## **WALK TO READ**

We are so proud to share that our new Walk to Read program has begun with tremendous success. This is following last year's efforts to dive deeply into learning about how the brain learns to read. Sauquoit Valley has had the opportunity to work with the Reading League for several years and we are happy to be applying the best practices we have acquired.



All eight sections of our K-2 classes, and seven sections of grades 3-4, are now participating in small group reading instruction, which allows us to tailor the lessons to each student's specific needs. If you are a parent with a child in our elementary school, you have likely seen the parent reports from our DIBELS assessments.

We are working in teams to analyze these assessments to determine the needs of each group.



During the 40-minute sessions, we're focusing on systematic instruction that covers oral reading fluency, phonemic awareness, sound drills, chaining, spelling



sound-out words, and dictation of words and sentences. Students are enjoying the targeted support and their success. Ask your child about these things – we hope they are excited to share! Our teachers are enjoying the opportunity to witness growth with their reading fluency each week.



## ADOPT A COW PROGRAM




Mrs. Mancino's third grade classroom is participating in the Adopt a Cow Program and has adopted a live calf growing up on a dairy farm in Cortland!





#### SECOND GRADE FIELD TRIP TO CLAYVILLE LIBRARY

"When we give children advice or instant solutions, we deprive them of the experience that comes from wrestling with their own problems."

Here's a little thought experiment. Think about raising your children not for when they are four or seven or thirteen. Imagine that they are now eighteen years old and leaving the house to go out into the world. What does their skillset look like? Can they handle it when things don't go their way? Can they confidently communicate their wants and needs to others? Advocate for themselves? Can they do their own laundry? Cook basic meals? Can they problem solve in different situations? Can they manage their money effectively?

We have a (semi) controlled environment with our children for those first eighteen years. Consider adding more responsibilities and challenges a little bit at a time so that when they leave your house for the real world, you are confident that you have prepared them as much as possible.

#### Here are just a few examples:

- Have them order for themselves when you are out to eat. Practice what you want them to do ahead of time.
   Ex: 1) Look right at the person. 2) Speak slowly, clearly, and confidently.
- Have them pick out a meal/dish and help you cook/prepare it. When they tell you that they are bored, say something to the effect of,
  "That's okay. It's good to be bored sometimes." This teaches them to tolerate minor discomfort.
- Consider using an allowance program that helps them to manage their money. (We will be providing much more detailed information on an excellent allowance program in the next News & Views).

Is your child struggling with anxiety? Middle Schoolers face unique challenges that can contribute to an increase in anxiety. Middle school is a time of shifting friendships and pressures to fit in. Concerns about making friends, dealing with peer pressure, and facing potential bullying can be big sources of stress. The workload in middle school often increases, with more difficult subject matter and higher expectations for performance. The fear of falling behind or not meeting expectations can be overwhelming. This is a time of significant physical, social and cognitive changes. These changes can affect self-esteem and contribute to feelings of insecurity.

#### Tips for parents to help support an anxious student:

- Set achievable goals for your child. Focus on them doing their best rather than striving for perfection. Help them break down big tasks into smaller, manageable steps.
- Establish a daily routine. Plan your child's morning routine and evening activities to include time for homework, dinner, and a wind-down before bed. A consistent routine helps reduce chaos, uncertainty, and self-doubt.
- Get them organized. Planners or digital tools can help your child to keep track of assignments, tests, and extracurricular activities.
- Do they have someone they trust to share concerns and feelings with? It could be a teacher, counselor or friend. Talk to your child about how they let out their feelings. Anxiety and worry only grow bigger when we try to cover it up.
- Focus on the positives. Remind your child of the things they enjoy about school, such as seeing friends, participating in favorite classes, or
  joining clubs. Keeping a positive mindset can help reduce anxious thoughts.
- Maintain good school attendance. Frequent absences from school can increase feelings of anxiety towards school.


## FREEDOM WRITERS VISIT




# SOCIAL AND EMOTIONAL HEALTH REMAINS A PRIORITY

## SAUQUOIT VALLEY HIGH SCHOOL NAMED TO ADVANCED PLACEMENT SCHOOL HONOR ROLL

College Board recently announced that Sauquoit Valley High School has been named to the 2024 Advanced Placement Program (AP) School Honor Roll, earning Silver distinction.

The AP School Honor Roll recognizes schools whose AP programs are delivering results for students while broadening access. Schools can earn this recognition annually based on criteria that reflect a commitment to increasing academic culture, providing opportunities for students to earn college credit and maximizing college and career readiness.

#### Sauguoit Valley High School had:

**51%** 

of students in the class of 2024 who took at least one AP Exam during high school

**31%** 

of students in the class of 2024 scoring a 3 or higher on at least one AP Exam

14%

of students in the class of 2024 who took five or more AP Exams

"AP gives students opportunity to engage with collegelevel work, to earn college credit and placement, and to potentially boost their grade point averages," said Trevor Packer, head of the AP program. "The schools that have earned this distinction are proof that it is possible to expand access to these college-level courses and still drive strong performance – they represent the best of AP."

Sauquoit Valley High School currently offers seven AP courses as well as fourteen additional courses that grant college credit.

"This recognition is a testament to the hard work that our students and teachers engage in on a daily basis," said Brian Read, principal of Sauquoit Valley High School and director of Instructional Services for the Sauquoit Valley Central School District. "Teachers and counselors are encouraging students to challenge themselves with rigorous coursework. Students are embracing the challenge and learning invaluable skills along the way. We remain committed to fostering a strong academic culture that prepares our students for their postsecondary pursuits."

College Board's Advanced Placement Program (AP) enables students to pursue college-level studies – with the opportunity to earn college credit, advanced placement or both – while still in high school. Each AP course culminates in a challenging exam and requires students to think critically, construct solid arguments and see many sides of an issue – skills that prepare them for college and beyond.

October's Focus of the Month:

self Awareness

For the month of October, the high school focused on Self-Awareness, a social and emotional competency that is defined as having knowledge of one's character, feelings, motives, and desires. People who are self-aware have the ability to reflect and recognize patterns in their thoughts and behaviors. Some examples include:


- Noticing that you are tensing up before giving a presentation
   Acknowledging your feelings regarding a situation that you do not morally agree with
  - Deciding to apologize when you have acted out of character

Student's were provided with tools and resources to increase their self-awareness and were also asked to complete a brief survey identifying their current level of self awareness and how they can improve during the month.


- · Students in need of extra attention will have access to tutoring sessions (math & reading) provided by certified teachers.
