1. CALL TO ORDER

He takes constructive criticism gratefully. This is evidence that he truly wants to grow as a learner, not just get a good grade for a report card. He has revised lab notebook entries to include more pertinent details and has added more depth to reflection writing prompts to better demonstrate his thinking. I have often reminded my students about how important it is to be able to clearly communicate the results of an experiment and the possible impact the information it may have in the world. Christopher has the ability to synthesize a lot of information or data into an organized, concise explanation that is easy for anyone to understand. As a freshman, Christopher wrote that the most important thing to know about him is that "I am very friendly"! He is well liked by most because of his infectious smile, kindness, and positive attitude. He can work with anyone and everyone. He is a team player and enjoys helping others. This year, I asked Christopher what his dream job would be. He answered, "To be a Marine Environmentalist, work for the EPA, habitat protection". Christopher has grown since the ninth grade. He has researched and practiced what it will take to become a scientist, has visited the EPA in Massachusetts and has worked over the summer to help develop algae derived biofuel here at the school. It is clear to me that he wants to make a positive difference in this world using science and his steadfast determination.

e.) Revolving Accounts for Shop Areas

f.) Revolving Accounts for Energy Savings

Ms. Silva reported that we have to start to pay back our lease for the Energy Project. The first payment is due in March. With the money we get from Nashoba Tech., we would like to put it into a revolving account instead of miscellaneous revenue account, so we can pay the lease.

Discussion: Supt. Lavoie explained to the new members that there is a solar farm out in North Brookfield, MA in which they provide all of our energy. When we negotiated the contract, we were using about four million kilowatts and since then, have done a few energy projects and are now utilizing about half. We are selling our extra energy to Nashoba Valley Tech, which is about \$100,000 in profit to us per year. Instead of putting that money in E&D account, we did a million-dollar lighting project that was finished over winter break. We took out a loan for \$500,000 and that is why we are asking for a revolving account.

One member thanked the students and teachers and reported that there is an organization in Lawrence that is focused on pushing the City of Lawrence away from gas and into reusable energy. This may be a good partnership for the group and STEAM. Supt. Lavoie reported that he attended Learn Launch 2020 Across Boundaries last week at the Hynes Convention Center where the STEAM students presented. The students were very impressive, and their professionalism and knowledge were quickly recognized. I was very proud of what they did. 6. REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT-DIRECTOR

b.) Shop Selection Report

Supt. Lavoie reported that Ms. Gioia will be presenting the freshman shop selection numbers and help you understand the process. Many shops this year were filled by 1st choice selections. Ms. Gioia reported on the freshman placement for YOG2023. The freshman placement formula is 40% Exploratory Average, 30% 1st choice grade, 20% 2nd choice grade and 10% 3rd choice grade. Students are placed into their 1st choice by overall rank. All 1st choices are placed into a shop before any second or third choices. This year we had 71% of students (308) receive their 1st choice shop, 12% of students (53) receive their 2nd choice shop, 6% of students (24) receive their 3rd shop and 11% of students (47) not placed. Six shops were filled with their 1st choice shops, Auto Tech., Electrical, IT, Medical Assisting, Metal Fabrication, Plumbing. The top three shop choices were Electrical, Plumbing and Medical Assisting. One member asked if we ever ask the students why a shop was chosen? Is it because higher paying job or do they like the teacher? One member reported that she remembered when a teacher left a particular shop, the numbers dropped. Ms. Freedman reported that we do have two initial surveys, one when they are in exploratory and one when they pick their shop. The exploratory survey the student does give a reason, but the second survey they do not. We can work on incorporating that. Students currently, do reflections of what they think of the shop. One member wanted to thank Ms. Gioa for her presentation and how easy she makes it so they can understand the process. Thank you, Isobel.

c.) Field Bid Opening

Supt. Lavoie reported that we had the bid opening on January 29th for the Field. There were eight companies and Heimlich was the lowest bidder. The Phase III Field Project will be around \$745,000. They were very cooperative during Phase I and II and kept the extras way down.

MOTION: Mr. Rossi moved to award the bid to Heimlich for Phase III of the Field Project.

Discussion: One member asked how we are paying for this. Supt. Lavoie reported that we have \$400,000 left over from the state and the remainder will be taken out of E & D. We have 1.6 million dollars in E & D and at the end of the year, we will have additional money which will take us over 5% so we will have to spend some of the money or we will have to send it back to the cities and towns.. The original bid was to not remove all the topsoil and put drainage in every five yards. The second quote was to remove all the topsoil and put down stone. That cost was an additional \$198,000. We will need an additional \$500,000. Once the District Committee votes yes, then the town and cities need to approve. The cost will be added to this year's budget. We will be replenishing the E & D account at the end of the year when we balance our budget.

MOTION: Ms. Fitzgerald moved to approve to utilize funds from the E & D account for the use of the Phase III of the Field Project.

Discussion: One member asked when we have to spend the \$400,000 by. Supt. Lavoie reported that the \$400,000 was money left over by the state. By the time we received the funds, Phase II was almost complete. We used some for Phase II and the rest will be used on Phase III. The money has to be utilized by September 1, 2020. One member reported when do we have to let the towns and cities know about our use of the E & D account and get permission. Supt. Lavoie reported that it will be put in our new budget and appear as a line item.

d.) Gym Floor Bid Opening

Supt. Lavoie reported that the bid opening for the gym floors was on January 30, 2020. The bid came in at around \$300,000 which is about \$100,000 lower than what we thought. We had an architecture review the bid and we feel confident that it is a good bid. Supt. Lavoie reported that we will be starting this project on April vacation and it should be done by the summer. The Athletic Director is looking at the spring activities and will make accommodations.
