Second Elementary School, District Safety the Focus for February 2025 Bond Measure

The Hockinson School District School Board voted unanimously on October 28 to place a bond on the February 11, 2025 Special Election ballot. The proposal includes the construction of a second elementary school, improvements to the HHES campus, district-wide school safety upgrades, a new job



readiness education building and replacement track and multi-use field at the high school, and a covered outdoor area at the middle school.

WHAT WOULD THE BOND FUND?

The bond would bring the following improvements to Hockinson at a cost of about \$44/month for the average owner of a \$750,000 home.



A second elementary school next to Hockinson Meadows Park to relieve overcrowding at Hockinson Heights Elementary School (shown above). At 924 students, HHES is the largest elementary school by student population in Clark County.



Safety improvements at all Hockinson schools, bringing all schools to the same safety standards so that they have automatic lockdown functionality, electronic emergency messaging in classrooms and a single secure entry.



Career & Technical Education building for job readiness classes at Hockinson High School.



Improvements to outdoor areas at the middle and high school to increase year-round, multi-use access for students and community members while reducing maintenance costs.

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
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
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Superintendent's Message
