On 27th June, over 850 students and staff clocked up an impressive 6,500 hours of volunteering work, at over 45 local venues, as part of our annual Community Action Day plans.

The work parties visited various charities including St Wilfrid's Hospice, Stonepillow, Aldingbourne Trust, THINK18, Chichester Community Development Trust, Ferring Country Centre and the Foodbank, whom we have pledged to support on an ongoing basis. In addition to volunteering at their warehouses, our onsite team made up an incredible 400 food boxes to support local children during the summer holiday.

Work parties also volunteered at over 20 eco projects, which included the Year 6s working with Surfers Against Sewage.

The format of the day offers a bespoke programme of events that aims to educate students, raise awareness, promote self-esteem and resilience, and most importantly make a positive impact in the local community.

Community Action Day also serves to support local clubs that are run by volunteers, and students were carefully selected to spend the day at the clubs where they are members outside of school. The day also offered students the opportunity to visit the nursing homes whom we have close links with and regularly visit throughout the school year.

We are always proud to be able to support the NHS in some way, and work parties this year visited the local Medical Centre in Petworth and Worthing Hospital, and we returned to St Richard's Hospital to work on 'Phase 3' of the Wellbeing Gardens at the Donald Wilson Rehabilitation Unit.

Seaford have a strong relationship with the Donald Wilson Unit, another place where regular visits take place during the school year. Patients and staff were treated to a lunchtime concert by one of our school bands, which is always a joy and delight for everyone on the ward.

Next year, we will be looking to increase membership and student responsibilities to all councils, by encouraging the Sixth Form students to have a more active role in the planning and implementation of the agendas.

To maintain a strong personal development programme, we have been encouraging all students to give feedback on our guest speakers. Scanning QR codes has become second nature to us all. This is a powerful method as it has enabled the College to plan more specific lessons around the needs of the students. They can provide honest feedback, which directly informs outcomes and future planning. This term, 'Feeling safe at school', 'Ad Alta characteristics' and 'House Competition activities' were the key 'Big Questions'. With a 75% response rate for the safety survey (from Years 1 to 13), over 95% of students said they felt safe at school. Seaford College respects the needs of all our students, and every individual's views matter. Thank you to all the students for their participation.

# Mental Health Awareness Week Assembly

Monday, 13th May, 2024 saw the beginning of Mental Health Awareness Week bringing the Seaford Community together with a thought-provoking assembly led by students and staff.

Students and staff spoke powerfully about their experience of mental health, either personally or through people close to them. Our Head Girl demonstrated how asking for help is not a sign of weakness but a sign of strength. A member of the Sports Department shared a very personal story from his time at university, offering advice that often the people you least expect hide their pain with big smiles, and you will never know unless you talk. Lastly, a Year 13 student explained that the culture at Seaford had been transforming for her and had been the happiest of her school years, in contrast to previously where she had felt selfconscious, less expressive and was searching for a way to fit in. The assembly received incredibly positive feedback and encouraged some students to open up about issues they are facing.

## Interschool Wellbeing Conference

During Mental Health Awareness Week in May, we hosted our Wellbeing Conference, welcoming over 130 delegates from 65 different schools and educational settings. The aim of the day was to share best practice between all schools to positively impact the students we interact with daily.

The programme was full and varied, covering topics such as worry, stress and anxiety, supporting students with trauma, the benefits of breathwork, eSafety and Peer Mentoring. Our attendees took part in our Outdoor Wellbeing and Learning Carousels, which included breathwork, whittling/knife work, nature and wellbeing walks, forest art, martial arts, Pilates and pewter smelting.

We are already planning our next event and have received a number of requests to attend Seaford College to further learn about how we support students on our pastoral hubs, No.46 and Prep4.



## Peer Mentor Update

The Peer Mentors have been very busy supporting the Seaford Community, offering an empathetic ear (and getting fully involved in the fun activities) at break times in the Prep School, Year 9 and Year 10 Common Rooms, No.46 and the Library.

1:1 Peer Mentoring, where a specific Peer Mentor is asked to mentor a student who is having difficulties, has been a big success, and younger students have really valued being able to hear from an older student regarding how they may have coped with similar issues in the past.

The No.46 team organised an end-of-term 'Peer Mentor breakfast', allowing all the Year 12 Mentors an opportunity to come together and reflect upon successes as well as evaluating where the service can improve and progress in the future. They are the 'eyes and ears' around the College and provided excellent feedback to allow the scheme to evolve further to benefit the Seaford Community next year and beyond.

## Personal Development Skills Groups

A selection of Year 9 and 10 students have been taking part in Small Group Personal Development Sessions. The aim of these sessions is to improve wellbeing by focusing on areas such as selfawareness, relationships and decision-making. Each session involves a challenge which is then used to fuel discussions and self-reflection. The sessions are in a trial period, but it is something we hope to explore further.

Personal Development (PD) provides the backbone for student independence, confidence and mental progression. While we have specific timetabled lessons every Wednesday morning, dedicated to this journey of life, personal growth is always happening, in all places across the Seaford campus, always. Our students support one another to become assertive, tolerant young adults who demonstrate and receive the respect of their peers. To value similarities and celebrate our differences is what makes our community strong.

Before Years 13 and 11 began BTECs, A Levels, and GCSEs respectively, the Heads of Year, James Kimber and Sarah Cullen, made sure that the PD programme was packed with quality lessons and guest speakers. The Year 13s focused on voting and democracy, independent living and the dangers of extremism before taking part in a workshop with Matt Pinkett, who delivered a presentation on being allies to one another, followed by a celebratory preexam breakfast on their final PD session. Before the Year 11s received last-minute revision skills to complement the past year's careful exam planning pathway, they attended an excellent 'Freedom and Festivals' presentation from Relationship and Sex Education (RSE) specialists 'It Happens', which was followed by practical First Aid training to ensure our students are risk aware and have the right tools to make wise choices.




Year 12 spent time familiarising themselves with the UCAS process and taxation, together with guest speakers discussing their legal rights with Mr Russell Robinson, a solicitor advocate. 'It Happens' returned to deliver a presentation focusing on the dangers of sextortion and how males between the ages of 18-25 are most at risk; the key takeaways were to get help early and not be embarrassed or ashamed; support is there for you. The Year 10s focused on consent and pornography issues in RSE, followed by careers workshops. John Green also invited students to the Sixth Form area to start thinking about their educational pathway, post-16. Students were excited to see the space available, with the café, study areas and extended workrooms. It has started some great conversations among them. Year 10 parents were also privy to an informal coffee morning to ask questions and see for themselves the great work that the Sixth Form staff do. Year 9 enjoyed a carousel of activities such as leadership, financial independence, world culture and personality types, culminating in a 3-week RSE carousel of activities with Shannon Reddin.



Teaching is a profession with never stands still. The days of staff standing at the chalkboard lecturing students about Henry VIII or quadratic equations are long gone. At Seaford, our staff are always reflecting on their impact, where they can improve and how to share the many areas of their practice in which they excel.

Seaford's commitment to providing the best possible education for your children means we are always looking for ways to enhance the teaching and learning experience. Our Impact Review Cycle, implemented by Heads of Department, is one of our core mechanisms for engaging with continuous development and innovation. Alongside this, Middle and Senior Leaders conduct frequent lesson visits with over 1,100 lessons seen across the course of this year and over 120 lessons observed from start to finish.




Each year, Heads of Department analyse exam results, the quality and quantity of prep, the teaching (through lesson observations) and the learning (through examining student books/ OneNote), and they gather student voice (through surveys) before reflecting in the Summer Term on changes that need to be made for next year. This long-standing Impact Review Cycle has enabled Heads of Department to keep their fingers on the pulse of classroom teaching as well as provide useful data for Senior Leaders to act upon.

This term, teachers conducted student voice surveys seeking feedback from students about their lessons, teaching and progress. Students were overwhelmingly positive about their teachers, citing the great enthusiasm and energy staff displayed for their subjects, the positivity generated within lessons and the quality of feedback given after assessments.

Looking ahead, we are exploring how all students arrive to lessons ready to learn and hit the ground running immediately. Also, debate-based subjects are reflecting on how to balance debates and discussions alongside learning new content.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank all the students who sat exams/assessments during the Summer 2024 series for their immaculate behaviour and professionalism during this stressful time. We wish them all our very best for their respective results days.

This summer has seen the largest number of exam entries Seaford has ever had. Across 61 different specifications/subjects, just over 1,950 entries have been made for 440 students in Years 10-13. They have sat a total of 3,370 written public exam papers, along with several online external assessments. Enabling these exams to run smoothly and looking after all these students and their access arrangements are a team of 45 invigilators, readers and scribes who have quietly invigilated for over 2,600 hours between them this summer.

A key component of Seaford's ethos is achieving one's personal bests through Ad Alta. One of the provisions we embody with strength is a sense of personalised learning for each and every student, ensuring each child is on the right flight path to their success.

We have developed a rigorous system of tracking and challenging our students, through the Challenge Grade system. This is often used as a starting point for key discussions in a student's academic journey here. Occasionally, a student may stumble within this journey, and it is a particular strength of the College that we can quickly facilitate a graduated support programme, both pastoral and academic, to accommodate each student's needs.

Most recently, support has taken the form of subjectspecific clinics for all Year 11 and 13 students sitting their external exams. Students are individually invited to these subject clinics and are thereby given an individual study schedule for their period 8 sessions.

In addition to this, we provide both group and 1:1 study skill/revision sessions for students, so they feel equipped to tackle various types of exam questions.

Finally, we provide a very balanced and broad curriculum for students that combines both BTEC/CTECH qualifications with A Levels and GCSEs. In this manner, all students are empowered to achieve their 'personal bests'.

It is simply a matter of finding the right tailored academic programme for them.





# Students continue to be busy during our dedicated Activity, Support and Prep slot, which takes place each day between 4:30pm and 5:30pm.

This term saw the introduction of some new activities for a range of year groups. Our Year 8s have the opportunity to be introduced to CCF in preparation for joining in full. This has proved to be a popular addition and will continue again in the future. Our Climbing Development activity has targeted students in the Senior School who want to develop their techniques in order to improve their standings in climbing competitions.

As we look ahead to next year, we have a plethora of new clubs and activities being launched. These include Comic Book Club for Years 8-13, a new Engineering Club, which aims to develop the skills of our budding engineers and physicists, and a Lego Coding Club for our youngest students, which will combine the skills of building, design and coding. We are also relaunching Polo Club for the Senior School and starting an Ultimate Frisbee Cub for Years 7, 8 and 9

Our activities that have a focus on Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths (STEM) continue to improve in popularity, and next year we look forward to the continuation of the Artificial Intelligence (AI) Club, the Biomedical Society and of course our range of Greenpower Clubs to fit all age groups.

We regularly encourage students to give us suggestions for new clubs and activities. Please do not hesitate to reach out with new ideas, and we will look to see if we can incorporate them into our programme.



# Outdoor Education (including Duke of Edinburgh Award)

This Summer Term, the Outdoor Team has entered its busy window, which sees students of all ages competing in a number of sailing competitions, experiencing Prep School bushcraft camps, mountain biking at Queen Elizabeth Country Park and the return of the popular 'trad climbing residential' on Stanage Edge in Derbyshire.

Silver participants have commenced finalising their route plans for the Forest of Dean Expedition that is due to take place this term, where students will have the opportunity to take in Symonds Yat, the River Wye and the Naval Temple!

The Gold Practice Canoeing Expedition will take place at the end of term with a location change this year. Students will experience independently journeying down the River Wye. All Gold participants have made steady progress through their training on the River Arun, Basingstoke Canal and the River Wey in Guildford, where they have mastered portaging, boat paddling skills, rescue and recovery, and most importantly how to pack all of their provisions to avoid them getting wet!



#### Seaford Welsh 3000s

An adventurous group of Year 12s took on the Seaford Welsh 3000s Challenge in Snowdonia over a very wet and windy few days in late April.

#### Athletics

At the Sussex County finals, Seaford saw 17 students earn podium positions, rewarding some with a place in the Sussex team and others getting to directly compete at the national finals.

The Prep School athletes were also heavily involved in the programme with over 80 students competing in friendly meetings, county events and the national finals this coming Wednesday, 3rd June. A true testament to their continuous hard work, enthusiasm and enjoyment of the sport.

Remarkably, 29 new school records were set, demonstrating the talent and commitment of our athletes across all age groups. We thank our coaching team who have offered inclusive training sessions and provided developmental opportunities to all students. Seaford Athletics has fostered a vibrant and engaged athletic community, enhancing individuals' athletic ability and developing their physical competency. Congratulations to all our athletes for an outstanding season.



#### Cricket

Seaford Cricket has had an amazing summer, with participation levels and the number of fixtures at a record high. With a brand-new state-of-the-art net facility completed and now in use, the cricket provision has seen games sessions of the highest quality.



This is reflected in some outstanding results through the term. The Boys' teams have had a fantastic run with some highly competitive Wednesday and Saturday block fixtures and the U13s, U14s, U15s and 1st XI teams all into Cup Finals to cap off a terrific season.

#### **Tennis**

Nearly 60 students from Year 7 to Year 13 have represented the College on weekends, showcasing their dedication and enthusiasm for the sport. For the first time, we entered all year groups into the LTA national competition, resulting in close and exciting matches. As we approach the end of the year, we look forward to our annual Wimbledon tennis trip, providing students with the opportunity to watch world-class tennis on one of the most prestigious stages in the world. ## Equestrian

Three pre-qualified teams took part in the NSEA National Eventers Challenge Championships at Hickstead in May half-term, with all our riders showing great ability over the demanding show jumping and cross-country courses and having a very enjoyable weekend.

Our Show Jumping team won the 90/95cm with some excellent individual results, and our 100/105m Show Jumping team was placed 3rd.

At Felbridge in June, we won the 100/105m Jumping with Style and came 2nd in the 100/105m Show Jumping, qualifying both teams for the National Championships.

At the end of term, we have two teams competing at Hickstead in the National Senior Schools Championships, where our riders have the amazing opportunity to compete in the famous International Arena as well as a Dressage & Show Jumping competition at Coombelands.

The Grassroots riders have been gaining much experience with a super team win in the 50cm, a second in the 60cm and a third in the 40cm in their first competition this season, qualifying them for the NSEA Grassroots Festival in August. Congratulations to all our great riders.







# With nearly 60 different competitions taking place this year, the Senior School Inter-house Competition has continued to go from strength to strength.

A crucial component of literacy development has to be recognised by the students themselves. We have therefore conducted a student voice survey on literacy, throughout the Middle School.

Prior to the May half-term, within tutor time, students were queried on key aspects of literacy. Firstly, students were asked why literacy was so important. We were thrilled to note that all students could recognise that literacy helps them to communicate, understand and, overall, is deemed a key "life skill". Furthermore, we asked students to define how we could improve literacy within the College. Encouragingly, students responded that more reading opportunities would be beneficial, as well as an overall reward system for increased reading. As action points therefore, from September, we will be introducing structured reading time for Year 9 within tutor times. Additionally, we will be launching an increase in reading competitions across year groups, with prizes and rewards for effort. Finally, positive day books will be given, from September, for engagement in reading. In this way, I hope we can continue to grow the College and the fundamental "reading culture" within the campus.

#### Young Writers




# **Amazing Book Awards**

Students from Years 9, 10 and 11 enjoyed an evening of celebration at Shoreham Academy for the Sussex Amazing Book Awards this term.

Students from our weekly book group had the opportunity to meet authors from the shortlisted books they had been reading this term, along with a chance to buy a signed copy of each book and have it dedicated to them. The event is celebrated by many secondary schools across Sussex, and students are always excited to find out which of their chosen authors has won the prize.





On 13th June, Seaford College hosted a webinar on Artificial Intelligence (AI). The session was led by Dave Crook, Head of Computing; Chris Hawley, Director of Innovation; and Jo Forman, Assistant Head – Safeguarding and Resilience.

Dave Crook introduced the concept of AI, explaining its various subcategories, including machine learning and deep learning. He emphasised the importance of understanding the intentions behind AI systems and the need for transparency in AI development. He also highlighted the rapid advancements in AI, particularly the emergence of large language models like ChatGPT.

Chris Hawley focused on the practical applications and implications of Al. He discussed the potential risks, including data security, environmental impact, misinformation and bias. However, he also highlighted the benefits of Al, such as increased productivity and enhanced creativity. Chris stressed the importance of viewing Al as a tool, not a replacement for human intelligence.

The webinar concluded with a discussion on the future of AI in education. The speakers emphasised the need for students to develop critical thinking skills and values in a world increasingly influenced by AI. They also outlined Seaford College's approach to AI education, which includes workshops, assemblies and resources for students. Jo Forman answered a question about sexploitation using AI images, explaining that AI magnifies harms we already deal with; it is not an entirely new threat, so the systems in place to deal with issues are robust enough to cope with challenges arising.

We hope it was useful, informative and thoughtprovoking. Parents who are interested and could not join the event can find the slides and recording on FireFly.

We continue to develop our approach to teaching students about AI and are cautiously excited about its potential uses in education.





#### Year 13

For most of the Upper Sixth, the Summer Term marks the end of their UCAS journey. We were delighted that a record number of students accepted offers for 2024/2025 start dates at university. To prepare students to make these choices, several talks were delivered during PD time along with a very well-attended webinar for all parents. The talks revolved around the practicalities of how to firm/ensure university offers, advice on which offer(s) to choose and which not to, the clearing process, results day, as well as sessions on student accommodation and student finance. We now look forward to results day when all the hard work is a distant memory for the students and the exciting next steps in their educational journey begin.



#### Year 12

The Summer Term for the Lower Sixth is when students are really encouraged to think about life after Seaford, with PD sessions, talks and visits focused on post-18 destinations. Highlights of the term have included the UCAS fair at the University of Portsmouth. This annual event gives students a chance to talk to a number of representatives from most of the universities in the UK, along with representatives from some of the bigger companies offering apprenticeships and gap year providers. With informative talks by experts on a variety of student issues, this was an extremely useful and informative day for all those who attended.

In house, we ran an open Q&A forum for students and parents to answer the many questions that those thinking about life after Seaford typically have. Topics included advice on open days, how predicted grades relate to Challenge Grades, UCAS Points, deciding on a course and university, degree apprenticeships, gap years and key dates for the year group moving into the Upper Sixth.

One area that students often fear the most when it comes to university, apprenticeship and job applications is the personal statement / cover letter. We were delighted that, once again, the Life Skills Company were able to come into school during the last week of the year to work with our Year 12s in completing this challenging document.

Next term, we hit the ground the running with PD sessions focused on ensuring applications are submitted as early as possible, and tutors, Head of Year and the UCAS team will be available to assist with this process.

It has been a busy term for Academic Scholars across the school.



In the process, they raised over £1,000 for the Chichester-based homeless charity.


As part of Community Action Day, the students completed yet another Kids Lunch Pack (KLP) order for the Chichester District Foodbank, packing just over 400 boxes to children on Free School Meals to supplement them during the summer holiday. Our longstanding commitment to the Foodbanks is strong as their needs get ever greater.

Here are the totals for all of Community Seaford's work this year. We have raised just over £20,000 supporting many worthy causes. We donated £30,000 worth of food through our Kids Lunch Pack termly pledge, creating over 1,200 food parcels. We accumulated 9,551 hours of community volunteering, through the Duke of Edinburgh's (DofE) Award scheme, small projects and Community Action Day. Using the DofE guidance that one hour of

community work equates to a social value of £5.27, this brings the financial total of voluntary hours to £50,334.

Together, Community Seaford has generated just over £100,000 this year. Thank you to all the students that have made this possible, together with parents, families and friends who have supported them along the way.





Another busy Summer Term sees Seaford College students, the Senior Management Team, teaching staff, operational and estates staff, plus catering and administration staff continuing to be active in their actions and understanding towards a greener and more sustainable Seaford College and its environment.

We are very optimistic for our third year of the International Eco-Schools Green Flag Award!

The three Eco-Schools' councils continue to engage the student voice and initiate actions on environmental matters, to enhance the use of our amazing school grounds and its abundant wildlife. The themes of biodiversity (Prep), healthy living (Seniors) and water (waste) (Sixth Form) have been the main focus. The 'Meet the Governors' session enabled the students to inform them about their green and sustainable proposals, especially the gardening club after school, newly released butterflies nurtured from caterpillars, and pond dipping at Botany Bay by students from the Prep School. They discussed and actioned proposals for three mapped-out green pathways around the College campus to enable students to increase their wellbeing and step count, and to engage with the wildlife at Seaford College.

Our links with Rwanda saw the arrival of Fr Jean (Headmaster) of Regina Pacis Secondary School (pictured, centre). Fr Jean has had a full week immersed in College lessons and this year's Community Action Day with the Midhurst Greening Group, helping in their communities. Thanks go to Kevin Finniear and the great many other staff who were involved. The winning Eco Logos Competition designs are set to be displayed inside all classrooms at the start of next term – well done Molly Nicolet, Grace Muir, Finn Eales (Yr 7) and Annable Walters (Yr 8). 






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
