

How to Transcribe AP Test Scores to Receive College Credit

CCSD Seniors applying for the ASCENT program may want to earn college credit by having their AP test scores “transcribed” into college credit. Here’s how.



You need to ask CollegeBoard to send an official AP score report to the college of your choice. Keep in mind that only scores from AP tests taken freshman, sophomore and junior year can be transcribed in time to be considered for ASCENT. Tests taken senior year will not arrive in time.

1. Pick which college you will send your test scores to. You must have applied, been accepted by and declared a major.
If you will be attending Pickens or Emily Griffith for ASCENT, they cannot transcribe AP test scores. Instead, you will need to send your test scores to the local community college you earned your CE credits through.
2. Log into your CollegeBoard account at www.collegeboard.com.
3. Access My AP section.
4. Go to My AP Profile, select the Score Send tab and choose the college that you want to receive your score report.
5. Allow four to five weeks for the tests to be transcribed into credit. You will need to show these credits on the unofficial college transcript you submit as part of our ASCENT application.
