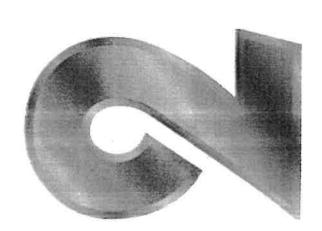

Hamilton Unified School District

Promulgation

The School Emergency Operations Plan addresses the Hamilton Unified School District's responsibilities in emergencies associated with natural disaster, human-caused emergencies, and technological incidents. It provides a framework for coordination of response and recovery efforts within the district in coordination and with the county of Glenn, California. The Plan establishes an emergency organization to direct and control operations at the school site during a period of emergency by assigning responsibilities to specific personnel. The School Emergency

Operations Plan:

Conforms to the National Incident Management System (NIMS), the Standardized Emergency Management System (SEMS), and effectively restructures emergency response at all levels in compliance with the Incident Command System (ICS).

- Establishes response policies and procedures, providing HUSD school sites clear guidance for planning purposes.
- Describes and details procedural steps necessary to protect lives and property.
- Outlines coordination requirements.
- Provides a basis for training and response exercises to ensure compliance.

Requirements

The Plan meets the requirements of the State of California and the County of Glenn policies on Emergency Response and Planning, the National Incident Management System (NIMS), the Standardized Emergency Management System (SEMS), and defines the primary and support roles of the individual schools in after-incident damage assessment and reporting requirements.

Hamilton Unified School District

Purpose

The Purpose of the School Emergency Operations Plan is to protect the safety and welfare of the employees, visitors, volunteers, and students in the Hamilton Unified School District, and to ensure the preservation of public property.

Scope

The Scope encompasses all Hamilton Unified School District site and district facilities. It addresses a broad range of major emergencies. Such events include crimes committed on campus, hazardous materials emergencies, weather emergencies, and fire. Also included are procedures for emergencies that may or may not require the full or partial activation of the School Emergency Response Team (SERT).

Note: HUSD recognizes that due to the limitations of staffing, certain roles and response committees may need to be established as the emergency unfolds. Staff will be trained in the ICS system roles on a bi-annual basis.

The objectives of the plan are to:

- Protect the safety and welfare of students, employees, and staff.
- Provide for a safe and coordinated response to emergencies.
- Protect the School's facilities and properties.
- Enable the School to restore normal conditions with minimal confusion in the shortest time possible.
- Provide for interface and coordination between the school, District, City, and/or County Emergency Operation Center (EOC).

Schools are required by both federal statute and state regulation to be available for shelters following a disaster. The American Red Cross (ARC) has access to schools in damaged areas to set up their mass care facilities and local governments have a right to use schools for the same purposes. This requires close cooperation between school officials and ARC or local government representatives and should be planned and arranged for in advance.

Responsibility

School administrators have the responsibility to ensure the safety of their students and staff in an emergency. Law requires developing emergency plans and training staff in all-hazards emergency response procedures.

The principles of NIMS, SEMS and ICS are incorporated in this plan and school personnel must be trained in how the system works. All Hamilton Unified School District sites must also have drills and exercises in order to practice using the system. Periodic training will be available to help orient new employees and provide refresher training to current employees on an annual basis.

Remuneration, Reimbursement And Other Benefits

BB 9250

Board Bylaws

Compensation

Each member of the Governing Board may receive the maximum monthly compensation as provided for in Education Code 35120.

On an annual basis, the Board may increase the compensation of Board members beyond the limit delineated in Education Code 35120 in an amount not to exceed five percent based on the present monthly rate of compensation. (Education Code 35120)

Board members are not required to accept payment for meetings attended.

Any member who does not attend all Board meetings during the month is eligible to receive only a percentage of the monthly compensation equal to the percentage of meetings he/she attended, unless otherwise authorized by the Board in accordance with law. (Education Code 35120)

A member may be compensated for meetings he/she missed when the Board, by resolution, finds that he/she was performing designated services for the district at the time of the meeting or that he/she was absent because of illness, jury duty, or a hardship deemed acceptable by the Board. (Education Code 35120)

Student Board members shall receive no compensation for meetings attended. (Education Code 35012)

(cf. 9150 - Student Board Members)

Whenever a quorum of Board members serves as another legislative body which will meet simultaneously or in serial order to a Board meeting, the Board elerk or a member of the Board shall verbally announce the amount of any additional compensation or stipend that each member will be entitled to receive as a result of convening the simultaneous or serial meeting. (Government Code 54952.3)

Reimbursement of Expenses

Board members shall be reimbursed for actual and necessary expenses incurred when performing authorized services for the district. Expenses for travel, telephone, business meals, or other authorized purposes shall be in accordance with policies established for district personnel and at the same rate of reimbursement.

(cf. 1160 - Political Processes) (cf. 3100 - Budget)

(cf. 3350 - Travel Expenses)

(cf. 3513.1 - Cellular Phone Reimbursement)

Board members shall be reimbursed for travel expenses incurred when performing services directed by the Board. (Education Code 35044)

(cf. 9240 - Board Development)

Authorized purposes may include, but are not limited to, attendance at educational seminars or conferences designed to improve Board members' skills and knowledge; participation in regional, state, or national organizations whose activities affect the district's interests; attendance at district or community events; and meetings with state or federal officials on issues of community concern.

Personal expenses shall be the responsibility of individual Board members. Personal expenses include, but are not limited to, the personal portion of any trip, tips or gratuities, alcohol, entertainment, laundry, expenses of any family member who is accompanying the Board member on district-related business, personal use of an automobile, and personal losses and traffic violation fees incurred while on district business.

Any questions regarding the propriety of a particular type of expense should be resolved by the Superintendent or designee before the expense is incurred.

Board members may use district-issued credit cards while on official district business and consistent with the limits established for district personnel. Personal expenses shall not be charged on a district-issued credit card, even if the Board member intends to subsequently reimburse the district for the personal charges.

Health and Welfare Benefits for Current Board Members

Board members may participate, at their own expense, in the health and welfare benefits program provided for district employees.

(cf. 4154/4254/4354 - Health and Welfare Benefits)

Health and welfare benefits for Board members shall be no greater than that received by the district's nonsafety employees with the most generous schedule of benefits. (Government Code 53208.5)

The district shall pay the premiums required for Board members electing to participate in the district health and welfare benefits program to the same extent that it pays for district employees.

Health and welfare benefits provided will be made available to Board members, at their

expense, shall be extended at the same level to their spouse/registered domestic partner and to their eligible dependent children as specified in law and the health plan.

Health and Welfare Benefits for Former Board Members

Former Board members may participate in the health and welfare benefits program provided for district employees under the conditions specified below.

Health and welfare benefits for former Board members shall be no greater than those received by district nonsafety employees with the most generous schedule of benefits. (Government Code 53208.5)

Any former Board member leaving the Board after at least one term of office may participate in the health and welfare benefits program at his/her own expense if coverage is in effect at the time of retirement. (Government Code 53201)

Health and welfare benefits provided to a former Board member shall be extended, at his/her expense and at the same level, to his/her spouse/registered domestic partner and eligible dependent children as specified in law and the health plan.

BP/AR 0420 = School Plans/Site Councils (BP/AR revised)

Policy updated to reflect NEW LAW (AB 716) which renames the single plan for student achievement as the school plan for student achievement (SPSA), authorizes the use of uniform complaint procedures for complaints alleging noncompliance with requirements related to the establishment of school site councils or the development of the SPSA, and authorizes the use of the SPSA to satisfy the requirement for a school improvement plan when a school is identified for targeted or comprehensive support. Regulation updated to reflect AB 716 which eliminates the authority to use a school advisory committee other than a school site council to develop the SPSA, allows certain small schools to share a school site council, requires a needs assessment to identify school goals, and, if applicable, requires consultation with the school's English learner advisory committee on review of the SPSA.

BP/AR 0450 - Comprehensive Safety Plan

(BP/AR revised)

Policy updated to reflect NEW LAW (AB 1747) which requires the California Department of Education (CDE) to post a compliance checklist for developing the comprehensive safety plan and best practices related to reviewing and approving the plan, and requires districts to share their approved comprehensive safety plans with local law enforcement, the fire department, and other first responder entities. Regulation updated to reflect AB 1747, which adds requirements to consult with the fire department and other first responders in developing safety plans and to develop procedures for conducting tactical responses to criminal incidents, including procedures related to individuals with guns on campus and at school-related functions.

BP/AR 0460 - Local Control and Accountability Plan

(BP/AR revised)

Policy and regulation updated to reflect NEW LAW (AB 2878) which expands the state priority on parent involvement that must be addressed in the local control and accountability plan (LCAP) to include family engagement. Policy also reflects NEW LAW (AB 1808) which requires consultation on plan development with special education local plan administrator(s) and, by July 1, 2019, requires districts to develop a local control funding formula budget overview for parents/guardians in conjunction with the LCAP. Policy reflects NEW LAW (AB 1840) which requires the State Board of Education to expand the LCAP template by January 31, 2020 to include specified information. Section on "Technical Assistance/Intervention" updated to reflect AB 1808 which establishes a single statewide system of support for districts and schools, and AB 1840 which provides that a district receiving an emergency apportionment will be deemed to have been referred to the California Collaborative for Educational Excellence. Regulation updated to reflect AB 1840 which requires data in the LCAP to be reported in a manner consistent with the California School Dashboard and requires districts to post their LCAP prominently on the homepage of their web site. Section on "Annual Updates" deleted since the annual updates follow the same process and adhere to the same template as the initial LCAP.

AR 1220 - Citizen Advisory Committees

(AR revised)

Regulation updated to clarify that the parent advisory committee and English learner parent advisory committee established to review and comment on the LCAP are not subject to Brown Act requirements, but

must comply with other, less complex procedural requirements. Legal cites for school site councils revised pursuant to NEW LAW (AB 716).

AR 3311.1 - Uniform Public Construction Cost Accounting Procedures

(AR revised)

Regulation updated to reflect NEW LAW (AB 2249) which revises the threshold amounts that determine the process that may be used to award contracts for public works. Regulation also revised to clarify requirements for informal bid notifications that must be sent to contractors and/or construction journals.

AR 3543 - Transportation Safety and Emergencies

(AR revised)

Regulation updated to reflect NEW LAW (AB 1798) which requires that all school buses be equipped with passenger restraint systems by July 1, 2035. Regulation also reflects NEW LAW (AB 1840) which delays until March 1, 2019 the requirement that each school bus and student activity bus be equipped with a child safety alert system, and allows for a possible six-month extension for districts with an average daily attendance of 4,000 or less under specified conditions. Regulation adds the conditions under which a student activity bus is exempt from the requirement to install a child safety alert system.

AR 4200 - Classified Personnel

(AR revised)

Regulation updated to reflect NEW LAW (AB 2160) which eliminates the exemption of part-time playground positions from the classified service in merit system districts, thereby making those positions part of the classified service. Regulation also reflects NEW LAW (AB 2261) which eliminates the exemption from the classified service, in merit system districts, of community representatives employed in advisory or consulting capacities for not more than 90 working days per fiscal year. Paragraph moved to emphasize that employees in either merit or non-merit system districts who are exempted from the classified service must fulfill obligations related to physical examinations, fingerprinting, and tuberculosis tests.

AR 5113 - Absences and Excuses

(AR revised)

Regulation updated to reflect **NEW LAW (AB 2289)** which (1) amends the definition of "immediate family" for the purpose of authorizing certain excused absences, (2) prohibits a district from requiring a physician's note for an absence by a parenting student to care for a sick child, and (3) clarifies that students may be excused from school, under specified conditions, for work in the entertainment or allied industry, participation with a nonprofit performing arts organization in a performance for a public school audience, or other reasons at the discretion of school administrators.

AR 5131.41 - Use of Seclusion and Restraint

(AR added)

New regulation reflects NEW LAW (AB 2657) which prohibits seclusion and behavioral restraint of students as a means of discipline, and provides that seclusion and restraint may be used only to control behavior that poses a clear and present danger of serious physical harm to a student or others if that behavior cannot be immediately prevented by a less restrictive response. Regulation specifies the conditions for such use, reporting requirements, and a list of seclusion and behavioral techniques that are always prohibited.

BP/AR 5141.52 - Suicide Prevention

(BP/AR revised)

Policy updated to reflect NEW LAW (AB 2639) which requires boards of districts that serve grades 7-12 to review the district's suicide prevention policy at least every five years and update it as necessary.

Regulation updated to reflect NEW LAW (SB 972) which requires districts that issue student identification cards to print specified suicide prevention hotline numbers on the cards effective July 1, 2019. Regulation also reflects NEW LAW (AB 1808) which requires CDE to identify online training programs that districts can use to train students and staff regarding suicide awareness and prevention.

BP/AR 5144 - Discipline

(BP/AR revised)

Policy updated to reflect NEW LAW (AB 2657) which prohibits seclusion and behavioral restraint of students as a means of discipline, and to encourage staff development regarding equitable implementation of discipline. Regulation updated to revise section on "Detention After School" to more directly reflect state regulations and delete a specific timeline for advance notice to parents/guardians of a student's detention.

BP 5146 - Married/Pregnant/Parenting Students

(BP revised)

Policy updated to reflect NEW LAW (AB 2289) which requires notification to parents/guardians and to pregnant and parenting students of their rights under the law; authorizes an excused absence for a parenting student to care for a sick child without a physician's note; provides that a pregnant or parenting student is entitled to eight weeks of parental leave, or longer if deemed medically necessary by the student's physician; and authorizes the use of uniform complaint procedures for complaints alleging noncompliance with the law.

BP 6146.1 - High School Graduation Requirements

(BP revised)

Policy updated to reflect NEW LAW (AB 2121) which, under certain conditions, exempts from any district-established graduation requirements migrant students and newly arrived immigrant students participating in a newcomer program who transfer schools in grade 11-12. Policy also reflects NEW LAW (AB 3022) which authorizes the granting of a diploma to persons who departed California in grade 12 against their will, and adds section on "Honorary Diplomas" including item reflecting NEW LAW (AB 2109) which authorizes the board to grant an honorary diploma to a terminally ill student.

AR 6173.2 - Education of Children of Military Families

(AR revised)

Regulation updated to reflect NEW LAW (AB 2949) which allows a child of a military family to continue attending the school of origin regardless of any change of residence of the family. Regulation also adds new section on "Transportation" reflecting AB 2949, which authorizes, but does not require, districts to provide transportation to enable a child of a military family to attend the school or district of origin.

BP/AR 6175 - Migrant Education Program

(BP/AR revised)

Policy updated to include priorities for migrant education services, as amended by the federal Every Student Succeeds Act, and provision of services to private school students, formerly in AR. Policy also adds language encouraging the superintendent to annually report to the board regarding the performance of migrant students. Regulation updated to add definition of "migrant student" and add new section on "Summer School" reflecting requirement for any district receiving federal migrant education funding to conduct summer school programs for eligible migrant students. New section on "Applicability of Graduation Requirements" reflects NEW LAW (AB 2121) which, under certain conditions, exempts migrant students who transfer between schools in grades 11-12 from district-established graduation requirements.

AR 6183 - Home and Hospital Instruction

(AR revised)

Regulation reorganized and updated to reflect NEW LAW (AB 2109) which expands the parental notification to include information regarding student eligibility for individual instruction and the duration of such instruction, requires that individual instruction in a student's home begin within five days of determining a student's eligibility, provides that students receiving individual instruction in a hospital for a partial week are eligible to attend school on days that they are not at the hospital, and provides that the absences of a temporarily disabled student must be excused until the student is able to return to the regular school program.

BB 9322 - Agenda/Meeting Materials

(BB revised)

Bylaw updated to reflect requirement effective January 1, 2019 that districts post a direct link on the homepage of their web site to the current board meeting agenda or to the district's agenda management platform. Bylaw also clarifies that the agenda need not provide an opportunity for public comment on any agenda item that has previously been considered at an open meeting of a committee comprised exclusively of board members.

BB 9324 - Minutes and Recordings

(BB revised)

Bylaw updated to reflect NEW LAW (SB 1036) which prohibits districts from including in board meeting minutes a student's directory information or a parent/guardian's personal information, as defined, when the student or parent/guardian requests that such information be excluded. Bylaw also includes optional statement that the minutes will summarize topics addressed during the public comment period and need not reflect the names of the individuals who comment.

Hamilton High School, with a 2018-2019 current enrollment of 288 students, is located in Hamilton City, along Highway 32 approximately 10 miles from both Chico and Orland. Our school is a 23-acre campus with five main buildings, including a gymnasium, cafeteria, a 15,000 book capacity modern library, and an agricultural farm and facility with maturing olive and mandarin trees. This past school year, we celebrated 100 years of providing an exceptional educational experience for the greater Hamilton City community.

The Hamilton High School campus is attractive and welcoming with an abundance of trees, shrubs, and grassy areas and a courtyard quad that often serves as a main focal point for student interaction.

Hamilton High School, with a current year enrollment of 281 students, is located in Hamilton City on a 23- acre campus. The school library has a 30-station computer lab, two conference rooms, faculty work/copy room, a 30-station computer work area, and a reference area with a capacity of 15,000 books. In Spring 2014, an additional portable classroom was added to our site to provide needed classroom space. Additionally, an upgraded server and technologically updated system were purchased and put into service in 2013-2014. In Spring 2015, the district backup devices were increased from 3TB to 6TB to assist in capacity. Internet and Network speed improvements completed in December 2016 increased network speed to 1,000MB. Our Internet/Network now has 10x faster internet access as well as improved school to school access. Over 200 chromebooks for student use, including one set on a portable chromecart, have been purchased by the district for student use. As well, four classrooms have been outfitted with interactive computerized smart screen monitors for increased technological use.

In the Summer of 2016, HUSD repaired and updated the roofs of Gym, the cafeteria, the library building, and the industrial technology building. In the summer of 2019, he gymnasium will receive a facelift paint job. Previously, in September 2005, a \$2.2 million modernization program was completed on Buildings 100, 200, and 300. The gym has newer locker rooms and public restrooms as well as new bleachers and a refinished floor (the gym floor is refinished each summer). In Buildings 100 and 200, the office was expanded and all classrooms were modernized. Over \$150,000 in new furniture and equipment was purchased. Finally, new state-of-the art fire and communications systems were installed. The Home Economics and Science rooms were last modernized in the summer of 2008.

In Winter 2018, a new 9,000 square foot hog barn is being completed for use beginning in January 2019. This barn will allow our school agricultural department to double the amount of animals we can house on site and increase the number of students participating in our CTE program.

School and student safety are very important and a priority at Hamilton High School. The site administrator and Deans of Students actively supervise the campus throughout the school day and are present at all extracurricular activities. Emergency drills are conducted regularly with the following drills held during the year: fire drills and lockdown drill.

Our campus is recognized as one of the most attractive in the area with an abundance of trees, shrubs, and flowers among the courtyards, playing fields, and grassy areas. A 1000-seat football stadium was finished in 2004, funded by a joint venture with the Friends of Athletics. In March 2005, the softball complex was completed. Other outdoor areas include two soccer fields, two baseball fields, an agriculture farm with both olive and mandarin trees, two tennis courts, and two basketball courts.

Two maintenance/custodial workers and one grounds person keep the school clean and well maintained. Custodians are on duty from 7 A.M. until 10:00 P.M. on most school days. Restrooms are cleaned daily and kept in good working order.

The District participates in the State School Deferred Maintenance Program, which provides state matching funds on a dollar-for-dollar basis, to assist school districts with expenditures for major repair or replacement of existing school building components. Typically, this includes roofing, plumbing, heating, air conditioning, electrical systems, interior or exterior painting, and floor systems.

Each year at Hamilton High School, students complete a battery of assessments aimed at assisting the student in choosing possible career paths. Students research a number of careers and the education required for those careers in Career Life Planning (CLP), a required course for all students a Hamilton High School. Approximately 74% of our students are enrolled in Career Technical Education (CTE) classes and these programs provide students with valuable job skills. Similarly, many of the skills taught in CLP are utilized throughout the student's academic career at HHS. Hamilton High has required 10 credits of CTE as a graduation requirement for each student. Each of our special populations receives needed support in all courses, not just CTE.

Because we are a small school and district, our staff works closely to ensure student success. Valuable discussion occurs regularly to assist all student populations and class completion and course effectiveness is measurable. PowerPoint presentations, oral reports, and research skills are examples of some of the skills students are measured upon, in addition to gauging the effectiveness of the our programs. An end-of-course exam is also required and students must achieve a 70% or above to receive college credit. CTE Instructors also administer quarterly benchmark assessments.

Most of these courses are articulated with Butte College in 2+2 agreements where students can earn college credit for high school courses. Faculty and staff from HHS also meet with Butte College instructors to ensure course curriculum and standards are aligned. Hamilton High participates in the Youth Employment Skills program where students learn job skills and then are placed in paid work experience positions. Additionally, new state funding will allow for increased dual enrollment as well as potentially courses for Butte College offered on site by HHS staff members.

Career preparation courses and programs include the following: Life Skills, Environmental Horticulture. Courses conducted by Career Tech Education teachers (formerly ROP) include: Forensics, Environmental Horticulture, Ag Careers, Ag Mechanics, Floral Design, Careers with Children, Digital Photography, and Web Design.

School Safety Plan (School Year 2018-19)

Hamilton High School continues to provide a safe and secure campus for students, employees, and visitors. All take pride in ensuring Hamilton High School remains a positive educational environment for all students. Our crime rate remains well below that of other schools in the area and significantly below high schools throughout the State. The District's School Safety Plan details Hamilton High School's policies regarding transportation, student discipline, emergencies and disaster preparedness, dress codes, and child abuse reporting. This plan is available in the office for public inspection.

The HUSD and HHS School Safety Plan of Emergency Operations was adopted by the HUSD School Board on April 14, 2014. HHS Faculty participated in the development of the plan and items are regularly reviewed in HHS Faculty meetings. The HHS School Site Council reviewed and updated the HHS School Safety Plan in Fall 2018, with pending approval by the HUSD School Board by March 2019.

The site administrator regularly provides timely and necessary in-service training for the purpose of prevention, compliance, and, importantly, awareness of issues that may affect our students, staff, and school culture. In Fail 2018, we had various informational meeting s with the Glenn County Sheriff's Office regarding lockdown training and procedures- with consideration of the ALICE procedures- as well as on the mental health SMART program and on internet postings concerning students.

Hamilton High School continues to work closely with local law enforcement and the local fire department and we are fortunate that both agencies are attentive to our needs. Our school safety coordinator keeps us well informed of new safety policies and procedures. Our school staff is provided with regular safety training on a variety of topics germane to Hamilton High School.

Professional Development (Most Recent Three Years)

In the 2016-17 school year, Hamilton High School provided four full days and 13 minimum days of professional development, in addition to Professional Learning Community (PLC) time each Monday. Focus areas for staff development for 2014-15 school year were WASC Accreditation, Safety, Aeries Analytics, Common Core State Standards- specifically Integrated Math implementation, and Structured English immersion. These areas of professional development were selected based on the needs of our students, particularly the structured English immersion trainings which are aimed at improving access to our educational programs for all students. EDI (Explicit Direct Instruction)- now the Common Core Cadre- are ongoing trainings for all teachers in our district for the purpose of ensuring a common educational practice in the HUSD classrooms kindergarten through 12th grade. The high school has teacher-coaches to assist in this process through individual meetings and trainings, but also with in-class observation and coaching.

The Math Department teachers have been involved in ongoing training aimed at the implementation of Common Core Math Standards and the varied delivery of curriculum involved in CCSS Math Standards. Implementation is now in its fourth year and has driven weekly collaborative PLC meetings among the Math teachers.

Additionally, beginning with the 2017-18 school year, our master schedule was changed to a true block, with four periods each day. Each student now has the opportunity to take eight courses and we were able to offer more elective courses in various subjects. Additionally, in cooperation with the 6-8th Grades, the bell and master schedule for 6-12th grades is identical. This will assist in preparing students for the rigors of high school whilst allowing middle school grades additional electives as well.

Continued training is provided for the implementation of data analysis and data analysis programs with the intent of improving the teachers use of data to inform and improve instruction to help our students achieve academically. Weekly Monday collaboration time has been changed with the new schedule to Friday afternoon PD and PLC time as every Friday is now a minimum day with the change in master schedule. This time is utilized for the structured department collaboration time, work on pacing guides and essential standards and information on CAASPP and other mandated testing. PLC time is a time during which our teachers fully collaborate, discuss, and seek out solutions to better assist instruction, curriculum, and student achievement.

School Description and Mission Statement (School Year 2018-19)

Hamilton Elementary School, with a current enrollment of 423 students, is located in Hamilton City, is approximately 10 miles from both Chico and Orland. We are the only K-8 school that serves the community of Hamilton City. Our 6th-8th grade middle structure offers junior high students the opportunity to work with highly qualified content specialist instructors to maximize their learning as they prepare for high school. This year is the first year implementing our Dual Immersion Program—at the Kindergarten and first grade level providing bilingual instruction to 47 students. We are pleased to offer middle school athletics: flag football, volleyball, boys and girls basketball. School and student safety are paramount for our students and staff at Hamilton Elementary School. Students are supervised throughout the day. A crossing guard is available before and after school and we have yard duty supervisors that assist with campus safety. Scheduled drills and training for fire, lock-downs, and other emergency situations are conducted monthly to enhance the preparedness of our staff and students if such an event occurred. Our vision is to create a K-8 school that is highly regarded for its academic excellence and for its contribution in actively serving and improving the community in which it operates. At Hamilton Elementary School each student has access to his or her own copy of the Standards-aligned textbooks and instructional materials that were approved by the State Board of Education in the core curriculum areas. Hamilton Elementary School adheres to the State-adoption cycle for purchasing textbooks and all materials considered for District adoption are available to the public for review prior to any purchase. A public sufficiency and adequacy hearing is held each year in October by the Glenn County Office of Education. Because we are a small K-8 elementary school, we involve the entire staff in the selection of textbooks and instructional materials. Whenever feasible, we have piloted the curriculum under consideration for a semester (from the state-approved list), conducted an evaluation of the material based on predetermined guidelines, presented evaluation summaries to the entire staff, and made staff recommendations to the school board.

Hamilton Elementary School has transitioned to Common Core Standards and teachers use instructional materials and practices to best serve our students. We adopted Everyday Math (K-5) and CPM (6-8) and are currently piloting English Language Arts curriculum. Hamilton Elementary School is in compliance with the curriculum adoption cycle established by the California Department of Education. The District has aligned the curriculum with the State Frameworks and the Content Standards.

Hamilton Elementary has a closed campus from 8:00 a.m. until 6:00 p.m. while school and the Boys and Girls Club program are in session. Prior to the start of the school day, one of two Maintenance personnel inspects the campus for safety. The facility is clean and in good repair. There are ample classrooms, restrooms, playground space and equipment.

A staff of two provides janitorial services. Schedules are arranged so that no classrooms are interrupted during instructional time. Custodial services are available from 6:00 a.m. until 8:30 p.m. The cafeteria is cleaned after both breakfast and lunch and restrooms are cleaned and sanitized daily. The school grounds are clean and well ordered. Trash cans are available throughout the campus.

The playgrounds and lawns are mowed weekly. The District contracts with an arborist to annually perform necessary routine trimming of trees.

The school facilities, grounds, and vehicles are in good condition. The District participates in the State's Deferred Maintenance Program to replace major components of the school's facilities (such as HVAC, roofs, floor surfaces, and so on). All toilets and other fixtures work and are in good repair. We have installed automatic flush valves on every toilet and hand dryers in each restroom to maintain a clean environment for students.

Hamilton City has maintained an elementary school on this location since the early 1900s. All of the original buildings have long ago been replaced by modern facilities. All buildings meet current fire and earthquake codes. An OPSC modernization project was completed within the past ten years that completely renovated the primary wing containing four classrooms, two reading labs, and an adult restroom. Within the last seven years, a new kindergarten complex with three classrooms, each containing restrooms, was added to our campus.

Hamilton Elementary School occupies 4.8 acres with separate athletic fields and blacktop space for both primary and middle school students. There are separate playground facilities with rubber drop zones for both primary and middle school children. The cafeteria complex can also serve as a gymnasium. All buildings have handicap access. The library has holdings in both English and Spanish. All students have Internet access through the computer lab. The lab has 30 Dell multimedia computers. We are also considering a solar energy project at the Hamilton Elementary.

The District participates in the State School Deferred Maintenance Program, which provides state matching funds on a dollar-for-dollar basis, to assist school districts with expenditures for major repair or replacement of existing school building components. Typically, this includes roofing, plumbing, heating, air conditioning, electrical systems, interior or exterior painting, and floor systems. For the 2011-12 school year, the District budgeted \$78,800 for the Deferred Maintenance Program. This represents .012% of the District's general fund budget.

Opportunities for Parental Involvement (School Year 2018-19)

At Hamilton Elementary School, parents are encouraged to actively participate in their child's educational experience. Parents can become involved in our school in various ways. Parents are encouraged to be actively involved in our Site and District committees. Committees such as our District leadership team known as HULC, (Hamilton Unified Leadership Committee) guides curriculum and instruction for all schools in Hamilton Unified. HULC is where all voices can be heard and guide the goals and actions of our school board. Our School Site Council helps school leadership plan for categorical funding expenditures as well as help refine the goals and objectives of Hamilton Elementary School. This hour of commitment deeply affects how we provide a effective instruction for all our students and provide learning opportunities to prepare students for college and career. We also have a monthly parent luncheon that invites parents or guardians to lunch together, with HES leadership, to be kept informed of schoolwide initiatives as well as take part in our ELAC. Finally, the Parent Teacher Organization known to us as PTO. Our PTO parents work tirelessly to provide extra classroom and field trip monies for our elementary staff. Since the last recession, schools have been trying to rebuild funding we once received back in 2008. Prices or cost of operating schools have gone up while funding has not. PTO works to fill in this gap and needs each parent to actively participate in the PTO membership. We encourage parents and grandparents to contact classroom teachers.

Parents are invited each month for morning coffee with the principal to share ideas and voice any concerns. Our monthly parent newsletter, in both Spanish and English, is distributed to parents at our morning coffee as well as any other information about upcoming events. The recent addition of our family case manager/liaison provides an additional resource for parent outreach including home visitations and bridging school/home relationships.

Academic Parent Teacher Teams (APTT) have been established in various classrooms on campus. This is an opportunity for parents to meet with their teacher and discuss their children and school performance in comparison with other students. Teachers then create goals with parents and teach parents specific learning activities that support the goals so they can better work with their children at home. After a set amount of time, the teacher reconnects with the parents and discusses assessment results on the learning goals that were established. This process repeats itself and parents become more connected with their child's learning and progress.

School Safety Plan (School Year 2018-19)

Maintaining a safe, orderly environment is essential to learning. This begins with periodic inspections of all facilities as well as a written plan.

A comprehensive safety plan that outlines all emergency procedures and processes is maintained in the school office. The School Safety Plan was last updated for approval in December of 2018 and was reviewed with staff and School Site Council. As part of the safety plan, a Crisis Response Plan was created and is annually reviewed in conjunction with the Glenn County Sheriff and the Hamilton Fire Department.

Hamilton Elementary School has a closed campus from 8:00 a.m. until 6:00 p.m. while school is in session. Prior to the start of the school day, one of two maintenance personnel inspects the campus for safety. Teachers, classified staff, and administration are assigned supervision duties during all recesses and lunch periods in the cafeteria. Fire drills are conducted monthly, and lock-down/intruder drills twice a year. As part of the Safety Plan Objectives, staff and students receive monthly scenarios and trainings in the effort to develop muscle memory to respond potential incidents. Fourteen cameras are installed to provide 24 hours surveillance wo thirds of our campus. All visitors to the campus must check in with the office. Access is limited through two pedestrian gates in ont of the school during the beginning and end of the school day. During the school day access is limited to a single pedestrian gate in the front of the school. Student absences are confirmed by a phone call to the parent or guardian and no child is released from school during the day without previous approval by parents or guardians. Any removal of students during the school day is documented in the office and parents are required to report to the office for all inquiries. All classrooms and other student areas are equipped with phones capable of reaching 911.

Keeping students in school even when disciplinary matters occur is a priority. At times, students may be excluded from school because of certain violation of the education code section 48900. Usually such actions as fighting, bringing unsafe objects, including firearms and knives are usually met with immediate exclusion and may result in an expulsion under Education Code Section 48915. At Hamilton Elementary School we work as an administrative team with our Intervention Specialist (Counselor) to find alternatives to removing students from school. Parents are reminded to have conversations with children about school and classroom expectations for schoolwide safety. Join us as a partner in safety by having family talks about how your child can be safe and learn at Hamilton Elementary School.

Hamilton Unified, in partnership with Glenn COE, offers a complete list of educational services for our community. Categorical programs provided by the Response to Instruction in Reading, Class Size Reduction K-3, extended day for at-risk students, high school tutorial, summer school, athletics (football, volleyball, basketball, baseball, softball, soccer, and track).

Glenn County programs include a complete range of Special Education programs that include speech and language services, resource specialist, and a special day class. Additionally through the Glenn County Office of Education, Hamilton Elementary School was chosen as a site for an after-school program through the 21st Century Grant. Migrant Education and First Five funding also contribute to our school resources and programs.

On the Hamilton High campus, the district operates a State Preschool and an Adult School.

Glenn County Office of Education and Human Resource Agency also have two other programs on our campus. Through their Department of Child and Family Services, they have a State licensed Preschool and a Family Resource Center.

Professional Development (Most Recent Three Years)

The Hamilton Unified School District has provided four staff development days and calendared seventeen minimum day Fridays to allow for additional hours of staff development. The focus of the staff development has included training to support our effective Professional Learning Communities, English Language Development (Designated and Integrated), Data Analysis and Assessment Implementation, refining pacing guides, ELA Adoption, intervention, and best teaching practices. During the 218-19 school year, the professional development at Hamilton Elementary School has been in alignment with our MTSS grant, and all staff development during the site's 12 staff training afternoons has been focused on supporting academic, behavior, and social-emotional instruction and learning as informed by our SWIS behavioral data and progress monitoring of student achievement (Benchmark Assessments). In addition to districtwide and schoolwide professional development opportunities, coaching opportunities are made available to support our schoolwide initiatives and meeting the needs of our special populations: 1:1 coaching, co-teaching, content and grade-level collaboration with our "Operation Accommodation," and lesson studies with our DI program and NTC (New Teacher Center). The Hamilton Unified Leadership Team was established to develop an action plan to increase student achievement and meet federal guidelines for program improvement schools. This team meets monthly.

The school opens before and after school for students who arrive early and have to be late. The school is located adjacent to the Hamilton High School campus. The design of the classrooms is open and appropriate for individual or group teaching. The buildings and gardens are maintained by the District staff and are in good repair, and 100% of the bathrooms are functioning properly.

Teachers ensure that teaching students is safe, and that classrooms are kept in good order. A District custodian keeps the facility clean during the afternoons. The school has had the benefit of using the traditional school gym for physical education classes when needed.

The District Library serves the school with more than 7,500 books and a capacity of 15,000. The school has 12 computers connected to the internet used for learning and instruction and a greenhouse that is used by the ROP classes of Ornamental Horticulture. The entire school has access for the disabled. There are two class rooms and an administrative building / offices, all built in 1986. All elements of the School Facilities were inspected in September 2018.

Hamilton Unified, in partnership with Glenn COE, offers a complete list of educational services for our community. Categorical programs provided by the District include: Title II, Title III, Response to Instruction in Reading, extended day for at-risk students, high school tutorial, summer school, and California High School Exit Examination (CAHSEE) prep.

Glenn County programs include a complete range of Special Education programs that include speech and language services, resource specialist, and a special day class. Additionally through Glenn COE, Hamilton Elementary was chosen as a site for an after-school program through the 21st Century Grant. Migrant Education and First Five funding also contribute to our school resources and programs.

The Hamilton Unified School District has negotiated and calendared Professional Learning Communities once a week for teacher collaboration that focuses on student achievement. Focus areas for staff development for 2013-2014 are Safety, Aeries Analytics, EDI, Common Core State Standards- specifically Integrated Math implementation, and Structured English immersion. These areas of professional development were selected based on the needs of our students, particularly the structured English immersion trainings which are aimed at improving access to our educational programs for all students. EDI (Explicit Direct Instruction)- now the Common Core Cadre- are ongoing trainings for all teachers in our district for the purpose of ensuring a common educational practice in the HUSD classrooms kindergarten through 12th grade. The high school has teacher-coaches to assist in this process through individual meetings and trainings, but also with in-class observation and coaching. Continued training is provided for the implementation of data analysis and data analysis programs with the intent of improving the teachers use of data to inform and improve instruction to help our students achieve academically.
