Administrative Info:

Absences: Please call the attendance line (623)445-5800 as soon as you know your child will be absent. Students who know they will be absent should let teachers know at least 2 days in advance so teachers may gather work. Those who are absent due to illness will have extra time to complete assignments based on the length of their absence.


Communication is Key!

If you ever feel that a meeting is necessary, please schedule a specific time to meet with us, as teachers need time to communicate effectively. We often have professional duties directly before and after school hours. Please understand that we will not be able to meet or discuss issues while we are teaching or supervising students. However, we will contact you as soon as we can.

5th grade happenings: As we're preparing students for middle school and beyond, it is vital to train them in planning and time management. Please read our weekly newsletter (Peek of the Week) for homework and important class/school information. You may also access our 5th grade website for important updates and class information.

Wednesday Take Home Folder: Each student will have a Wednesday Take Home Folder that is sent home every week on Wednesday. This folder will contain graded assignments and items that are time sensitive. PLease take time to look through your child's work with them. Also, please sign the sheet inside your child's folder letting me know that you have looked through all graded work and important notices and return the folder to me by Friday.



HOMEWORK & GRADES

Research provides strong evidence that, when used appropriately, homework is essential for increasing and reinforcing student learning and achievement for course standards. Homework may be differentiated to meet the needs of our varied learners. The intent of homework is to practice, extend learning, and provide opportunities for students to develop critical, independent study skills and self-discipline for their life-long educational journeys.

Grades are a reporting tool utilized to reflect what a student knows and is able to do in a content area. We measure achievement, not effort or behavior, in our grading system. Grades will be equitable, accurate, specific, consistent.

A student's grade should reflect academic learning and should never be used as a punitive tool.

Grades are for reporting the status of academic learning, not behavioral conduct

The primary purpose of assessment and grading is to provide detailed feedback to inform and support student learning.

Learning is a process that takes place over time and at different speeds for different students.

PowerSchool is an essential resource for parents and students. It is not only a tool for communication regarding grades, it is a resource for our students and parents to check progress, missing work, and what is being taught/learned regularly. Please ensure that you and your child have access (separate accounts) and even sign up for the app and push notifications or weekly email updates as an option in PowerSchool.

Meaningful Grades:

Teachers are expected to enter a meaningful grade for each student in the electronic gradebook on a regular basis so that students, parents, and support staff can better monitor student progress. A meaningful grade is a grade entry for an assessment or coursework that measures learning standards. The frequency of entering meaningful grades is as follows:

Classes that typically meet 4-5 days per week = at least 1 meaningful grade each week
Classes that typically meet 2-3 days per week = at least 1 meaningful grade every other week
Classes that typically meet 1 day per week = at least 1 meaningful grade every 3rd week
At least one meaningful

assessment/assignment grade entry must be entered each week, but an entry that impacts the course grade must be entered at least every 2 school weeks (every 3rd week for classes meeting once per week).

Consequences

We begin each morning assuming that we will, "Make it a great day!" However, students occasionally forget our classroom motto and expectations and consequences are necessary.

Steps: Students making poor behavior choices will be verbally informed of the steps as part of our progressive discipline system. Students will have a free verbal reminder from us to "reel in" the inappropriate behavior. If the behavior continues, the following will occur:

Step 1: Verbal Warning

Step 2: Minor, student fills out an incident report. Teacher then records this information, assigns consequences and contacts parents.

Step 3: Minor, student fills out a second incident report. Teacher then records this information, assigns consequences, and contacts parents.

Step 4: Minor, Student fills out a third incident report, which equals one major incident. Teacher then records this information, sends students to the office, and contacts parents. The administration will then follow through with consequences. Please note that some behavior such as fighting, refusal to work, severe defiance, or destroying property require an immediate referral to the principal and parents will be contacted.

Please refrain from... allowing your child to bring any toys, electronic devices, such as MP3 players and IPods to school. They will be confiscated by the office. As are Heelys if the wheels have not been removed. Skateboards and scooters must be left at the bike racks. Cell phones are allowed but only if they remain off and concealed within your child's backpack. Union Park is not responsible for any lost or stolen items.



PROFESSIONAL LEARNING COMMUNITIES (PLC's):

Most Fridays, students will be released early so that we are able to participate in PLC work. This work is directly related to the planning, instruction and interventions we implement in our classrooms to ensure that students master the standards.

Role of PLC:


A professional learning community is a group of educators that meet regularly and work Collaboratively to improve teaching practices and the achievement of students.

The questions that drive the work of PLC's are:

- •What do we want all students to know and be able to do?
- •How will we know if they learn it?
- How will we respond if some students do not learn?
- How will we extend the learning for students who are already proficient?

PLC Teams are responsible for collaborating to establish general consistency among the following:

- ☐ Assignments, presentations, products, observations and assessments used to determine a student's level of performance in relation to grade-level standards.
- ☐ The method and schedule for additional learning opportunities.
- ☐ Due dates, deadlines, and procedures for reassessment.
- ☐ Create opportunities for common scoring of assessments.



3rd-8th Grade:

Students in 3rd through 12th grades will receive marks for their proficiency towards the grade level standards using the following scale. These marks are for information and do not calculate the student's overall course grade.

- 4 = Highly Proficient
- 3 = Proficient
- 2 = Partially Proficient
- 1 = Minimally Proficient

Students in 3rd through 12th grades will receive marks for their overall performance in each course of study using the following letter grade scale. Overall course grades for students in grades 3-12 will be calculated from the average of the student's assignment scores* (assessments, coursework).

- A = 90-100%
- B = 80-89%
- C = 70-79%
- D = 60-69%
- F = 0.59%

Grades of "D" and above are passing marks. A course grade of "F" indicates that the student has failed the course..
*For graded work in the Assessment Category, teachers will enter the proficiency marks for each standard measured and use the following guide to assign a score to the assignment. Parents will see the percentage score for each grade book entry with the letter grade mark on the front page of the PowerSchool parent portal.

WEIGHTS

All 1st-12th grade teacher gradebooks will utilize the following weights for each category in the gradebook.

- ASSESSMENT CATEGORY 80%
- COURSEWORK CATEGORY 20%
- PRACTICE CATEGORY 0%

Missing Work:

An assignment is considered as missing work when it is not submitted by the due date.

Missing work will be treated as such:

The assignment will be marked with the "missing" special code in the gradebook

A zero (0) will be entered as the score for the assignment in the gradebook (grades 3-12)

No Evidence (NE) will be entered for the standards attached to the assignment

If the work is submitted as Late Work (see below), the zero ("0") assignment score will be changed to reflect the student's actual score with no deductions or penalties. If the work is not submitted as Late Work or does not meet conditions for Late Work, the score for the assignment will be changed from a zero ("0") to a 49% by the end of the term.

Procedures for Re-assessments & Late Work"

Describe the expectation that all students will complete all learning requirements

Students needing extra help will receive it from their teacher during Multi-Tiered Systems of Support in class Students choosing not to complete work, but who are able to do so, will complete work with support during Toro Time

In order to accurately reflect a student's academic performance level, teachers will accept late work and missing work for full credit if the work is submitted within the timeframe and procedures developed by the school and before the end of the grading period.

The practice, coursework, or assessment will be marked with the "Missing" special code in the gradebook

No Evidence (NE) will be entered for the standards attached to the practice, coursework, or assessment.

If the work is submitted as Late Work (see terms below), the (NE) or 49% assignment score will be changed to reflect the student's actual score with no deductions or penalties

If the work is not submitted as Late Work or does not meet conditions for Late Work, the score for the coursework or assessment will remain 49%.

Students will still be responsible for turning in late work in addition to their current coursework, which results in the natural consequence of a heavier workload. The primary consequence for students not completing the work is to complete the work.

*Students will have one retake opportunity for each assessment.

ELA:

I am so excited about using HMH Into Reading this year. This program includes high-quality books that intrigue and challenge students' comprehension. The text will empower students to pursue their natural curiosity and discover their interests. As students build a strong foundation in reading, writing, listening, and speaking skills, they develop a confidence in themselves that ensures lifelong learners emerge.

Math:

We will be using the i-Ready curriculum i-Ready is brand new to our district this year. i-Ready has both online and paper components. Your students will be using both. The online components are set individually to their level based on diagnostic assessment. By teaching a variety of methods and strategies it gives the students a stronger mathematical foundation and helps to build their confidence. The adopted curriculum does meet the state standards and addresses the following math strands: Number and Operations, fractions, algebraic thinking, geometry, measurement and data.

Science:

The four main topics we will focus on are: Matter, Force & Motion, Earth & Moon, and Adaptations & Environmental Change. We will explore these topics using Mystery Science and STEMScopes.

Social Studies:

5th grade will be using the district adopted curriculum McGraw Hill for social studies. We will review the geography/growth of the United States through maps and graphs. We will learn about the cause and effects of the American Revolution and Civil War. We will work our way westward across our country until we reach Industrialism. We will explore the birth of democracy and the organization of the government. We will learn about United States History through discussion, group projects, individual assignments and projects, and research. With the implementation of the Common Core, writing will be integrated into social studies.

Grades K-8: After careful consideration and in alignment with the developmental needs of our students and the Children's Online Privacy Protection Act (COPPA), DVUSD has determined that the use of Large Language Models (LLMs), such as ChatGPT, is not suitable for students in grades K-8 (under 13 years of age) and will not be utilized or endorsed in academic contexts.

Toro Time:

Toro Time is a before or after school opportunity for students to maximize their potential success. Learning and completing work at Union Park is required. Toro Time is offered to all students who have not shown proficiency in their current learning progressions or classwork. Toro time will be assigned to students to attend for extra help, assistance, or when a student needs to complete his/her work. Without completing their work, it is hard to know if a student is progressing towards mastering the standards we are teaching in class. We ask for parent support and cooperation in transporting students to or from their assigned Toro Time so that they are not falling behind or simply given the opportunity to opt out of their work.
