Hamilton Unified School District And Hamilton City Fire Protection District Fire Protection Agreement June 29, 2015

History:

On June 18, 2015, I met with Chief James and Assistant Chief Irick regarding the placement of a 40X48 portable classroom at Hamilton High School that will be used for instructional purposes. Chief James informed me of a long standing issue with fire suppression on the campus that has been brought up to prior administration at HHS.

At issue are the inadequate fire standards (Hydrants) on campus. Currently the only hydrant on the campus that is actively fed by community water is located outside of the cafeteria. This fire standard is inadequately supplied due to only having one large water line (approximately 8 inches). Each fire hydrant normally has two sources of water supplying it to insure that during demand brought on by a fire engine pumping water, the supply pump does not collapse. With only one supply line, this could happen quickly rendering the only source of water ineffective for fire suppression.

There are two other older four inch fire suppression pipes near the administration building and the gym that are fed off of our irrigation well. Because this pump is electric and may fail during a fire or be damage, this source is inadequate.

Agreement:

The Fire Protection District has agreed to allow HUSD to place the 40x48 building on the HHS campus providing that we agree to two conditions:

Hamilton Unified School District agrees to provide the following:

- 1. Budget for and place a secondary water source to the current hydrant within the next five years, providing budget allows for such looping of the water main. Current estimates (roughly) are at one hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$150,000)
- 2. Agree that no additional buildings will be added to HHS until the fire suppression system has been upgraded.

Hamilton City Fire Protection District agrees to the following conditions:

- 1. Allow HUSD to place the 40X48 Classroom on the HHS campus and clear fire protection requirements for the Office of Public School Construction (OPSC).
- 2. Provide a rout map and design for the placement of the secondary water source for the hydrant
- 3. Allow, if needed additional portables be place behind Ella Barkley High School, if and when the need arises. (This was agreed upon due to a properly looped fire hydrant on the corner of the HUSD property by Ella Barkley High School)

Hamilton Unified School District And Hamilton City Fire Protection District Fire Protection Agreement June 29, 2015

History:

On June 18, 2015, I met with Chief James and Assistant Chief Irick regarding the placement of a 40X48 portable classroom at Hamilton High School that will be used for instructional purposes. Chief James informed me of a long standing issue with fire suppression on the campus that has been brought up to prior administration at HHS.

At issue are the inadequate fire standards (Hydrants) on campus. Currently the only hydrant on the campus that is actively fed by community water is located outside of the cafeteria. This fire standard is inadequately supplied due to only having one large water line (approximately 8 inches). Each fire hydrant normally has two sources of water supplying it to insure that during demand brought on by a fire engine pumping water, the supply pump does not collapse. With only one supply line, this could happen quickly rendering the only source of water ineffective for fire suppression.

There are two other older four inch fire suppression pipes near the administration building and the gym that are fed off of our irrigation well. Because this pump is electric and may fail during a fire or be damage, this source is inadequate.

Agreement:

The Fire Protection District has agreed to allow HUSD to place the 40x48 building on the HHS campus providing that we agree to two conditions:

Hamilton Unified School District agrees to provide the following:

- 1. Budget for and place a secondary water source to the current hydrant within the next five years, providing budget allows for such looping of the water main. Current estimates (roughly) are at one hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$150,000)
- 2. Agree that no additional buildings will be added to HHS until the fire suppression system has been upgraded.

Hamilton City Fire Protection District agrees to the following conditions:

- 1. Allow HUSD to place the 40X48 Classroom on the HHS campus and clear fire protection requirements for the Office of Public School Construction (OPSC).
- 2. Provide a rout map and design for the placement of the secondary water source for the hydrant
- 3. Allow, if needed additional portables be place behind Ella Barkley High School, if and when the need arises. (This was agreed upon due to a properly looped fire hydrant on the corner of the HUSD property by Ella Barkley High School)
