Students Reach New Heights with New Aviation Class

We decided to interview Dr. Grant because he is the teacher of the new aviation elective. We wanted to hear his perspective of how the new class was going and what exactly they partake in.

Q: When and why did the class start?

A: Mrs. Shorten could give the full backstory to the origins of the class. Here's the quick version. There's been a group of parents meeting for a few years about how aviation might be an option at ECS. This was the year it worked out. The high school needed a wider variety of electives, an aviation curriculum existed, and they found a teacher interested in "piloting" the course.

Q: What is your background with aviation? Why were you interested in aviatioon? A: I've been interested in aviation since my early teens. The fact that hunks of metal carry tons of weight at incredible heights and wild speeds is fascinating.

Q: Could you detail some of the activities that your students do in the class?

A: We start each day with a daily gospel reading. We attempt to pay close attention to the words. Why is this important? Paying careful attention to the things right in front of you is critical for pilots. When



you fly a plane, many things need to happen quickly and with great care. You can't be a successful pilot if you cannot pay attention. (You won't be very successful if you can't pay attention!) Then, we spend time going through the necessary ground knowledge that will be required for the FAA private pilot's knowledge

test. That test will be part of the course.

Q: How many students do you have taking the class, and how many do you hope to have next year?

A: We have 13 students in the class, which seems to be a great number for a course like this.

Movie Review: Nickel Boys



Girls Golf: Region Champions & 4th in State!




