## 2024 Summer Reading for **Students Entering Tenth Grade**

You are required to read only one book, and there is no required written assignment to complete. We will, however, be using this title as our jumping-off point for discussion and writing activities during the first quarter of 10<sup>th</sup> grade, so **be sure to complete the required book before the first day of school.** 

Required Text: Animal Farm by George Orwell

READING HELP: You are <u>not required to complete a written assignment</u> during the summer, but if you wish to complete some activities to help you keep the book fresh in your mind, you may enjoy one of the following. **These activities will NOT be collected or graded!!** 

- Choose one character to follow as you read. Make annotations about what the character is like at the beginning of the book, key events that cause the character to develop or change, and important changes you see in the character. You might also note questions or challenges the character raises for you as a reader—what does this person's journey make you think about?
- Choose 5 important events in the book to illustrate. Write a couple of sentences for each picture detailing why you think that event is important.
- Keep an informal journal of your thoughts as you read, writing down page numbers where key events/quotes appear and your questions/responses to those things.
