



Genesis began in 1973 as a hotline for people with crisis pregnancies and has since grown into a shelter, adoption agency, and educational facility. Clients can find counselors, receive shelter, take classes, or place their children up for adoption. This makes it a very pro-life agency. When volunteers walked into the Genesis Adoption Center for the first time in late June, the place was packed wall to wall with donations: car seats, bassinets, play pens, clothes, and diapers. In just two hours, the Aquinas volunteers cleared the entire space. "I chose to participate in Vivat Vita volunteer days because the impact we have on others is so tangible," senior Clara Yuo explained. She noted, "Genesis receives a lot of donations, so by sorting clothes into their proper bins, we made the process of selecting clothes much easier for those who utilize Genesis' services." Most other service dates were devoted to sorting baby clothes or assembling backpacks with school supplies for kids of struggling families.
