Building Kindness & Unity: Anti-Bullying Presentations

Blair Community Schools is hosting several important Anti-Bullying Presentations this week, aimed at fostering kindness, empathy, and community unity! These sessions are designed to empower students, teachers, parents, and staff to create safer, more inclusive spaces.

We invite all parents to join us for the parent session on Tuesday, November 12, from 6:30 - 8:00 p.m. in the high school auditorium.

Message from Blair Community Schools Superintendent, Dr. Randy Gilson



Dear Blair Community Schools Families,

Your child's safety drives every decision we make at all Blair schools. Today, we announce significant enhancements to our student safety programs, backed by strong data and powered by your partnership.

We invite all parents to attend our Bullying Prevention Parent Meeting on Tuesday, November 12, from 6:30 - 8:00 p.m. in the high school auditorium. This session is designed to inform you about our new procedures, listen to your concerns, and work collaboratively toward removing bullying and harassment from our school buildings. Together, we can build a more inclusive and respectful environment for all students.

We are implementing a new Bullying and Harassment Reporting System, accessible through this link <u>BCS Bullying & Harassment Reporting Form</u>. We strongly encourage all students, parents, teachers, staff, community members, and administrators to use this system to report any incidents of bullying or harassment.

Going forward, all reports of bullying and harassment will begin at the Central Office, which will oversee each report with thoroughness and consistency. Here's how our new centralized reporting process works:

- Lead Investigations with Assigned Teams: The Central Office will assign at least two trained administrators to investigate each report, ensuring a professional, impartial approach to gathering and assessing information.
- Provide Resources and Procedures: Our team will supply each investigative team with a structured set of procedures and a standardized set of questions to ensure all parties—victim, accused, and any witnesses or bystanders—are fairly heard and their perspectives documented.
- Structured Support Plans: If an allegation of bullying is confirmed, we will implement a structured support plan for the aggressor to address behavior changes and accountability.
- Simultaneously, a support system will be put in place for the victim to provide resources, counseling, and ongoing monitoring to ensure their well-being.
- Ensure Accountability and Consistency: All actions to address and eliminate bullying or harassment will be applied fairly and consistently across the district.
- Transparent Communication: Throughout the investigation process, the Central Office will support each school in maintaining clear,

transparent communication with students, parents, teachers, and staff, ensuring that all parties are informed and supported.

For those who prefer a completely anonymous option, we are offering a new 24/7 reporting system, Safe2HelpNE, in collaboration with Boys Town. Reports can be made at any time via phone or online. This system provides:

- Around-the-Clock Reporting: Available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.
- Direct Support from Crisis Counselors: Trained Boys Town counselors receive and address calls, and each report is immediately routed to the Central Office for follow-up.
- Immediate Investigation: Our Central Office initiates an investigation promptly upon receiving any reports from Safe2HelpNE.

Here is how students, parents, teachers, and staff can make a report.

- Download the app on either an Android or Apple phone
- Call 833-980-SAFE (7233)

This additional option allows families and students to discreetly report any safety concerns while ensuring immediate action and support.

To raise awareness and reinforce respectful behavior, we will be holding student assemblies at both the middle and high schools:

- Blair High School 11th and 12th Grade Assembly: Auditorium, 10:15 11:15 a.m., November 12
- Blair High School 9th and 10th Grade Assembly: Auditorium, 2:30 - 3:30 p.m., November 12
- Middle School Grade-Level Bullying Prevention Meetings: 10:00 a.m. - 2:30 p.m., November 13

(Note: Deerfield has already held its Bullying Prevention Assembly, and Arbor Park's will be scheduled soon.)

These assemblies aim to educate students about kindness, empathy, and the importance of a safe, inclusive environment. During these sessions, students will also be informed about how to report bullying or harassment, including using the new electronic incident form or speaking directly with a teacher, parent, counselor, or principal.

On Tuesday, November 12, from 3:45 p.m. – 4:30 p.m., all certified, administrative, and classified staff will participate in a required Bullying Prevention Training in the high school auditorium. Our legal counsel and I will lead this session, which will cover:

 Identifying bullying and harassment and recognizing early warning signs.

- Implementing effective prevention and intervention strategies.
- Reviewing updated reporting procedures to ensure transparency and consistent action.

This training reflects our dedication to equipping staff with the tools needed to address bullying proactively and sensitively.

Our administrators will undergo specialized training to further enhance their skills in:

- Strengthening bullying prevention strategies.
- Improving investigative techniques.
- Enhancing communication practices with students, families, and the school community.

These trainings are designed to provide our administrators with the knowledge and tools to manage bullying incidents effectively and to engage the community in these efforts.

Blair Community Schools is committed to supporting a safe, respectful environment for all students, and we offer multiple resources to address bullying:

- Open Communication: Parents and students are encouraged to speak with teachers, counselors, or administrators if they experience or witness bullying. School staff are trained to handle these concerns with care and confidentiality.
- Anonymous Reporting System: Safe2HelpNE allows discreet reporting 24/7, with each report investigated by our Central Office.
- Education and Awareness Programs: We regularly incorporate lessons that promote empathy, respect, and inclusivity within our curriculum.
- Counseling Services: Our counselors are available to support students affected by bullying, helping them navigate challenges and build resilience.
- Continuous Improvement: We review our policies, data, and student feedback regularly to ensure that we are taking all necessary steps to prevent and address bullying.

Join us as we strengthen Blair Community Schools' safe and inclusive environment. Your partnership helps every child thrive, feel valued, and reach their full potential. Mark your calendar for the Parent Meeting on Tuesday, November 12. Share your ideas and learn about our next steps to enhance student safety. Blair Community Schools is united against bullying. Your voice matters as we continue to build our community of respect.


