he taught us and inspired us to play. Coach Carbone could use the tone of his voice to direct an entire room of men to believe in the task at hand. He did this without foul language. Coach taught us that each of us had greatness in us and that we had to dive into every drill with the same intensity in order to tap into the individual and team greatness. My favorite phrase that embodied the collective goal was: you have to play with an indomitable spirit and esprit de corps. Although the fall of '91 team ended with a 4-4-1 (yes, we were the 14-14 tie with ND), our team definitely took the field with that spirit. Under Coach's guidance, we were extremely hard to score upon and seemed to always have a defender in good posture to stop the plays the opposition did best. I have translated this lesson in preparation and effort leading to success to every facet of my life.

A message to Coach:

Thirty-two years after leaving HHS, the voice in my head driving me to dot my last i, or cross my last t, comes from your inspirational coaching that drives me to try to be my best at everything that I do. Your lessons have made my family a stronger family, and they've never met you. Having coached at North Haven High School with Anthony Sagnella for the past twenty-eight years, I can say that you have coached our student body, in a way. Every time our players study film and work on getting their hips in good posture, they are playing in the type of program you taught us in. I wish they all could hear your voice change octaves, indicating something was of paramount importance! I've applied the character you developed in me during tough medical times, relationship hardships and some down football years. I was beyond lucky to have met you at fourteen and to have every lesson my parents had taught me get reinforced through playing for you at Hamden. My parents thank you for your role in my life as well. In every tough situation, I apply a couple of simple rules you taught me: keep the answer simple, repeat the task to perfection, and do it with all my heart.

Coach- thank you for guiding me to realize the correct path in life and in football. I cherish every conversation we've ever had and will love and pray for you as long as I live.

I was profoundly struck by his compassion and was left asking, how many people has *Coach* touched throughout his storied career? My name is Bob Sweeney. I played football under Coach Ron Carbone from 1980 to 1982. I am writing this letter in support of the re-naming of Hamden High Stadium in honor of Coach Carbone.

I played for Coach Carbone during a pivotal time in my life. I was the son of an alcoholic father, and my strong mother had divorced him to protect my three siblings and me from the effects of this disease. At 16, I didn't fully grasp the impact of alcoholism, but I was deeply affected by the situation. Sports have always been a significant part of my life. I was a big kid and naturally gravitated toward football. Before high school, I would attend Hamden High games and dream of one day becoming a Green Dragon. It was a thrilling moment for me when I finally made the team.

Looking back, it might have been one of the most important days of my life. This was the day that I began being mentored by Coach Carbone. Coach Carbone quickly instilled so many values within me. To this day, the most important thing is that with commitment and discipline, anything can be accomplished. We would work so hard, both physically and mentally, to do our best individually and, more importantly, as a team. But more notably, he taught me that this was not only true on the gridiron but in real life as well. He taught me about integrity. He taught me how to win. He taught me how to lose. He taught me how to find the reasons why the outcome did not turn out the way I wanted and how to be disciplined and persevere to change that outcome.

After graduating high school, I decided to forgo college and start my own business in the construction/excavation industry. I married my high school sweetheart, and we started a family. The business I started is now a \$20 million business that employs over 80 people. My high school sweetheart and I remain happily married after raising our three wonderful children, and we are now thoroughly enjoying the blessings of four beautiful grandchildren. We are truly blessed!

Over the years, I have been questioned many times and what I attribute the success of my business to. My response will always include that when I was a 16-year-old kid floating rudderless in the ocean, I was blessed to find an amazing mentor in my high school football coach Ron Carbone. I could've gone in so many directions at that young age, but I was blessed by becoming a Green Dragon football player and being mentored by Ron Carbone. Coach Carbone was instrumental in helping that boy become a man. Helping this man become a good husband. Helping this man become a good father and grandfather. I have called on his teachings throughout my life both personally and professionally. I know my story is not unique. I am still very close with many of my high school teammates, and we still share similar stories about the extraordinary impact that Coach Carbone has had on all our lives. I know for a fact that my life would not have turned out as blessed if not for my three years of being taught and mentored by Coach Carbone.

Coach Ron Carbone has always been a humble man. It is not unusual for conversations with my previous teammates to question why such an amazing man, who has profoundly affected so many lives in such a positive way, has not been showered with awards and proclamations for all that he has accomplished. His accomplishments as a football coach are legendary. The statistics support these facts. From his days coaching at Derby through his time at Hamden Hall. I support the effort to name the Hamden High School sports stadium in honor of Coach Carbone. I graduated from Hamden High in 1980 and played varsity football under Coach Carbone for three years. I could write a book of stories about those seasons, filled as they were with blood, sweat, tears, laughs, travails and triumphs, starting each year with grueling triple session workouts and ending with the Green Bowl. I suspect that many of my contemporaries would also have hours of tales to tell, and many of the stories, if not all of them, would feature Coach Carbone.

Coach Carbone was a severe taskmaster. He pushed us and pushed us hard. Practices were long and there was always a lot of contact in those days. Coach Carbone’s assistants were, as you know, loudly vocal about their criticisms of our efforts when we fell short and would occasionally punctuate their critiques with a physical reminder that anything less than 100% would not fly. Coach Carbone’s approach was more psychological. A small shake of the head, or a curse under his breath, were more devastating than a forearm shiver to the head. It’s more important to remember, though, that all the yelling and the contact and criticisms were not gratuitous; they were intended to make us as good as we could be – to drive us to a level where maybe we could not get on our own.

For Coach Carbone, football was more than a game. It was a crucible that tested you in ways that life would mimic. He would often implore us not to leave any regrets on the field. In other words, muster all your ability, play full out and “empty your tank,” as he liked to say. If we did that, even if we fell short, there would be no recriminations. I know that he believed that he was not teaching us a football lesson. He believed he was teaching us a life lesson that we could carry with us in all our endeavors, one that would prove most valuable when we were most challenged.

I hope that your efforts to have the stadium named after Coach Carbone are successful. It would be a fitting honor for a man who gave so much of himself to so many young men who played the game.

Coach Carbone always put his players well-being first. I recall my senior year in 1979, I suffered a broken hand injury in the second to last game of the season. I had a cast placed on my hand and was given the begrudging approval of the physician to play in the last game against Notre Dame. Coach Carbone recognized I could have suffered greater injury to my hand if I played which could jeopardize my future playing college football. He understood what was at stake, and although it was an important game against an arch rival, the well-being of a player was more important to him than winning a football game. He made the tough but correct decision to keep me out of the game.

Coach Carbone supported my brothers and I in many ways, but his help in promoting my brother Doug and I to the UConn Football Staff helped us both obtain football scholarships. We both went on to play at UConn for four years each, earning All-Conference and Captaincy honors.

As many are aware, Coach Carbone is a member of the Connecticut High School Coaches Hall of Fame and well respected throughout the state and beyond. He is a gentleman and a teacher who taught his players the game of football to help them win in the game of life. My family and I fully support naming the Hamden High School Stadium after Coach Carbone. It is a fitting honor to a man who has dedicated his life to so many people in Hamden. Future generations of Hamden High School football players who play on this field will come to know and understand the profound impact Coach Carbone had on so many players.
