National School Psychology Week

November 11-15, 2024

National School Psychology Week (NSPW) is the perfect time to recognize and show appreciation for school psychologists, who support students' learning and mental and behavioral health, promote positive and inclusive school climates, serve on school safety and crisis teams, and collaborate with families, teachers, and administrators to improve student outcomes. This year's theme, "Spark Discovery," recognizes the work that school psychologists do to help their communities seek out new ideas, effect change, and expand horizons for children and youth. We are lucky enough to have three psychologists on our team: Mr. Fischer, Dr. Petrova, and Ms. Lesiak.

School psychologists are members of our Red Teams which support students' ability to learn and teachers' ability to teach. They apply expertise in mental health, learning, and behavior to help children and youth succeed academically, socially, and emotionally. As school psychologists, they provide direct support and interventions to students, such as learning assessments, academic and behavioral interventions, counseling, and social skills training. They also consult with families, teachers, and other educators to improve school-wide practices and policies.

Join us by taking this week to embark on a journey of discovery and explore how each person can join us in our mission of helping children thrive in school, at home, and in life. There are many ways caregivers can help children take on new challenges, learn new skills, and feel safe and valued. You can:

- Encourage your child to pursue new ideas and to map out a plan. As a parent, you can help them see what the small steps are and how overcoming obstacles is a part of their journey.
- Help them work through setbacks or lack of confidence by helping them identify negative thoughts that may suggest concerns about their ability to be successful.


For all sessions, the doors open at 6:00 PM for registration. We recommend parking in the student lot and entering through Door 9. Sessions begin at 6:30 PM.

AP Exam Registration

It is time to pay for the AP exams or provide a pre-registration fee so it can be ordered on your student's behalf if your student is enrolled in one or more Advanced Placement (AP) courses this year at Grant Community High School. After a student has decided that he or she is taking the test, parents should go to our RevTrak system at grant.revtrak.net to pay for the exam(s). A pre-registration payment must be made no later than November 14 in order for the exam to be reserved for your student.

AP exams are an important part of all AP courses. This is a standardized test created by the College Board that is administered across the nation and serves as a benchmark in recognizing your student's ability. Although participation in the exam is optional, we do encourage all students to take the exam. With a successful score, college credit or advanced placement may be earned at various colleges through this examination. The examination fee is less than the college tuition for taking this same course.

There is a fee associated with this exam. The total cost for taking each AP exam is \$99.00. The College Board and the State of Illinois also offer programs to subsidize fees for students who receive free or reduced lunch. If this is the case, the exam fee is \$63.00 per exam. If your student receives free or reduced lunch and is paying the reduced exam fee, simply select AP Exams (Reduced Price) within RevTrak. We will certainly work with individual students and families to make sure every qualified student is able to take Advanced Placement exams.

Important Deadlines for AP Exam Registrations for Year-Long or Semester One Courses:

- Monday, November 4, 2024: Students taking the exams must pay a minimum \$40.00 Pre-Registration Fee per test.
- Monday, November 11, 2024: AP teachers will verify with all students that exam registration is accurate in the system and pre-registration fees have been paid.
- Wednesday, November 13, 2024: AP Exam registration is finalized. Any exam registrations that do not have the \$40.00 Pre-Registration Fee paid by then will be canceled.
- Friday, November 15, 2024: Late registration fees or test cancellation fees go into effect. If students sign up for a year-long or first semester course AP exam on this date or after, an additional \$40.00 late fee will be incurred. If a student decides to cancel an exam on this date or after, the student forfeits the \$40.00 Pre-Registration Fee.
- Friday, March 14, 2025: All exams must have the balance payment paid or the exam will be canceled and the student will forfeit the \$40.00 Pre-Registration Fee.
 - Second semester AP courses will have a different set of deadlines and will be notified at the beginning of the second semester.

2025-2026 Curriculum Updates

Mission

What is our fundamental purpose; why do we exist?

Grant Community High School will educate each and every student to be a responsible and productive citizen who will be able to effectively manage future challenges. Students will be provided with the opportunity to develop intellectually, emotionally, and physically in a safe and supportive environment.



Visinn

What must we become in order to accomplish our fundamental purpose?

Because all students can learn and belong, we will become a united community of empowered, engaged, and intentional role models who foster a culture of reciprocal trust and accountability.

It is the mission of Grant Community High School to educate each and every student to be a responsible and productive citizen who will be able to effectively manage future challenges. In the spirit of our mission, the Grant administration proposed several curriculum changes to the Board of Education for approval at the October meeting. All changes were approved.

The curriculum work is guided by the district's mission, vision, values, and goals. The recommendations were a result of focused efforts to improve future student achievement including:

- Standards, assessments, and curriculum alignment work within departments
- Student data analysis at numerous levels within the organization
- Continued development of the MTSS structure
- Prioritization of professional development
- The development of the College and Career Pathways structure to support College and Career Readiness

These recommendations are about creating opportunities for more students. The following information outlines all approved curriculum changes for the 2025-2026 school year.

- We are very excited to begin offering 2 new music courses for next year – Beginning Percussion and The Ultimate Playlist: Exploring music, careers, theory, and production.
- As part of an ongoing plan, we are compacting English 11 and Advanced English 11.
- The Digital Art course will be revised with curriculum changes and the course title will now be Digital Illustration and Design.
- World Geography will be removed from the curriculum guide due to overlapping standards with Global Insights. Beginning next year Global Insights will become open to all grade levels.
- EL Study Hall is transitioning to EL Resource to reflect increased academic expectations, including targeted intervention for students during that time. This will now be a credit-bearing course.
- Driver education will shift to being optional for students, rather than
 a graduation requirement. We will continue to offer our quality
 driver education program for all interested students while providing
 students greater control over their own educational planning.

With greater course and internship opportunities than ever before, the primary goals of curriculum development are to provide high-quality learning opportunities and flexibility for students in selecting coursework that aligns with their academic or career interests.

School Board Member Appreciation

Board members dedicate a significant amount of their own personal time to the District. They attend monthly meetings, committee meetings, participate in professional development activities, attend a variety of school functions, and work to ensure students have access to the educational resources they need to succeed. This dedication often takes them away from time that could be spent with their own family.

Successful communities have high quality public schools that are a source of local pride among residents. The leadership and vision exemplified by board members directly impacts not only the school district, it touches the lives of nearly every resident in one way or another. November 15 has been designated as School Board Members Day in Illinois. Leadership for our community and our schools begins with the tireless work of the local board of education. Safety Officer Training

Our Safety Officers have recently completed a rigorous series of emergency response trainings to enhance campus safety and preparedness. Their training covered essential lifesaving techniques, including CPR and AED operation, Narcan administration, anaphylaxis response with EpiPen usage, and critical bleeding control through the Stop the Bleed program.

These comprehensive skills ensure our Safety Officers are well-prepared to respond to a range of emergency situations, reinforcing our commitment to the safety and well-being of all students, staff, and visitors on campus.

We've made it to November and although it feels like we just started the new school year, we are just weeks away from finishing the first semester.

We are happy to announce that we have celebrated another round Bulldog Pride winners, Bulldog Buck winners, and staff members for their RED behaviors! Whether they are helping fellow Bulldogs, putting in the extra effort to keep their grades up, or helping various members of the community, these Bulldogs are great examples of what makes up a Grant Bulldog.

During October, we provided an activity to TEAM rooms focused on anti-bullying. Our Expect Respect lesson incorporates the SWAT and SBL method introduced several years ago. During the Expect Respect lesson, students are taken through a scenario in which a student is being harassed and goes to a teacher for help. While talking to her teacher, this student is encouraged to stand up for herself by following the SWAT method. If someone is bothering you, you should ask the person to STOP. If the behavior doesn't stop, you should then WALK AWAY from that person. If the person follows you and continue the behavior, that is when you should TALK and tell a trusted adult.

If you find yourself in a similar situation and another person is telling you to STOP, you should use the SBL method. The SBL method focuses on STOPPING the behavior, taking a minute to BREATHE, and LEAVING the situation if necessary. In case students run into similar situations, we have placed posters throughout the school that outline these methods for reference. We found these acronyms very helpful and look forward to seeing how our Bulldogs utilize these methods.
