

Independent Research in Science and Engineering

This program encourages students to become scientists or engineers through the development of a project of their own design. With mentorship from a faculty member, students discern a question to address, write a detailed project proposal, conduct the experiment or implement their designs, analyze their data, and communicate their findings through a written report and oral presentation at the annual Science and Engineering Fair. Many students advance to present their work at the regional, statewide, and international Science and Engineering Fairs. Notable student achievements include earning awards to develop a patent on their design and receiving recognition from national societies.

Global Studies Program

This Grade 10 program is an interdisciplinary and experiential approach to the humanities, enriching students' understanding of global cultures by combining surveys of modern history and global literature from the French Revolution to the present.



Hesed Program

Hesed is Hebrew for loving-kindness. Students in Grade 11 complete 40+ hours of direct service at an organization where they form relationships rooted in the ethic of reciprocity. This program fosters the building of community and invites students to respond to the Gospel call to work for social justice—an act that leads to a deepening of faith. Through reflection, which encourages critical thinking and personal growth, students mature intellectually, emotionally, and spiritually and continue to hone a true sense of purpose.



Senior Project

This program invites students to discern, pursue, and engage in an independent professional externship during the final month of Grade 12. The project can take the form of an internship, service project, job shadow, or carefully planned creative endeavor and culminates in the Senior Project Symposium, where each student presents experiences and outcomes in response to an essential question they have articulated. Recent projects include interning with a member of Congress, shadowing a surgeon, assisting the executive director of a non-profit, writing a novel, and composing and recording an album.

Grading Information

For Honors and Advanced Placement Courses, grades are recorded on transcripts as reported by the teacher. In calculating academic honors, Honors and Advanced Placement courses are weighted a full grade higher than they are recorded.

Students' weighted GPAs are rounded to the nearest third of a point on a 4.0 scale.
