## Board Report April 26, 2023

**Enrollment Projection for 2023-24:** Incoming frosh tentative enrollment- 70 students. Projected total enrollment for 9-12= 310. Current Enrollment = 314. As always, adjustments will occur prior to school year.

**Hamilton High School:** Hamilton High School students and staff enjoyed a great Easter Break with many travelling to interesting destinations. Since our return, we have continued to move forward quickly with the bulk of busy activities still ahead over the final 6 weeks of the school year. This week we began our CAASPP testing with our 11th graders (Math, English, Science). Our Seniors will also be required to take the Science test, likely next week. As well, AP testing begins next week so there will be coordinating to ensure appropriate test taking conditions for our students.

This week, our ASB team is actively preparing for the Prom on Saturday April 29 at the Chico Events Center. As well, they are planning for Staff Appreciation Week May 8-12, and other year-end activities, including graduation.

The Glenn County Fair is upcoming in mid-May (week of 15-19). Our student projects are looking very strong- livestock, shop projects, etc. Our advisors are also preparing for the dynamic week that fair presents, reinforcing etiquette, ensuring students are working with animals, and that projects are completed. Please consider purchasing a student project at the fair this year! Our FFA will be holding its annual banquet Monday May 1 in our gym.

Graduation is June 2 and our senior students are becoming excited about the culmination of their high school career- successfully. On May 11<sup>th</sup>, Seniors will present their Senior Project Presentation, a graduation requirement, as one of the final components they need towards the end of year. For the 12<sup>th</sup> graders, a Senior Trip has also been at last finalized and will be to Six Flags in Vallejo on Friday May 26.

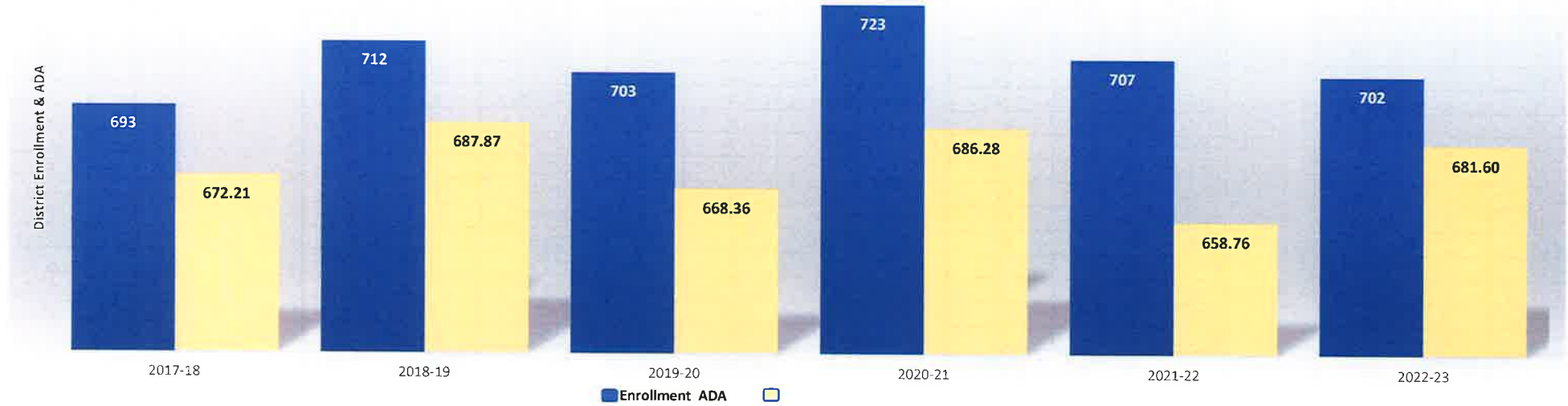

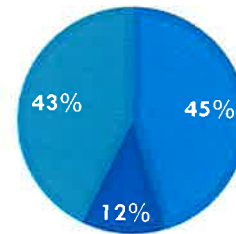

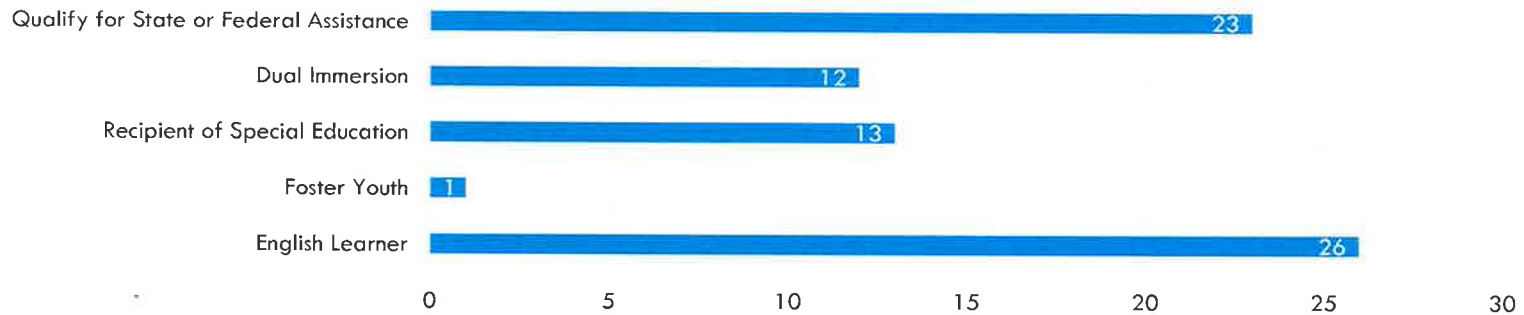


## WHAT GRADE IS YOUR CHILD?

- 9th-12th Grade

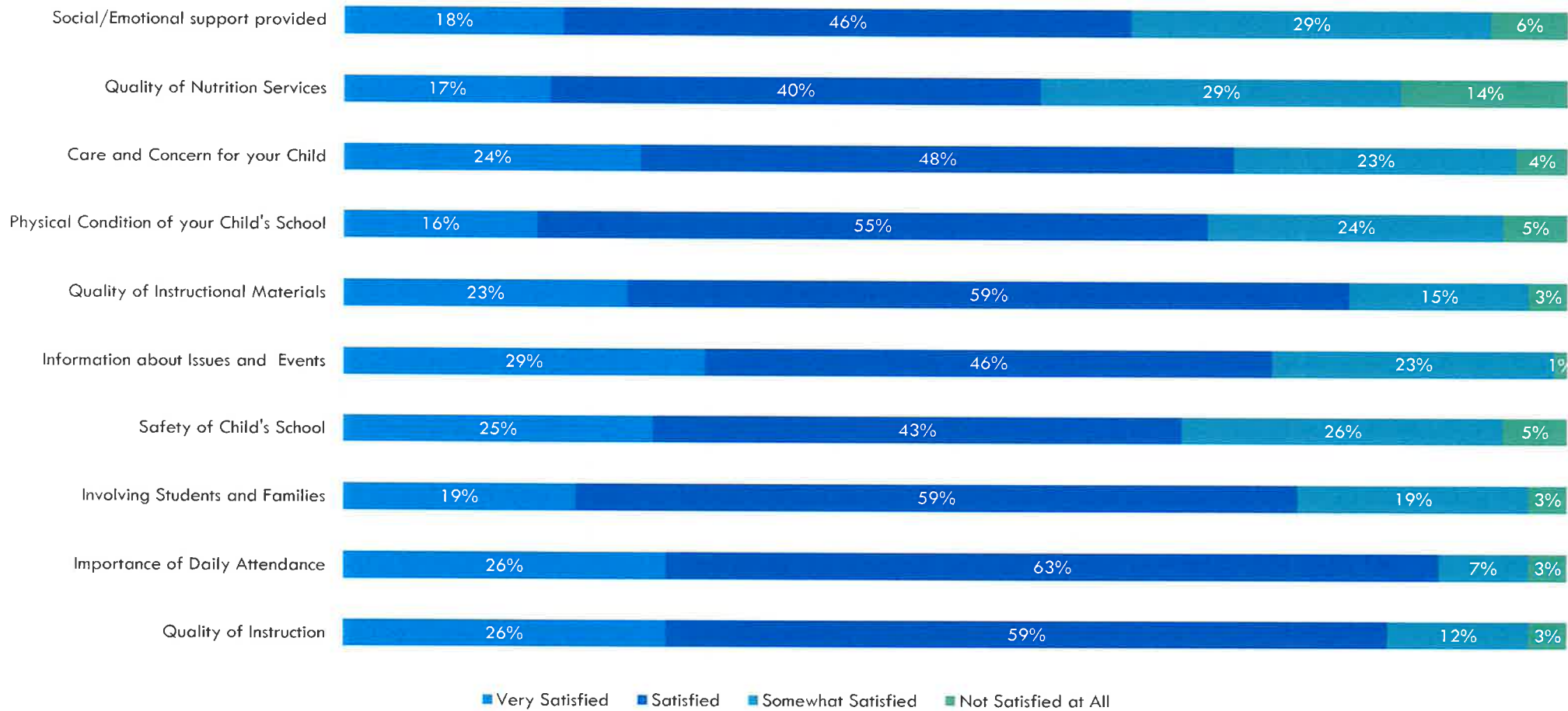


## Parent/Guardian Demographic Information

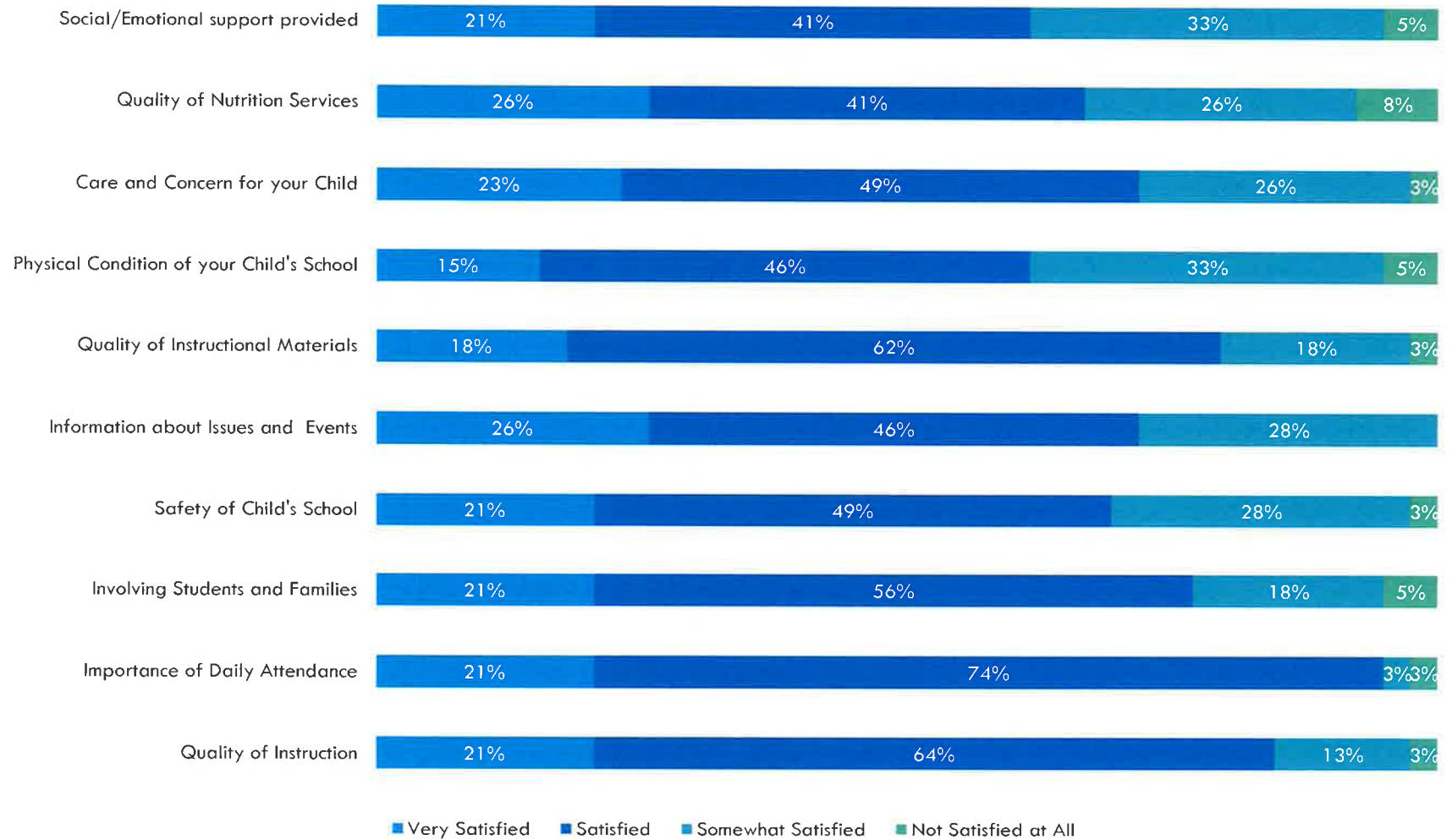

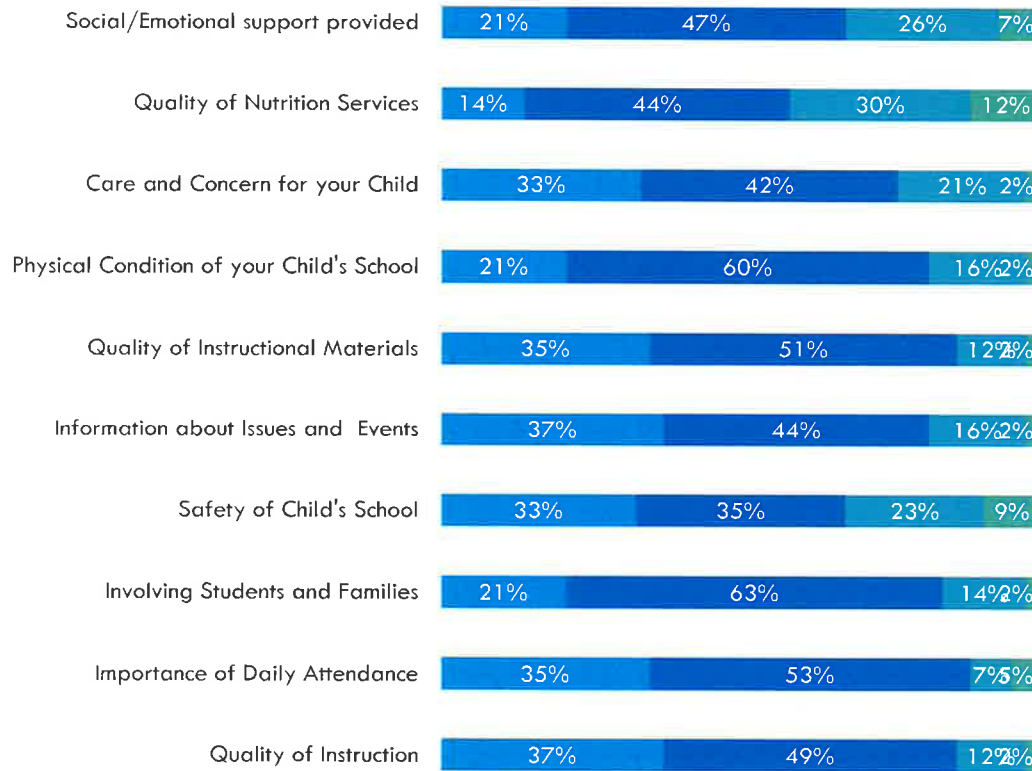

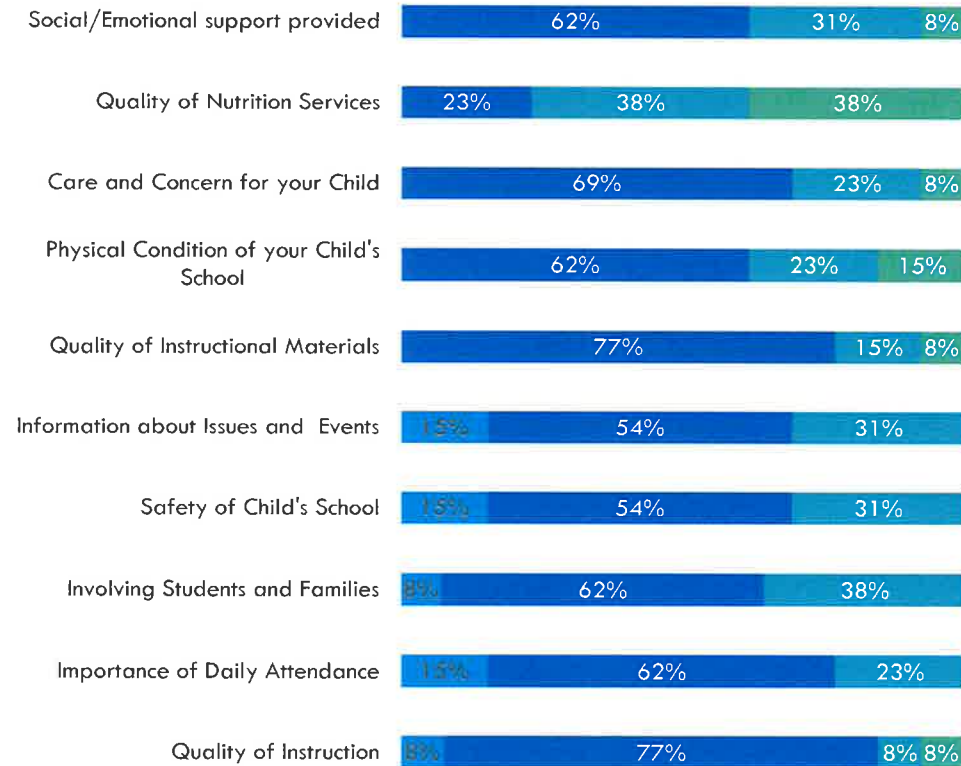
# Parent Satisfaction Hamilton Elementary School

Very Satisfied Satisfied Somewhat Satisfied Not Satisfied at All

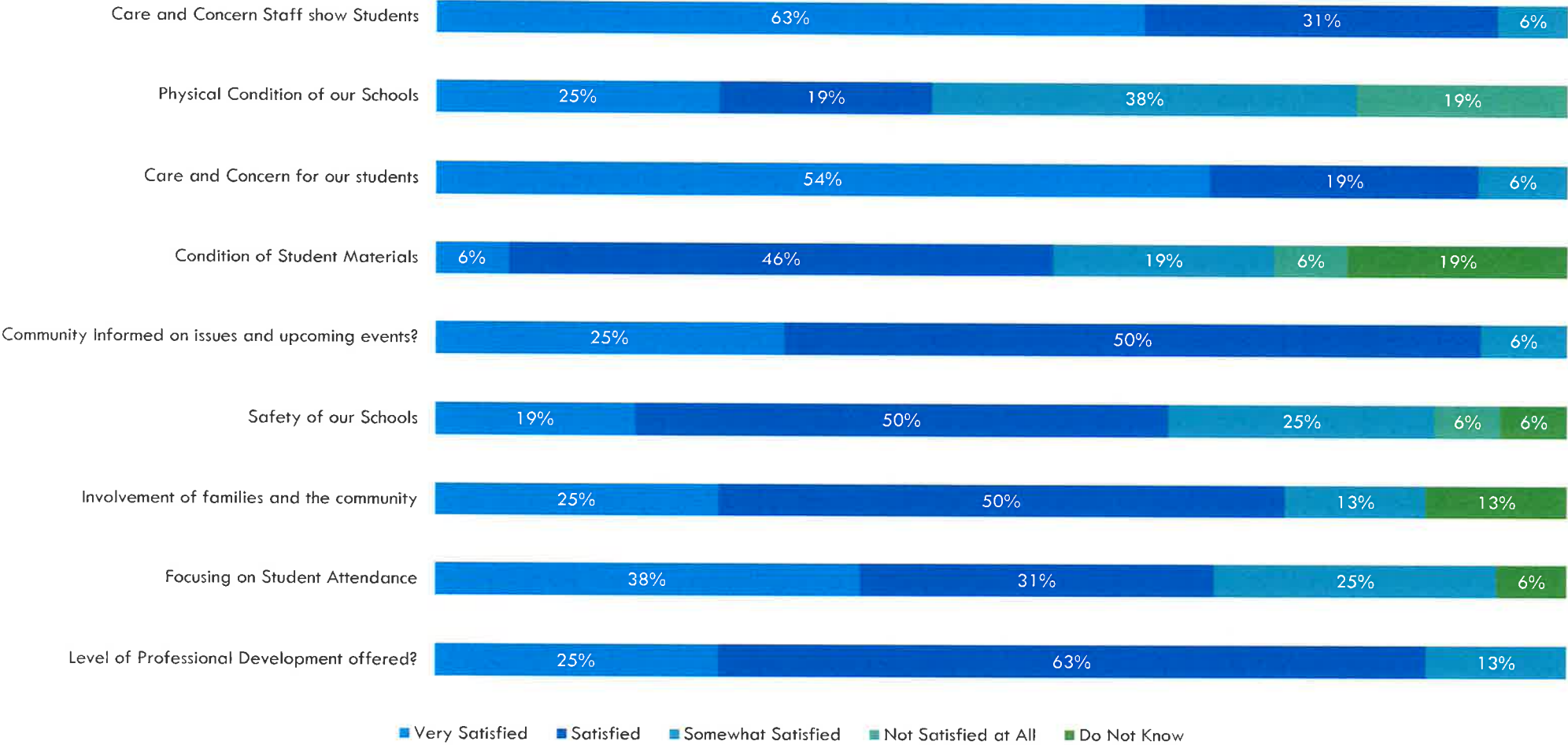
## Parent Satisfaction: 6<sup>th</sup>-8<sup>th</sup> (13 Responses)



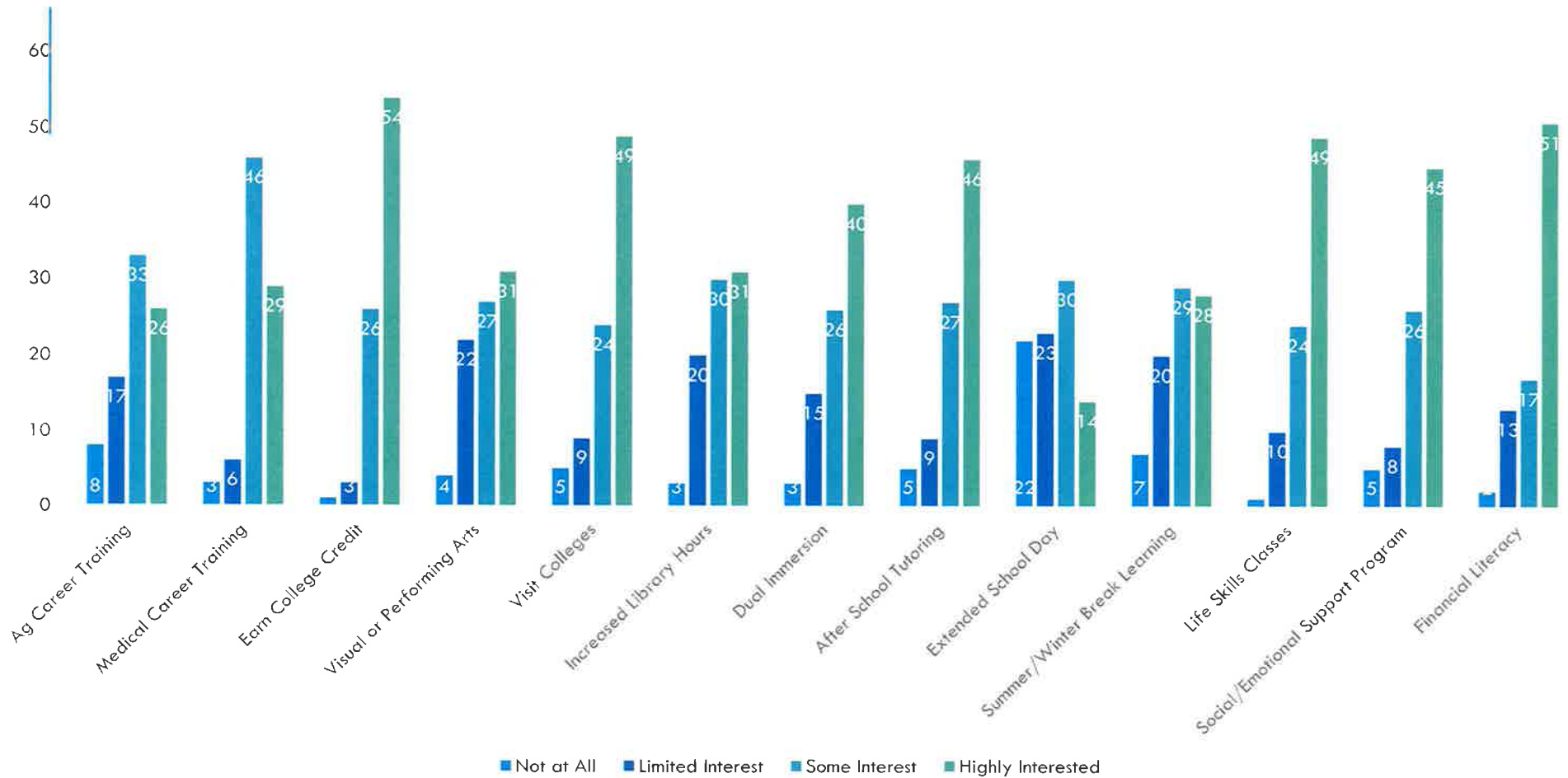

# Overall Staff Satisfaction

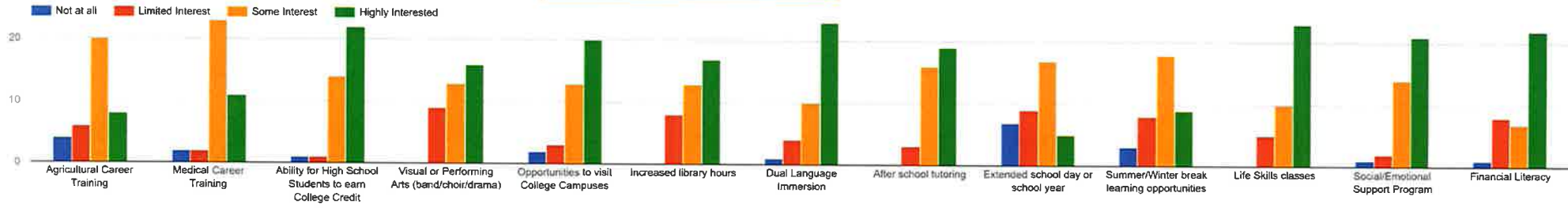

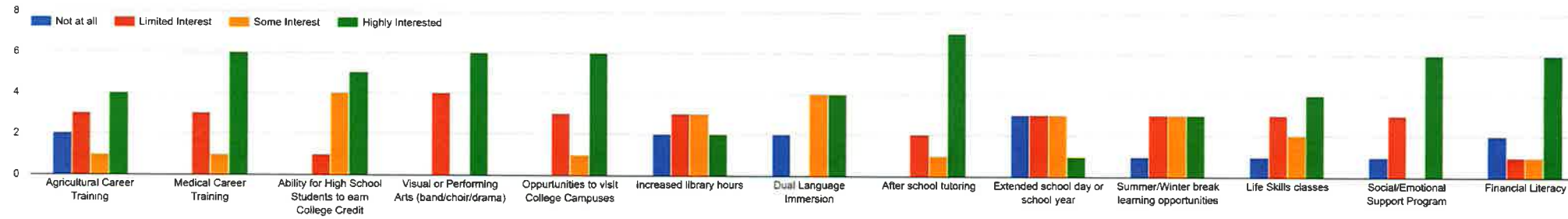
What do you feel is most important for our schools to provide for your child:

K-5



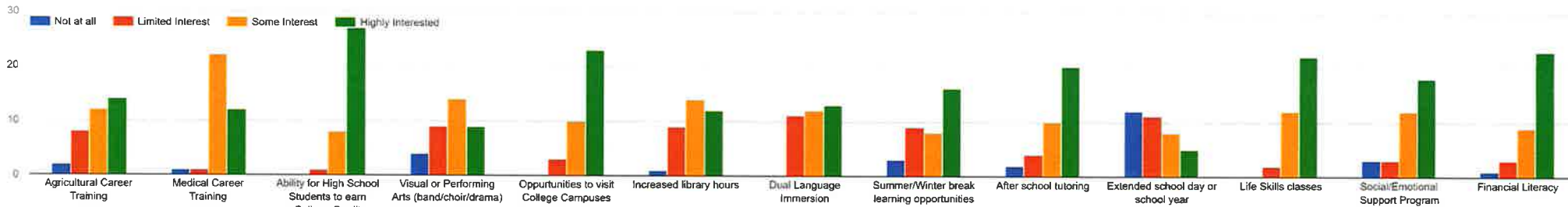
What do you feel is most important for our schools to provide for your child:

6-8

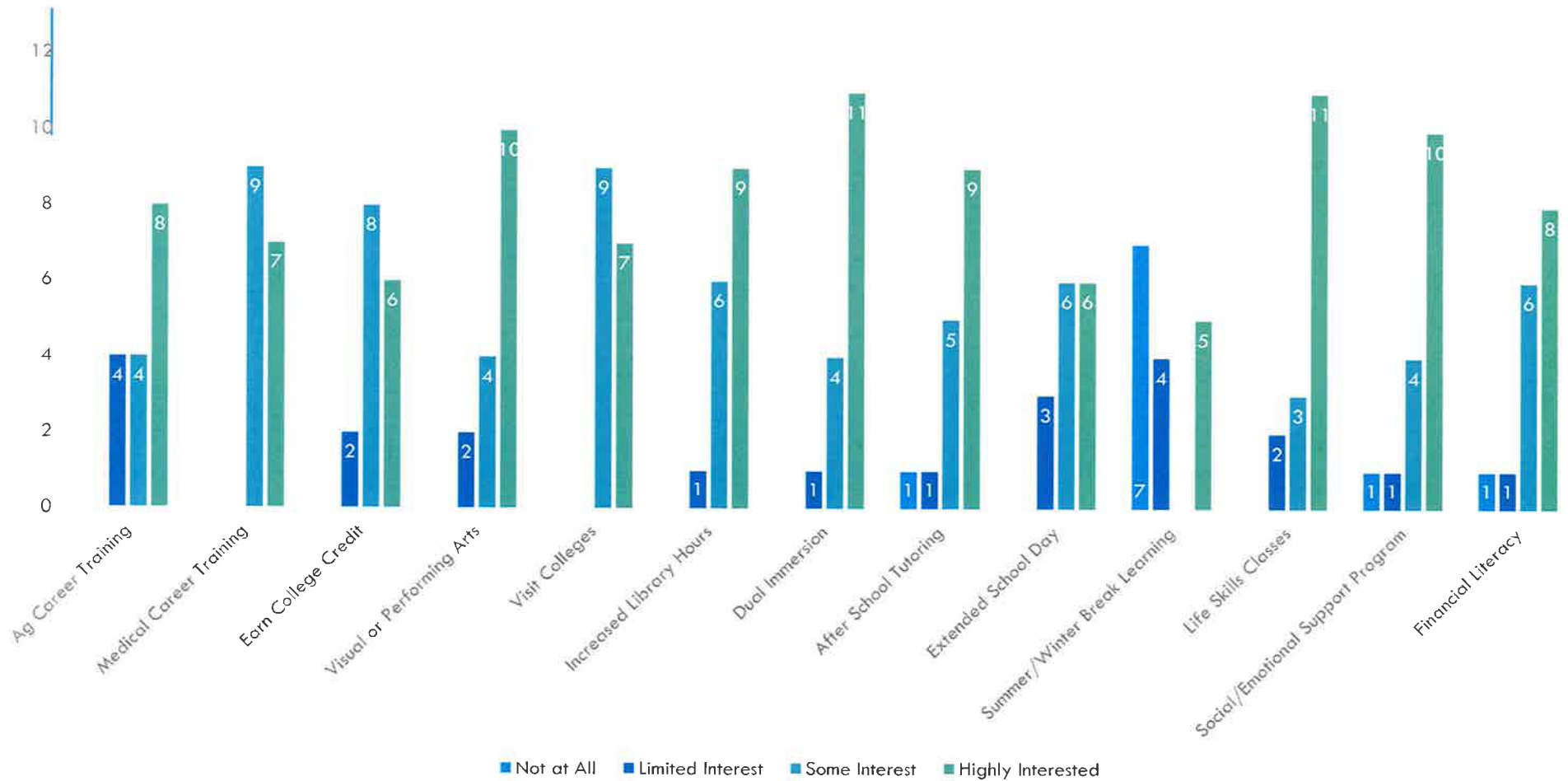


What do you feel is most important for our schools to provide for your child:
