DID YOU KNOW?

- 4,500 school directors serve Pennsylvania’s 500 public school districts; all boards have nine members.
- School director elections are held every two years, on a 5-4 rotation to ensure continuity.
- All school directors are elected to four-year terms.
- School directors are elected locally; however, the state constitution delegates to them the responsibility to administer the school system as agents of the General Assembly.
- All school directors serve as volunteers, without pay.
- The number of female school directors was 41% in 2021.
- School directors are key decision-makers on issues such as school safety and security, budgeting, policy, hiring, and textbooks.
- 22% of Pennsylvania school directors have more than 10 years’ experience as of 2021.
- 60% of all districts involve students at their local board meetings.
- 42% of school directors attended the schools in the district where they serve.
- 95% of school directors have children who attend school in their district.
- 50% of school directors identified public service, and desire to give back and contribute to public education as the primary motivating factor in their decision to run for school director.

The colder weather has not stopped the Elementary students from enjoying their time within the classroom and with their friends. In addition, students have had opportunities to shop at our SOAR store and to purchase in-class rewards with their SOAR tickets. In January and early February, our students were excited to celebrate the 100th day of school and Valentine's Day by participating in special learning activities within the classroom.

In the coming weeks, the teachers and staff members will continue working with our students to improve their academic knowledge. Using mid-year assessment scores, the teachers are busy regrouping students for math and reading support so they can provide individualized instruction to best meet the needs of our students. As spring approaches, the Tyrone Elementary teachers, students and staff members are looking forward to warmer temperatures and increased opportunities for outdoor learning and play.

Despite the frigid temperatures outside, Winter is an exciting time to be a student at Tyrone Area Middle School.

In December, students prepared for the holidays by participating in a food drive. Students collected over 1500 items for our local food pantry in a competition between advisory classes. Parents and even some educators will question why we have Academic Detention, yet it has been a very effective tool at Tyrone Area High School.

It is so important that students understand that they will be held accountable for lesson participation, activities, assignments, projects, and homework – just as they will be held accountable in post-secondary schools or in the workplace. We want to instill in our students a strong work ethic.

Students are referred to the principal for Academic Detention by their regular classroom teachers after three missed assignments, three refusals to participate in class, one missed major project or test, or after having a failing grade for three weeks.

Students may be assigned to after-school academic support or to the regular detention room. Both of these assignments are mandatory attendance. There is a teacher in each of these classrooms who will offer one-on-one help to students. Academic Detention is held immediately after school Monday through Thursday each week.

If students complete their work or get their grades up before serving Academic Detention, the assigning teacher can excuse them from the detention. This fact alone often prompts students to get things done!

Packer enjoys interacting with all of the students at Tyrone Elementary—from birth (daycare) to Grade 4. "This age range allows me to have many different experiences and provide them with a positive figure that they can count on to assist them," said Packer.

To be eligible for Kindergarten, children must be five years old before September 1, 2022. Parents should register online at www.tyrone.k12.pa.us/registration. To prepare for online registration, families should ensure they have a copy of their child's birth certificate and proof of residency. Examples of proof of residency include a driver's license, rental contract, deed to property, or a current utility bill.

After almost fifteen years of service to the Tyrone Area School District, TAHS Principal Tom Yoder will retire on March 11. Under Yoder's leadership, Tyrone Area High School has had great academic success and a positive school climate in which students, teachers, and staff feel safe and valued.

The highlight of Yoder's professional career came in 2015 when Tyrone High School was named a National Blue Ribbon School by the U.S. Department of Education, which is the highest honor given to schools by the Department. “It was wonderful to see our students, teachers, and staff be recognized [at such a high level] for their hard work and dedication to academics,” said Yoder. “This is an amazing school community.” Tyrone is the first and only high school in Blair County to win a Blue Ribbon award and only the third high school in central Pennsylvania to be honored in the award's 33-year history. Tyrone English Teacher Steve Everhart credits Yoder's leadership as a major reason that Tyrone was able to earn this prestigious national award. “That accomplishment was made possible by his management style, which made each department accountable for student performance.”

But the Tyrone High School community appreciates Yoder for more than just producing high academic scores. Teachers describe him as approachable, positive, supportive, respectful, funny, easy-going, genuine, and encouraging. “Mr. Yoder was always so supportive as a principal. He listened to your ideas, encouraged you to do your best and understood when you struggled. He also had a great sense of humor and loved to add that humor into meetings,” said Business Teacher Amanda Burega.

According to Eagle Eye Advisor Todd Cammarata, one of Yoder's great strengths as a leader is that he trusts his

staff and students and empowers them to do good things. “I credit Mr. Yoder for a lot of the high school’s success over the past fifteen years. Teachers were never afraid to come to him with an idea, and he was always supportive and willing to let teachers and student groups experiment with new ideas. The result has been a school culture of respect between administrators, teachers, and students,” said Cammarata.

Science Teacher Ron Wilson had the opportunity to shadow Yoder one summer as a part of his master's program and enjoyed the experience. “He was always encouraging and supportive, no matter how many ridiculous questions I asked,” said Wilson.

Health Teacher Teresa Myers appreciates that Yoder always took a personal interest in her and others. “Mr. Yoder wasn't always about what went on within the walls of the school. He enjoys hearing about your family and what you have going on outside of school. He is a people person,” said Myers.

Teachers and staff also appreciate Yoder’s ever-present sense of humor. “Mr. Yoder would always walk past my office and pound on the window to scare me,” said Middle School Administrative Assistant Becky Schreckengost.

“I will miss the short and to the point faculty meetings. And the ice cream sundae bars that he would get for the teachers periodically,” said Chemistry Teacher Mike Funicelli.

Choir Director Laura Harris shared a heartwarming story that highlights Yoder’s love for the arts and music. “Mr. Yoder told me about a song that he absolutely loved and he shared a copy of the composition with me. Every year he would ask me if my group would be singing his song at the holiday concert and I would tell him that it was a little too religious for us to do,” said Harris. “Finally, I decided that we should surprise him with a performance of the song. Every time we rehearsed the song, I would have one of my guys serve as a ‘lookout’ in the main hallway, just in case Mr. Yoder was headed down to the music suite since we wanted the song to be a surprise for him. When we finally performed the song, it was obvious that it meant the world to him and the students were so happy that they got to do something special for Mr. Yoder,” said Harris.

According to superintendent Leslie Estep, the district has been fortunate to have Yoder lead the high school for the past fifteen years. “We are very appreciative of the longevity and consistency that he has provided to our district. Mr. Yoder is a people person and cares about others in a way that shows compassion and his staff members have found that to be one of his strongest attributes,” said Estep.

In retirement, Yoder plans to do some of the traditional retirement activities such as travel and tending to his garden. However, Yoder will be anything but a typical retiree. He will devote most of his time and energy to his duties as the new mayor of his hometown of Huntingdon.

A lifelong resident of Huntingdon, Yoder says he is excited for this new chapter in his life as the mayor of Huntingdon. “I think Huntingdon is lucky to have him representing their community; he will do a fabulous job in this new position,” said Tyrone High School Administrative Assistant Brooke Yaudes.

Even though he will be going back to his roots as a Huntingdon Bearcat, students and staff in Tyrone will always think of Yoder as a true Golden Eagle. “Mr. Yoder was a great principal, and I feel lucky to also call him my friend. He will be missed very much,” said English Teacher Kathy Beigle.
