Barnegat Light State Park

Barnegat Light State Park is a great winter birding spot, with lots of sea ducks, gulls, and winter shorebirds. We will hike to the end of the jetty from 7th Avenue. Dress warmly; a rigorous sandy hike on the beach is to be expected. Along the way, we will make a few other stops to pick up a few other species in the bay and ocean. If time permits, we will check out one of the surrounding salt marshes before heading back.

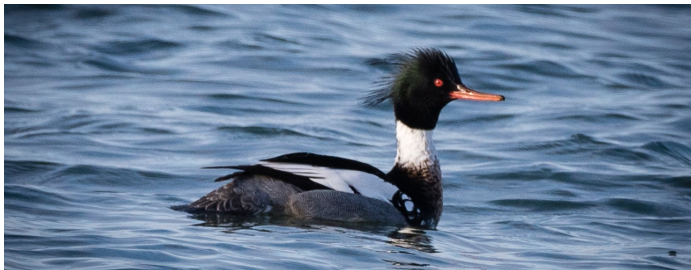

Sandy Hook is a 2,044-acre barrier beach peninsula that offers seven miles of beach line. The variety of coastal habitats including sand dunes, grasslands, salt and freshwater marshes, thickets, and maritime forest offers a diverse range of birding opportunities. From shorebirds and songbirds to waterfowl, join us as we search these locations for wintering birds.



Whitesbog and Abbot Marsh

Join us as we drive for a southern loop through South/Central NJ for swans and wintering ducks. We will first head to Whitesbog, the birthplace of the modern blueberry, as we look for Tundra Swans as they winter amongst the cranberry bogs. From there, we will come back north to the Abbot Marsh and walk the trails for wintering ducks. The marsh can be host to large rafts of ducks before they migrate up to or through Hunterdon. Species seen on this trip may include shovelers, teal, and other species.

Family Trips

Explore High Point

Sunday, January 26, 7:00 AM to 4:00 PM

Cost: \$33, an additional entrance fee of up to \$25 and up to \$30 ski/snowshoe rental fee to be paid the day of the trip if there is snow.

Discover the natural beauty of High Point State Park while gliding on skis or snowshoeing. The view from High Point Monument, at 1,803 feet above sea level, is a spectacular panorama of rich farmland and forest, soft hills and lush valleys in three states. It is one of most beautiful places in the northern part of the state. High Point is an alpine hollow of lakes, trees and sweeping vistas. Come dressed to be outdoors for the day. No experience is necessary but be aware that snow activities can be strenuous. Bring a bag lunch. Skiing and snowshoeing are weather dependent; the trip will become a guided day hike if there is no snow on the ground.

The mission of the Roebling Museum is to document, preserve and exhibit the history of the John A. Roebling's Sons Company, the Roebling family, and the village of Roebling. Its focus is not only on the industrial and technological achievements of the company but on the unique social history of its workforce and the town it created. In Bordentown we will meet with a former Hunterdon County Parks and Recreation employee, historian Doug Kiovsy, who will lead us through the Bordentown Joseph Bonaparte Exhibit, the Clara Barton Schoolhouse and more. We will eat lunch at a local restaurant; lunch is not included in the cost of the trip.

Rutherford Hall & Stickley Museum at Craftsman Farms

Thursday, January 9, 9:30 AM to 4:00 PM

Parking Location: Echo Hill Park

Ages: Adult

Cost: \$61 includes tour fees

Instructors: Liz Braidwood-Fulmer, Recreation Program Coordinator and Laura Bush, Principal Park Naturalist

This National & Historic Landmark, Rutherford Hall "Big House" was designed by famed architect Whitney Warren, who designed Grand Central Station in NY City. The 18,000 square foot Tudor country home was built in 1904. Since early US history, the family has had a positive impact on this region. We will hear stories about how the local food production, hunts, animal breeding, boating, horseback riding, and hiking filled one's days.

At the Stickley Museum learn how Gustav Stickley was a visionary spokesman for the American Arts and Crafts movement. His furniture designs in the late 1800s were a radical departure from the furniture of the Victorian era. They reflected the Arts and Crafts ideals of simplicity, honesty in construction, and truth to materials. Craftsman Farms exemplifies Stickley's philosophy of building in harmony with the environment by using natural materials. In 1908 Stickley designed the farm to be self-sufficient. The produce grown on the farm was used in the restaurant operated by Stickley as part of his furniture showroom and department store in Manhattan. We will stop for lunch at a nearby restaurant, Alexis Diner in Denville; lunch is not included in the cost of the trip.

Male bowerbirds build a "bower" of sticks and decorate it with blue objects, and then dance for the females.
