In late September, The Tyrone Area School District continued its tradition of honoring outstanding Tyrone Area High School graduates. Dr. Joy K. (Dippery) Ward, a distinguished alumnus of the TAHS Class of 1988, completed her Bachelor of Science degree at Penn State University in 1991. She furthered her education at Duke University, obtaining a Master of Science in Biology in 1994 and a Doctor of Philosophy in Biology in 1997.

Joy is presently the Provost and Executive Vice President at Case Western Reserve University. Additionally, she holds a position as a professor of biology within the College of Arts and Sciences, having previously served as the dean from 2020 to 2023.

As dean, Joy spearheaded significant growth by enhancing educational opportunities for students, advancing research that improves quality of life, and boosting fundraising efforts to support student scholarships and societal needs. Additionally, she strengthened the influence of the arts and humanities within the university.

Under her leadership, the university initiated a \$60 million program aimed at enhancing mental health services, focusing on increasing the availability of mental health care providers in the community and fostering research advancements that will enhance mental health care on a global scale. Additionally, Joy established the Expanding Horizons Initiative, which has garnered over \$9 million in donations, to promote collaborative projects between students and faculty that yield real-world benefits. She also led the Experimental Humanities Initiative, designed to support new

educational and research programs that more deeply integrate the humanities with science and technology.

As provost, she serves as the chief academic officer of the university where she promotes innovation in academic programs, research and scholarship, and student support. She has led a strategic initiative to add 100 new faculty positions to the university, collaborated on planning for a new Interdisciplinary Science and Engineering Building, and has overseen the launch of new educational supports for undergraduate students.


An award-winning researcher, Joy is internationally recognized for her contributions to understanding plant responses to environmental changes, spanning from the last glacial period to future scenarios. She serves as co-editor of the book, *Photosynthesis, Respiration and Climate Change* (Springer 2021). Additionally, Joy has been honored with the Outstanding Science Alumni Award from Penn State's Eberly College of Science, and the 2009 Presidential Early Career Award for Scientists and Engineers, which is awarded directly by the White House.

Joy credits her early development in leadership and service to Ronald Thomas, her high school counselor and Key Club leader, as well as her passion for science, which was nurtured by exceptional educators at Adams Elementary School, particularly Elizabeth Beringer, and at Tyrone Area High School.

Mr. John H. Gilliland, a distinguished alumnus of the TAHS Class of 1982, and a 1987 graduate of California Polytechnic State University, has emerged as a prominent leader and innovator in the self-storage industry over the past 25 years.

In 1997, John brokered his first self-storage facility in Hanover, Pennsylvania. The following year, he established the Investment Real Estate Group of Companies (IREGC), which includes Investment Real Estate, LLC, and launched his first Moove In Self Storage facility near State College, Pennsylvania.

Since then, John has founded numerous self-storage-oriented enterprises that have gained national prominence, such as Investment Real Estate Management, LLC, one of the largest firms in the United States offering professional, fee-based management services to self-storage clients, and Investment Real Estate Construction, LLC, which has developed over 3.5 million square feet of self-storage space. Throughout its first 25 years, IREGC evolved into a national leader, employing over 100 individuals who provide brokerage, feasibility, construction, development, insur-

ance, and property management services primarily in the Mid-Atlantic, Northeast, and Midwest regions. During this period, the company facilitated hundreds of transactions, generating over \$1.3 billion in sales for its clients and expanding its Moove In Self Storage portfolio to more than 80 properties across nine states. In 2022, John decided to retire the company's brokerage services to concentrate exclusively on acquisitions aimed at growing the Moove In Self Storage portfolio.

Moove In Self Storage was retired as a Participating Regional Operator from National Storage Affiliates, which is a Real Estate Investment Trust traded on the New York Stock Exchange, in July of 2024.

IREGC opened its new headquarters in a historic, LEED Platinum certified building on North George Street in downtown York in May of 2023, bringing the company's dynamic energy and culture to the area.

In recognition of his leadership and contributions, John was inducted into the inaugural class of the Pennsylvania

Mr. David C. Hileman, a distinguished alumnus of the TAHS Class of 1962, has dedicated himself to dairy farming over the last 46 years, adhering to the philosophy that "Farming as a lifestyle can be a poor business model, but farming as a business can lead to a great lifestyle."

Throughout his farming career, David has garnered numerous accolades, including the Pennsylvania "Master Farmer Award," recognition as "Pennsylvania Farmer of the Year," and the title of "World Dairy Exposition Dairyman of the Year." He was also honored for "Outstanding Farmland Conservation" by the Blair County Conservation District. Additionally, the Blair County Chamber of Commerce presented him with the "Excellence in Small Business Award" and the "Agriculture Community Excellence Award."

David and his wife of 45 years, Janet, are guided by the belief that "No one can help everyone, but everyone can help someone." They have been blessed to provide over three hundred scholarships to local high

school students and were honored with the "Central Pennsylvania Philanthropy Award" by the Central Pennsylvania Community Foundation. They have long supported 4-H and Future Farmers of America (FFA), recently receiving the "Blue and Gold Award" from the Tyrone Area FFA Chapter. David has held leadership roles in various local, state, and national dairy organizations and has represented two major agricultural cooperatives, delivering presentations throughout the United States and Europe, with his most memorable experience being a speaking engagement in India.

In retirement, David has volunteered on several local boards, including the Fort Roberdeau Association, Penn Highlands Tyrone Regional Board, the Tyrone-Snyder Public Library, and the St. John's Lutheran Church Council.

Both David and Janet attribute much of their success to the education they received at Tyrone Area High School.


Dr. Terry L. Singer, a distinguished alumnus of the TAHS Class of 1964, was raised in Tyrone, the eldest son of Clinton and Dotty Singer. His younger brothers, Tony and Tim, graduated from TAHS in 1965 and 1967, respectively.

After high school graduation, Terry pursued further studies at the Pennsylvania State University, where he earned a Bachelor of Arts degree; Pittsburgh Theological Seminary, where he earned a Master of Divinity degree; and the University of Pittsburgh, earning Master of Social Work and Doctor of Philosophy degrees.

In the early stages of his career, while residing in the Pittsburgh area, Terry worked with street gangs and individuals dealing with substance abuse and psychiatric disorders, eventually taking on the role of director at an alternative high school in the city.

In 1977, Terry embarked on a career in higher education at Marywood College, now known as Marywood University, in Scranton, Pennsylvania, where he became the Dean of Social Work in 1984. In 1997, he transitioned to the University of Louisville in Kentucky, assuming the deanship of Social Work. Throughout his career, Terry emerged as a community leader and a nationally esteemed educator in social work. Upon his retirement from the University of Louisville in 2016, he held the distinction of being the longest-serving Dean of Social Work in the nation.

Over his successful career, Terry garnered numerous awards from universities, communities, and national organizations in recognition of his service and leadership. He currently lives in Louisville with his wife, Dr. Nancy Singer. Their children, Zachary and Joshua, and his family, also reside in the Louisville area.

Self Storage Hall of Fame in 2018. He received the highest honor in his industry when he was inducted into the National Self Storage Association Hall of Fame in 2020. In 2024, he was honored with the Lifetime Achievement Award by Vistage, the world's largest CEO coaching and peer advisory organization. John is not only successful in his career but also deeply involved in philanthropy work, as well as a devoted husband and father. He and his wife, Denise, founded the Gilliland

Family Foundation. Together with their four children and their spouses, they are committed to becoming civic leaders in York County. In 2017, Denise started Pink Power to help local breast cancer patients. The Gilliland family has purchased an ownership interest in the York Revolution, invested in the White Rose Impact Fund, and purchased several properties in downtown York, contributing to the area's revitalization movement.

Director/Commander Christopher P. Trimpey, a distinguished alumnus of the TAHS Class of 1977, was raised in Tyrone by his mother, Carol Trimpey. Following high school graduation, he enlisted in the U.S. Navy as a Seaman Recruit. His academic credentials include an Associate of Arts degree from Saint Leo College, a Bachelor of Liberal Studies degree from Mary Washington College, and a Master of Business Administration degree from Troy State University.

During his tenure in the U.S. Navy, Chris assumed significant responsibilities, rapidly advancing through the ranks. He was among the select few chosen for the Navy’s prestigious Limited Duty Officer Program (Mustang Officer), ultimately achieving the rank of Lieutenant Commander. He possesses extensive expertise in various warfare domains and excels in team-building across diverse organizations. Throughout his career, he managed four Command Centers, playing crucial roles in active Combat Operations. His knowledge of U.S. Navy Fleet Operations, Carrier Strike Group Operations, Joint/Coalition Force Operations, Aegis, Air Defense, and Space and Electronic Warfare is unparalleled.

Following his retirement from active military duty, Chris briefly served as a Technical Director for a Defense Contractor, where he was responsible for providing technical direction, operational guidance, and engineering management services to the Naval Surface Warfare Center, Port Hueneme Division’s Battle Force Interoperability Branch.


Later, Chris chose to return to the U.S. Navy as a Civil Servant, allowing him to continue making significant contributions. He was appointed as a Program Manager, working with some of the most advanced Naval Combat Systems in existence. In this role, he served as an interoperability certification authority, supporting the Naval Sea Systems Command in Washington D.C., with the primary goal of ensuring that Fleet Sailors received Naval Combat Systems that operated at the highest level required.

Chris was requested to transfer to the U.S. Navy Military Sealift Command as the Director of Assessments, Analytics, and Knowledge Management for a newly established Corporate Operations Directorate. He led substantial improvements in command data analysis initia-

tives and knowledge management for a command comprising 10,000 personnel operating 130 ships worldwide. Within three years, he built programs from the ground up that received commendations across the Department of Defense and the Federal Government. He reinvigorated the Command Continuous Process Improvement program and provided training to over 500 personnel. His development and implementation of the Commander’s Data Exploitation plan were executed flawlessly. His initiatives were significantly ahead of other Naval Commands in the execution of the Department of Defense and Navy’s Data Management Plan. By assembling a team of government civil servants, military personnel, Ph.D. graduates from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, and contractors, he established comprehensive Data Management and Knowledge Management programs that set the standard for U.S. Navy commands. He utilized Advanced Data Modeling and Artificial Intelligence well in advance of other Navy Commands.

Chris has received professional recognition at the highest levels. His accolades include the Navy Superior Civilian Service Medal, the Navy Meritorious Civilian Service Medal, the 2017 Department of Defense Chief Information Officer Cyber and Information Technology Excellence Award (Team Lead) presented by the Department of Defense and White House Chief Information Officers, the Curve Bender Award for innovation, and numerous high level military awards, including two Meritorious Service Medals, six Navy Commendation Medals, and two Navy Achievement Medals. His credentials encompass Knowledge Manager, AGILE Specialist, and Navy Master Training Specialist. He has participated in various Navy Technical and Managerial courses throughout his career, which has spanned over 40 years.

Chris, now fully retired, remains dedicated to mentoring others. As a lifelong learner, he actively engages in various roles, including serving as the Director and Youth Program Coordinator for the Suffolk-Nansemond Izaak Walton League, as well as being a member of the Virginia Beach Anglers Association and the Tidewater Virginia Grady White Club.

WHAT'S HAPPENING IN OUR SCHOOLS

The beginning of the school year has been busy at Tyrone Area Elementary School! The students have recently completed beginning of year assessments and are busy learning new reading, writing and math skills. The teachers met in October to discuss the student assessment scores and instructional needs. To ensure that we meet all academic needs, our reading specialists and teachers will utilize small group instruction to address specific learning needs of our students.

In addition to academics, the students are busy earning SOAR (Safety, Ownership, Achievement, and Respect) tickets when they demonstrate positive behavior choices. In September, the students were able to purchase a popsicle during a surprise “pop-up” SOAR event.

The students were excited to enjoy the special treat! At the end of October, students participated in a Glow Dance Party to celebrate their SOARing success.

The start of the year has also brought a physical change to the elementary main entrance. As guests enter the building, they will be asked to use the red phone in the vestibule to communicate with the secretary. Guests will be directed to wait in that area while students are retrieved for pick-up, or until they can be escorted into the building. While the routines are slightly different, we are happy to be making changes that assist in providing a safe and secure school environment for our students and staff.

In addition to our educational programming at Tyrone Area Middle School, students can participate in a variety of after-school clubs, music, and sports.

Starting in seventh grade, middle school students can participate in fall, winter, and spring sports. Fall sports include girls volleyball, football, cross country, and soccer. Winter sports include basketball and wrestling, and spring sports include baseball, softball, and track. Students who are musically inclined can participate in middle school band and chorus, starting in fifth grade. In addition, many older middle school students participate in high school band and chorus.

Tyrone Middle School offers a variety of clubs. Our Reading Club has seen great success in several area competitions. Meanwhile, our Math 24 Club attended its first competition last year. We also have several clubs geared toward community service, which include Builder’s Club, Student Council, SOAR (Safety, Ownership, Achievement, Respect), and National Junior Honor Society (NJHS). Fifth and sixth grade students can join Builder’s Club. This club visits local nursing homes and provides outreach to the community. Student Council, SOAR, and NJHS are open to students in seventh and eighth grades. These clubs help to manage many of our school events like dances and assemblies, as well as participating in community service projects. What’s more, we are in the beginning stages of organizing a middle school drama club and speech team.

Study after study has shown that participation in extracurricular activities supports success in the classroom. From sports to music to community service, our students can participate in a wide range of activities based on their own interest.

In the bustle of fall activities, a Career Day was scheduled for all students in Grades 9-12. Career Day was sponsored by the Tyrone-Snyder Public Library, Tyrone Chamber of Commerce, and various businesses. On October 25, students were given the opportunity to engage with representatives from various local businesses, including inspectionGo, American Eagle Paper Mills, Reclamere, W.R. Grace and Company, DelGrosso’s Amusement Park, Shoe Fly Shoe, Inc., and Stellar Floors. They participated in breakout sessions that addressed topics such as *Resume and Interview Strategies*, *Benefits and Pitfalls of Social Media*, *Artificial Intelligence and Navigating the Future of Technology*, and *The Framework and Opportunities in Business*. The event concluded with a question and answer session. The

primary objective was to offer students a day filled with discovery and inspiration as they explore the ever-changing world of career opportunities. Additionally, the event aimed to highlight the endless opportunities that our local area has to offer and to help invigorate pride in our community.

In addition to their involvement in other activities, Senior Alivia Anderson and Junior Brayden Parsons are serving as the Tyrone Area School Board Student Representatives for the 2024-2025 school year. Student board representatives attend each month’s school board meeting and represent students’ voices to the board. They provide insight for the board by reporting on things going on at the high school from the firsthand experiences of the students. Alivia is returning for her second year as a student representative with a stronger understanding of what it means to be a voice for her fellow classmates and peers. Brayden looks forward to serving as the junior representative. The student representatives do not get to vote on issues discussed in the board meetings; however, they can still bring up issues that are important to the student body.


