## FROM MK TO MILITARY LEADER AND BUSINESS EXECUTIVE


Growing up as a missionary kid in Costa Rica, Kent Lightner's childhood was filled with unique experiences that shaped his perspective on life and leadership. From navigating different cultures and languages to excelling in academics and sports, his journey has been one of constant adaptation and growth.

"My parents were missionaries in Costa Rica where I grew up from age 2 to 17," Lightner reflects. "I graduated from high school in Costa Rica, which only goes through 11th grade (all Spanish), but I knew I wanted to go to college in the U.S., which meant I would need to do a 12th grade somewhere."

Determined to pursue higher education in the United States, Lightner made a pivotal decision to attend Ben Lippen School. "Since it was a boarding school with a lot of international students, I knew Ben Lippen would be a great transition experience to the U.S. school system and learning to study in English," he explains.

At Ben Lippen, Lightner immersed himself in academics and extracurricular activities, playing soccer and basketball during his senior year.

# FROM TRAGEDY TO TRIUMPH

# A CONVERSATION WITH JESSICA KOLP '22

DURING JESS'S SENIOR YEAR AT BEN LIPPEN, SHE WAS T-BONED BY A DRUNK DRIVER AT OVER 115 MPH, CAUSING LIFE-THREATENING TRAUMA, INCLUDING SIGNIFICANT BRAIN INJURY AND MULTIPLE BROKEN BONES. THE BL COMMUNITY AND COUNTLESS OTHERS RALLIED BEHIND JESS, AND ALL WITNESSED HER MIRACULOUS RECOVERY. WHILE SHE STILL WORKS THROUGH THE HEALING PROCESS, JESS LOOKS AT EACH NEW DAY AS A GIFT. SEE HOW THIS EXPERIENCE HAS STRENGTHENED HER FAITH AND GIVEN HER LIFE NEW PERSPECTIVE AND PURPOSE.

## Jessica, you look happy and healthy! How are you doing physically? How is your healing journey going?

What I like to tell people now is that from the outside, you would never know anything happened to me(besides scars), but internally, I am still dealing with some doctors. I still see my eye doctor, Cardiovascular, and ENT. Healing wise, everything can only get better. Since leaving the hospital, I have only gone up!

## Please update us on where you are in your college journey and your involvement on campus.

I just finished my sophomore year at Charleston Southern University, and time flies in college! I am majoring in psychology with a minor in sociology. At CSU, I have the luxury of being a Campus Ambassador and a part of FCA on campus. Off-campus, I have the pleasure of working with FCA Low-Country.

#### What career path are you considering after graduating from college?

I have decided to become an online student and complete college that way while still getting my Master's. However, I have recently decided to take up motivational speaking full-time. And I have roughly a speech a week now, so I can only keep growing!



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Congratulations on publishing your book, Leaving It All on the Field: How My Faith and Sports Training Restored My Life! What motivated you to write it?

Truly, everyone else. I had no want to until everyone told me I should. But during the hospital, I did write down different things about what was going on and what I was seeing.



#### I'm sure that choosing a topic like this for your book made you reflect deeply to identify what lessons you learned from your accident and healing process, including the physical, mental, and spiritual aspects.

Mentally my book still makes me cry every time I read it. From a healing standpoint, it was good and was what I needed. No one truly understood everything that was happening to me, but writing my book showed me how good I have it and how blessed I am, as well as seeing how far I've come. The spiritual was also a positive viewpoint as well, for it was another way to share my story with others and how cool God is!

## How has this traumatic experience impacted your faith and view on life?

Through my accident, my favorite thing and my safe place were taken away from me (being softball), but from that, I learned how special and precious life truly is. And now I live every day with the biggest smile because you never know when your time is up. I also learned in the hospital that while I might be mad or upset, making others smile will make you forget your issues. Life is too short not to be smiling and laughing. My relationship with God truly grew in a way I could have never imagined. Getting t-boned at 115, no one should survive that. And the first 4-5 days of my coma were very touch and go (meaning the doctors were not even sure I would make it through the night). And now that I am still here and able to do more than what doctors expected shows how powerful God's love is and how good God is. God wasn't done with me yet and I still have a purpose here and from that it gives me so much joy just to be able to talk to people about God.

## How has forgiveness played a role in your healing process?

I told my mom on a whiteboard in the Prisma ICU "I forgave him" (I was in the process of relearning my English). My mom gave me the biggest hug and said, "No, I don't think you understand what truly happened." I looked at my mom, attempted to smile, and shook my head up and down. I knew that if I had not forgiven him, I would have carried that with me, and it would have taken so much longer for me to heal.

I also knew that God had forgiven me for all the wrongs that I've done, so why can't I forgive the man who hit me and truly have peace in my life? As mentioned above, life's too short to be an angry person and hold grudges. What's done is done, and of course, him hitting me was his choice, but I still have the mindset of what God is trying to teach me from this pain.

#### Athletics were a significant part of your life as a student at Ben Lippen. Please share a special memory with us.

Coach Abbot is my favorite sports memory. He made being out on the field every day the best day. I just got to be the keynote speaker for the Low Country FCA banquet, and I got to center it around how good coach Abbot is and how he incorporated God into everything we did on that field. Our team moto was "in such a way." In such a way, we're living daily for God's glory and can show that on the field.

## Was there a particular Ben Lippen teacher that made an impact on you?

Mrs. Hodges or the running joke from the hospital when I tried writing her name "Mrs. Hisdogs." Mrs. Hodges was the absolute best and always a positive influence in my life. Before and after the accident, Mrs. Hodges was always my BL mom.
