Completed and in Progress Tasks

- We are working with HUSD Staff regarding Go Guardian updates for additional security and protection for students. This includes reducing inappropriate use of Chromebooks and websites.
- Updated 23-24 Student photos to Mosaic meal systems
- District Alarm System Installation is completed. We are still working with the Alarm company
 on any addition needed updates or changes. Staff full training to follow.
- District Copier Refresh Project Copiers have been moving along great with quick service if
 needed. Additional programming and setup continuing to add additional features for reporting.
- Network Upgrades (Faster Internet and Additional Security) The new Firewall has been programmed and installed along with a few new network switches. Additional network switches and new wireless access points will be installed next and we have a goal of being completing this project by the end of 2023. This is an e-Rate project and it was recently approved by USAC, so HUSD is only responsible for 15% of the total cost.
- HHS Setting up devices for new staff and updating tech in classrooms.
- Additional Smart Board TV's have been ordered for new classroom/conference locations.

HUSD NUTRITION SERVICE REPORT

Meal Service Claims for Reimbursement have been submitted for July and August.

In July we served Breakfast and Lunch under SSO for 19 days and claimed meals as follows:

- 1,124 lunches, Federal reimbursement was \$4799.48 & State Reimbursement was \$1,088.70. this also includes \$89.92 in a performance base adjustment.
- 964 Breakfast meals, Federal Reimbursement was \$2,631.70 and State Reimbursement was \$933.73.
- Net claim reimbursement Total for July meals \$9,543.55

Food service for the month of August began on the $15^{\rm th}$ and ended on the $31^{\rm st}$, giving us a total of 13 days of meal service for Breakfast, Lunch, Supper and Snack.

- 4,290 Breakfast meals totaled \$8,605.00 from Federal rate of reimbursement, and \$7,261.99 from state rate of reimbursement.
- 5,388 Lunch meals totaled \$16,611.91 from federal rate of reimbursement, and \$11,613.66 from state rate of reimbursement. Claim reimbursement totals: \$26,647.95 from Federal, and \$18,875.65 from State reimbursement.
- Net claim Reimbursement totals For August \$44,523.60

Site Meal Totals for our At Risk Supper and Snack program:

- 581 snack meals totaled \$679.77.
- 1,689 Supper Meals totaled \$7,676.51.
- Net claim Reimbursement totals \$8,356.28

In conclusion, our first 2 months of 23-24 school year have brought about a couple of changes.

- We have extended one of our part time Nutrition Assistant to full time. She now assists our Nutrition Lead at the high school from 9am-1pm. This helps in having an adult in the kitchen during serving of both meals while Our lead is at the POS system assuring students receive a reimbursable meal. This also allows for the site to offer scratch menu options.
- We have made a second serving line for High School breakfast to ensure all students receive a meal within the time allowed as we are serving a daily average of 165 students in 15 minutes.

- 1. Enrollment- Hamilton High currently enjoys serving 311 students, which includes the 17 at EBHS. Attendance has been very good these first thirty-one days of the school year, with some students starting to get comfortable with being in high school.
- 2. School and facility upgrades- we were pleased to see some long-awaited improvements to HHS this summer!
 - a. New cafeteria tables
 - b. Newly painted Hamilton Blue panels on all HHS buildings
 - c. Re-paved parking lots
 - d. New lovely cabinets installed in Ag Mech room
 - e. Start of school beautification upgrades in front of library (ongoing work-in-progress)
 - f. **NEW** Hydration stations in gym foyer and outside room 10! We now have four at HHS with one more to be added soon!

Special thanks to HUSD maintenance for the continued effort for HHS beautification!

- 3. Teacher Training- HHS staff continues to actively and energetically engage using CKH with our students. The purpose was to build and strengthen relationships with each other and also with students. I am very proud of each teacher's efforts in being attentive and keen to learn and implement CKH at HHS! Philosophically, this meshes very well with my impetus over the years with staff to build positive rapport with each student and each class to create a strong environment for improved learning. CKH will be an ongoing component for all of us throughout the school year!
 - Additionally, during our PLC and staff meetings, we continue to work on training using CAASPP assessment information. Some teachers will be training online, while others will benefit from the archived trainings and resources offered free of charge to our staff!
 - Further, I have been keen on meeting regularly with our new teachers and parapro's and in visiting their classrooms/workspace. It is essential for this to ensure that our new staff is welcome and becomes part of the Hamilton Brave synergy. This will be an ongoing collaboration with our new staff!
- 4. School Athletics- Our Fall Sports teams are successfully underway with most teams already in league competition (football starts league Oct. 6). All sports teams are in contention for league titles and in positive standing for post-season play. As well, varsity volleyball and JV volleyball have strong records, with JV at 13-2, and Varsity at 21-5.
 - Cross Country is competing today and has done exceptionally well in its two meets thus far, with a tremendous showing at the Black Butte Invitational last Friday. Chances for league and section finalist are strong for this large group dubbed the Runnin' Braves!
 - Emma Lepp continues to lead Hamilton Swim to top 10 team finishes as she has a number of 1st and 2nd place finishes at BVL meets.
- 5. School Activities- This being Homecoming Week, we are so very pleased to see such school spirit- thank you to ASB leaders for their excellent coordination and game/event planning for this week and throughout home sports events! Join us Friday night for King/Queen coronation, the football games, and the Homecoming Dance!
- 6. October will be a very busy month of several activities, showcased by HCFFA trip to National Convention in late October! We also have ongoing trainings, school and class activities, and the end of the 1st Quarter on October 13th! Should be an active month for students, staff, and our families!

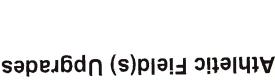


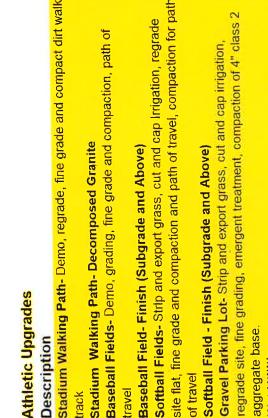




HHS CONCEPTUAL PHASING PLAN

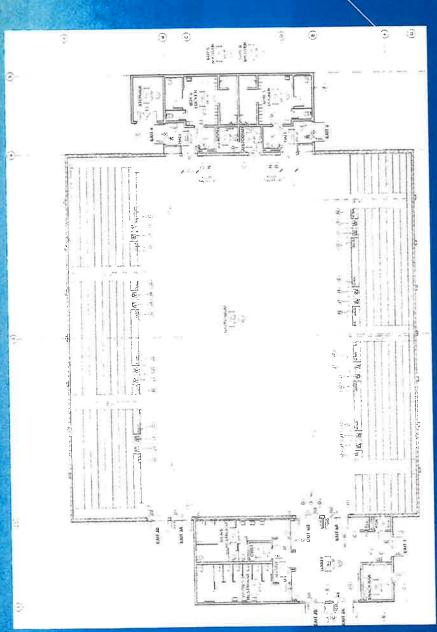
