## **To Our Model Policy Subscribers:**

New Title IX Sex Discrimination Policy for Series 4000 (Personnel) and Series 5000 (Students)

The U.S. Department of Education recently issued the 2024 Title IX Final Rule on sex discrimination, including sex-based harassment (the "Final Rule"), which becomes effective on August 1, 2024. The Final Rule redefines sex-based harassment and broadens the scope of sex discrimination to include sex stereotyping, sex characteristics, pregnancy or related conditions, sexual orientation, and gender identity. We revised this policy and administrative regulations in accordance with the Final Rule, including new definitions and new grievance procedures. While we have included revised sex discrimination policies in Series 4000 (Personnel) and Series 5000 (Students), both policies are the same. Additional information about the Title IX changes can be found on the Shipman Title IX Resource Center.

We are in the process of revising a variety of additional model policies in accordance with the 2024 legislative changes. We will notify model policy subscribers by email once these additional revisions are available in the portal.

#### **Mandated Revision**

#### Title IX; Sex Discrimination or Harassment Prohibition

#### **Transgender and Gender Non-Conforming Youth**

### **Recommended Revision**

#### **Sunscreen Application in School**

The Bethany Board of Education (Board) permits the application of sunscreen by students within the Bethany Public School District, in accordance with State law. Specifically, notwithstanding the provisions of Connecticut General Statutes and the Board's policy and administrative regulation concerning the administration of medication in school, any student who is six (6) years of age or older may possess and self-apply an over the counter sunscreen product while in school prior to engaging in any outdoor activity.

For a student to apply sunscreen prior to engaging in any outdoor activity, the following elements must be met:

- 1. The student's parent or guardian must sign the Board's written authorization and submit the authorization to the school nurse; and
- 2. The student and the student's parent or guardian, where applicable, must comply with any individual school procedures concerning the possession and self-application of sunscreen in school.

The Board directs the Superintendent to promulgate regulations in furtherance of this policy.

#### **Recommended Revision**

#### **Statewide Proficiency/Mastery Examinations**

Each student enrolled in grades three (3) through six (6) inclusive shall annually take a mastery examination that measures essential and grade-appropriate skills in reading, language arts, and mathematics during a time period specified by the State Department of Education. Each student enrolled in grade five shall annually, during the time period specified by the State Department of Education, take a state-wide mastery examination that measures essential and grade appropriate skills in science; (Next Generation Science Standards). The State Board of Education (SBE) shall approve the provision and administration of all mastery examinations. All examinations shall take place during the regular school day.

The Bethany Public School District may not require achievement of a satisfactory score on a mastery examination or any subsequent retest on a component of such examinations as the sole criterion of promotion or graduation.

Special education students shall participate in mastery testing except in the rare case when their planning and placement team determines that participation would be inappropriate and recommends the use of an alternative assessment as specified by the SBE.

All English Learners (ELs) including recently arrived, defined as those students whose initial entry date in a U.S. school is less than two years (24 months) prior to test administration are required to participate in all content areas of the state summative assessment.

All students identified as ELs will take the LAS Links Assessment. Scores on each component of the mastery examination for ELs who have been enrolled in school in this state or another state for fewer than twenty (20) school months shall not be used for the purposes of calculating the school performance index as defined in Connecticut General Statutes Section 10-223e.

Scores from year 1 are ready to serve as a baseline for academic growth in Year 2. In year 3, the scores of recently arrived ELs will be included toward academic achievement and academic growth indicators in Connecticut's accountability system.

Any alternate assessment, including the Connecticut Alternate Assessment, of students enrolled in special education, shall be available only to those students with significant cognitive disabilities. Students with significant cognitive disabilities in grades three (3) through six (6) shall be assessed with the Connecticut Alternate Assessment in language arts and mathematics. In science, eligible students with significant cognitive disabilities will be assessed with the Connecticut Alternate Science Assessment in grade five (5).

In compliance with federal law, out-of-level testing is not an option for students enrolled in special education.

The Bethany Board of Education (Board) recognizes that federal law requires full participation of all students on the state summative assessments, with a minimum standard for the participation rate of at least 95 percent of all students and all student groups for each subject. Further, the Board realizes there are consequences for the District not meeting this participation role threshold on these state summative assessments.

### **Technical Revision**

#### **Use of Private Technology Devices by Students**

Students may possess Privately owned technological devices on school property and/or during school-sponsored activities, in accordance with the mandates of this policy and any applicable administrative regulations as may be developed by the Superintendent of Schools.

#### **Definitions**

#### **Board Technology Resources**

For the purposes of this policy, "Board technology resources" refers to the Bethany Board of Education's (Board) computers and instructional technologies; communications and data management systems; informational technologies and the Internet; and any other technology resources owned and/or used by the Bethany Public School District (District) and accessible by students.

#### **Privately Owned Technological Devices**

For the purposes of this policy, "Privately owned technological devices" refers to privately owned desktop computers, personal computing devices cellular phones, Smartphones, network access devices, radios, personal audio players CD players, tablets, walkie-talkies, personal gaming systems, Bluetooth speakers, personal data assistants, AirPods, wireless headphones/earbuds, Apple watches, other wearable technology, and other electronic signaling devices.

#### **Use of Privately Owned Technological Devices**

Privately owned technological devices may not be used during instructional time, except as specifically permitted by instructional staff.

On school property, at a school-sponsored activity, while in use for a remote learning activity, or while being used to access or utilize the Board's technology resources, the use of any such device for an improper purpose is prohibited. Improper purposes include, but are not limited to:

- Sending any form of harassing, threatening, or intimidating message, at any time, to any person (such communications may also be a crime);
- Gaining or seeking to gain unauthorized access to Board technology resources;
- Damaging Board technology resources;
- Accessing or attempting to access any material that is obscene or contains pornography;
- Cyberbullying;
- Using such device to violate any school rule, including the unauthorized recording (photographic, video, or audio) of another individual without the permission of the individual or a school staff member; or
- Taking any action prohibited by any Federal or State law.

#### **Search of Privately Owned Technological Devices**

A student's Privately Owned Technological Device may be searched if the device is on Board property or in a student's possession at a school-sponsored activity and if there are reasonable grounds for suspecting that the search will turn up evidence that the student has violated or is violating either the law or the rules of the school. Any such search shall be reasonably related to the objectives of the search and not excessively intrusive in light of the age and sex of the student and the nature of the infraction.

#### **Responsibility for Privately Owned Technological Devices**

Students are responsible for the safety and use of their Privately owned technological devices. If a Privately Owned Technology Device is stolen, lost, or damaged while the device is on school property or during a school-sponsored activity, a report should be made to the building principal, who will investigate the loss in a manner consistent with the procedures for stolen or damaged personal property. Students and parents/guardians should be aware that the Board is not liable for any Privately Owned Technological Device that is stolen, lost, or damaged while at school or during a school-sponsored activity. For that reason, students are advised not to share or loan their Privately owned technological devices with other students.

#### **Disciplinary Action**

Misuse of the Board's Technology Resources and/or the use of Privately owned technological devices s to access or utilize the Board's Technology Resources in an inappropriate manner or the use of such devices in any manner inconsistent with this policy will not be tolerated and will result in disciplinary action. For students, a violation of this policy may result in loss of access privileges, a prohibition on the use and/or possession of Privately owned technological devices on school property or at school-sponsored activities, and/or suspension or expulsion in accordance with the Board's policies related to student discipline.

#### **Access to Board Technology Resources**

The Board may permit students, using their privately owned technology devices, to access the Board technology resources used by the District and accessible by students. Additionally, it is the expectation of the Board that students who access these resources while using Privately Owned Technology Devices will act at all times appropriately in ways that are fully in accord with applicable policies and administrative regulations concerning technology use as well as all local, state, and federal laws.

Through the publication and dissemination of this policy statement and others related to use of the Board's computer systems, as well as other instructional means, the Board educates students about the Board's expectations for technology users.

The Board's Technology Resources shall only be used to access educational information and to promote learning activities both at home and at school. Students are expected to act at all times appropriately in ways that are fully in accord with applicable policies concerning technology use as well as all local, state, and federal laws when using the Board technology resources. Failure to do so will result in the consequences outlined herein and in other applicable policies (including, but not limited to, the Safe School Climate Plan, the Student Discipline Policy, and the Use of Computers Policy).

STUDENTS 5133(c)

Students must abide by the procedures outlined in this policy and all policies and applicable regulations outlined in the Board's computer use and other applicable policies. Students will be given specific information for log-on and access procedures for using school accounts. No user may deviate from these log-on/access procedures. Students are advised that the Board's network administrators have the capability to identify users and to monitor all Privately owned technological devices while they are logged on to the network. Students must understand that the Board has reserved the right to conduct monitoring of Board technology resources and can do so despite the assignment to individual users of passwords for system security. Any password systems implemented by the Board are designed solely to provide system security from unauthorized users, not to provide privacy to the individual system user. The system's security aspects, message delete function, and personal passwords can be bypassed for monitoring purposes. Therefore, students should be aware that they should not have any expectation of personal privacy in the use of Privately owned technological devices to assess Board technology resources. This provision applies to any and all uses of the Board's technology resources and any Privately owned technological devices that access the same.

#### **Harm to Board Technology Resources**

Any act by a student using a Privately Owned Technological Device that harms the Board's Technology Resources or otherwise interferes with or compromises the integrity of Board technology resources will be considered vandalism and will be subject to discipline and/or appropriate criminal or civil action.

#### **Closed Forum**

This policy shall not be construed to establish a public forum or a limited open forum.

#### **Concept and Roles in Instruction**

#### **Student Achievement**

The Bethany Board of Education (Board) recognizes that the key work of school boards is to establish and promote a clear vision of student achievement as the top priority of the Bethany Public School District (District). The Superintendent will ensure development and implementation of a District-wide program for student achievement improvement that engages District stakeholders in a continuous improvement planning process that provides for annual review, revision as needed, and reports to the community. The District's program will be reflected in the District Strategic Plan and will include, but not be limited to, the following:

- Self-evaluation of current and prior disaggregate student achievement and behavioral data, including student and community demographics, District progress toward development and implementation of improvement programs, and community satisfaction.
- Data-driven goal setting and student learning objectives.
- Assessment systems for measuring students' progress in the fundamental learning areas.
- Action planning including provisions for accountability, professional staff development, steps to
  assure a safe educational environment conducive to learning, identification of local efficiencies
  and resources, steps to assure all students have access to the educational opportunities needed
  to meet the high standards of the State and District, resource allocation and realignment
  strategies needed to support improvement areas.
- Reporting systems for informing the community, and the State, of assessment results.

The District's program will be consistent with the requirements of the Connecticut Department of Education and reflected in the District Strategic Plan.

The Board, will in striving for continuous improvement of student achievement, annually review District and individual school data on student achievement. In addition, the Board will prioritize, allocate and realign resources as necessary.

#### **School Accountability**

The primary purpose of schooling is the transmission of knowledge and culture through which students learn in areas necessary to their continuing development and entry into the world of work. To fulfill that purpose, the State Board of Education prepared Connecticut's Common Core of Learning. The Board gives priority in the allocation of resources, including funds, time, personnel, and facilities, to fulfilling this purpose.

#### **Quality Assurance**

The Board shall continuously monitor the quality of the District's work. The Superintendent shall supervise the school's process for continuous school improvement.

#### **Emergencies and Disaster Preparedness**

The Board of Education recognizes that the health, welfare, and safety of its students and employees are dependent upon sound emergency preparedness planning. All employees of the Bethany Public School District (District) are responsible for doing everything in their power to promote the safety of all of the students at all times. District staff shall be prepared to respond immediately and responsibly to any combination of events which threaten to result in a disaster as well as to a disaster when it occurs.

The Superintendent or his/her designee shall use state-approved School Security and Safety Plan Standards and the accompanying School Security and Safety Plan Template to be compliant with the National Incident Management System, and incorporate the National Incident Command System when updating District and school level emergency and disaster preparedness plans. Such plan shall be based upon the standards issued by the Department of Emergency Services and Public Protection/Division of Emergency Management and Homeland Security and the accompanying School Security and Safety Plan Template. In addition to preparedness and response, the plan shall provide guidance on recovery from any emergency incident.

The District will cooperate with local law enforcement, fire department and civil defense authorities, and other civic agencies in the event of a declared emergency situation.

The school shall establish a school security and safety committee which will assist in developing and administering the school's safety and security plan.

#### First Aid and CPR

At least one (1) person at the school should hold current first aid and/or CPR certification.

#### **Ceremonies and Observances**

The Bethany Board of Education (Board) directs that the school administration provide students and staff with appropriate direction and guidance regarding ceremonies and observances.

#### **Holiday Celebrations and Observances**

The school administration is responsible for monitoring compliance with this policy. Pertinent information will be included in the student-parent and staff handbooks.

#### **Recognition of Religious Holidays**

The objective study of religious holidays provides a natural opportunity to promote an appreciation for and respect for diversity. Learning opportunities should extend beyond Judeo-Christian beliefs; reflecting the diversity of global cultures.

- 1. Recognition of religious holidays will not dominate the educational program and must support curricular objectives.
- 2. All religions must be afforded equal dignity, but none advanced nor disparaged.
- 3. Decorations which are part of custom, that have no direct religious meaning (Christmas tree, Menorah) may be displayed. Tree decoration should not promote religion nor require student participation.
- 4. Programs should focus on seasonal rather than religious themes' inclusive of concerts, enrichment programs, and Parent-Teacher Organization sales.
- 5. Performances that recognize holidays must be of an artistic nature, not religious. Religious music must not dominate any school program. Program selections should not, by their nature, exclude students from participation.
- 6. Parents/guardians may exclude their children from programs involving the recognition of religious holidays or if a celebration is in conflict with family beliefs. A written request for exclusion should be sent to the school administration.

#### **United States Flag**

The American Flag shall be raised above Bethany Community School during all school sessions, weather permitting. The Flag shall be raised before the opening of school and taken down at its close every day.

The American Flag shall be displayed in each classroom each day school is in session.

#### The Pledge of Allegiance

In accordance with state law, the Board shall ensure that a period of time is set aside each school day to allow those students who wish to do so the opportunity to recite the Pledge of Allegiance. This policy shall not be construed to require any person to recite the Pledge of Allegiance, should he/she choose not to do so.

#### **Silent Meditation**

The Board directs that the school administration shall provide for students and staff the opportunity to observe an appropriate period of time for silent meditation at the beginning of each school day.

#### **Migrant Students**

The Superintendent will develop and implement a program to address the needs of migrant children in the Bethany Public School District (District). This program will include a means to:

- 1. Identify migrant students and assess their educational and related health, nutrition, and social needs.
- 2. Provide, to the extent feasible, a full range of services to these students including applicable programs, special education, gifted/talented education, vocational education, language programs, counseling programs, and elective classes.
- 3. Provide these children with the opportunity to meet the same statewide assessment standards that all children are expected to meet.
- 4. Provide advocacy and outreach programs to these children and their families and professional development for District staff.
- 5. Provide parents/guardians an opportunity for meaningful participation in the program.

In providing services, priority shall be given to migratory children who have made a qualifying move within the previous one (1) year period and who are failing, or most at risk of failing, to meet the challenging State academic standards or who have dropped out of school.

#### Migrant Education Program for Parents/Guardians Involvement

Parents/guardians of migrant students will be involved in and regularly consulted about the development, implementation, operation, and evaluation of the migrant program.

Parents/guardians of migrant students will receive instruction regarding their role in improving the academic achievement of their children.

#### **Migratory Child/Student Definition**

- A. A migratory child means a child who:
  - 1. is a migratory agricultural worker or a migratory fisher; or
  - 2. in the preceding thirty-six (36) months, in order to accompany a parent, spouse, or guardian who is a migratory agricultural worker or a migratory fisher
    - i. has moved from one school district to another;
    - ii. is the child of a migratory fisher, resides in a school district of more than 15,000 square miles, and migrates a distance of twenty (20) miles or more to a temporary residence.
- B. Qualifying move means a move from one (1) residence to another residence that occurs due to economic necessity and from one (1) school district to another school district.
- C. Migratory Agricultural Worker means a person who has moved from one (1) school district to another in order to obtain temporary employment or seasonal employment in agricultural work, including dairy work.
- D. Migratory Fisher means a person who, in the preceding thirty-six (36) months has moved from one (1) district or another in order to obtain temporary employment or seasonal employment in fishing work.
