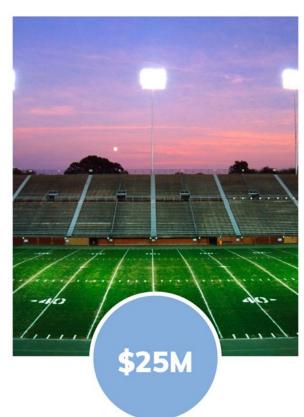

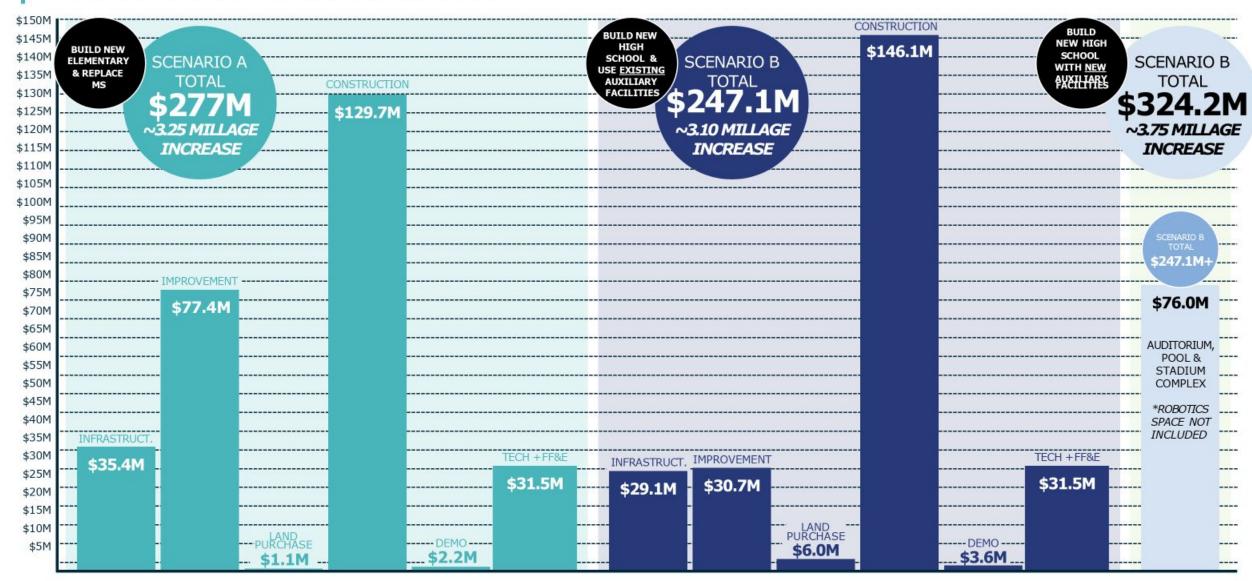

Follow-up Board Questions





Prek Programs



- Center based compared to distributed model
 - Survey data
 - Analysis of comments findings are inconclusive
 - Scenario A included distributed model which had high favorability
 - Research
 - No support for one model over the other for student outcomes
 - Quality of the program matters more than the specific location
- Ideas that emerged
 - Build new PreK Center estimated cost \$31M (\$21M net)
 - PreK in two schools estimated cost \$42.6M (\$32.6M net)



Grade Span Configuration



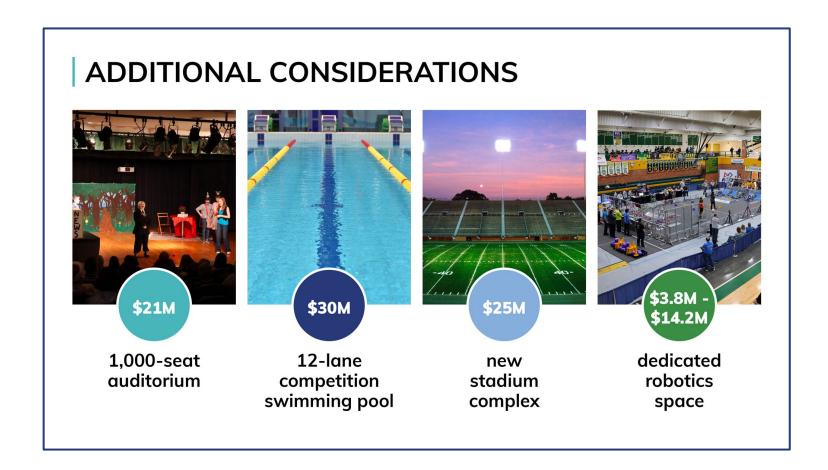
- Preference for particular grade configurations
 - Survey data
 - Analysis of comments findings are inconclusive
 - 9th grade
 - Scenario B with grade level modifications was not favored
 - Research
 - Inconclusive regarding which model best supports student outcomes
 - Transitions are challenging
