

# What the Pass Covers

The 4th Grade Pass covers entrance or day use fees at federal recreation sites. Some fees, like camping and special tours are not covered. Private businesses that manage facilities on federal lands may not honor the pass.

Contact federal land or water sites directly for questions about pass acceptance and fees.

# Where to Use Your Pass



## National Parks [nps.gov](https://www.nps.gov)

Explore 400+ historic sites, memorials lakeshores, seashores, and more.



## National Forests [fs.usda.gov](https://www.fs.usda.gov)

Recreate in 150+ forests across nearly 200 million acres.



## Wildlife Refuges [fws.gov](https://www.fws.gov)

Visit 500+ refuges including at least one in every state and U.S. territory.



## Reclamation Areas [usbr.gov](https://www.usbr.gov)

Enjoy water-based activities at reservoirs, rivers, and surrounding areas.



## Conservation Areas [blm.gov](https://www.blm.gov)

Explore monuments, off-highway vehicle areas, conservation areas, and more.



## Recreation Areas [usace.army.mil](https://www.usace.army.mil)

Enjoy sites in 43 states managed by U.S. Army Corps of Engineers.



## Marine Areas [noaa.gov](https://www.noaa.gov)

Explore 15 national marine sanctuaries and 2 marine national monuments.

# Get the Voucher

4th graders\* and their parents and educators can obtain a voucher online.

## Easy as 1-2-3!

Go online to obtain and print a voucher that can be used immediately for federal recreation site entrance or day use fees.

- 1 Visit [everykidoutdoors.gov](http://everykidoutdoors.gov).
  - 2 Complete an online activity.
  - 3 Download and print a personalized paper voucher.
-  Make sure to print and bring your voucher with you when you visit. Digital versions of the voucher are not accepted.



\*Home-schooled and free-choice learners 10 years of age may also receive the pass.

# Get the Pass

You may choose to exchange your paper voucher for a more durable pass.



## Find Sites That Issue Passes

View a list of sites where you can trade your paper voucher for a durable pass at [everykidoutdoors.gov/exchange.htm](http://everykidoutdoors.gov/exchange.htm). Not all federal recreation sites are able to exchange a voucher for a durable pass.



Your pass has a unique code. That means you can't give it to friends. Encourage your 4th grade friends to get one too.

## Lost Your Voucher or Pass?

Just visit [everykidoutdoors.gov](http://everykidoutdoors.gov) to print a new voucher. You can then trade the voucher in for a replacement pass.



# Go Explore

Treat your family to unlimited outings between September 1 and August 31.

## How to Use Your Pass

Your pass only works when you're with it.

- At sites that charge per vehicle: anyone in your vehicle is admitted for free.
- At sites that charge per person: up to 3 accompanying adults are admitted free.
- When entering by bicycle: up to 3 accompanying adults on bicycles are admitted.
- If your group is in more than 1 vehicle, entrance is free only for the vehicle you're in.
- If there is no one to show your pass to, display your pass or voucher on your vehicle's dashboard.

## Free Access For One Year

Students may obtain and use the pass September 1 through August 31 of their 4th grade year.

Pass dates are not dependent on your school's start and end dates, as these dates vary across the nation.
