
CCS Runs on Duncan

Introducing Duncan, the newest member of the CCS family and student support team. This school year, we are excited to launch the CCS Therapy Dog Program, and we are thrilled to introduce certified therapy dog Duncan to Clinton Senior High School as our very first therapy dog.

Duncan is a specially trained golden retriever whose role will be to provide comfort, companionship and support to students and staff in the high school. Therapy dogs like Duncan are known to reduce stress, improve moods and even enhance social interactions. Whether it is during a stressful moment or a typical day at school, Duncan will be available to provide unconditional, non-judgmental support to students and offer his calming presence to anyone in need.

While at school, Duncan will be on a leash at all times and will work under the direction of his handler, Mrs. Alison Eisenhut. Mrs. Eisenhut has been a special education teacher at CHS since 2022 and recently worked with Duncan to complete special obedience and behavior training to certify him as a therapy dog. In his new role, Duncan will work alongside Mrs. Eisenhut during the day and provide support to students who choose to engage with him. Duncan's presence in the building will complement our efforts to cultivate a supportive, inclusive environment where every student can thrive academically and socially.

Duncan's first day in his new role was Tuesday, October 15, 2024. We are excited to welcome him to our campus and introduce him to our school community. In the future, we hope to welcome additional therapy dogs to our other school buildings to provide support to our middle and elementary school students.



INDIVIDUAL ARTS ASSESSMENT PATHWAY

The Individual Arts Assessment Pathway (IAAP) is a graduation pathway option in which students complete a locally determined, three-unit sequence in the arts and demonstrate, through a collection of creative works, growth over time that meets the High School II Accomplished Performance Indicators in the New York State Learning Standards for the Arts.

The first alternate pathway opportunity currently available through the New York State Education Department (NYSED) that the District is pursuing is the Visual and Media Arts. The completion of a three-unit sequence in the arts and submission of a portfolio replaces one of the five Regents exams necessary for graduation. The NYSED Individual Arts Assessment Pathway prepares students who are pursuing further educational opportunities and/or careers in the arts. Currently, about 50 CCS students will have the opportunity to participate. The hope is to continue adding other available pathways in the future, allowing more equitable graduation opportunities for diverse learners. An application has been submitted to the Board of Regents for approval. Thank you to art teacher Mindy Pavone for her hard work toward making this happen.

Boys Soccer, Girls Soccer and Girls Field Hockey are all Center State Conference Division Champions again this fall! The Field Hockey team entered their final contest as winners of 14 straight! The girls brought a very balanced team to the field as they prepared to make another run at a sectional title, this year competing in Class D. The Boys Soccer team was prolific as one of the top goal-scoring teams in all of Section III. They positioned themselves for a home contest for Sectionals. Girls Soccer entered their final contest of the regular season as winners of 11 out of 13. They were ready to meet the challenge that Sectional play presents.



Our Football team, with the full support of our Cheerleaders, returned this fall, and started very strong. Winning their first three contests, the boys opened the season with an immediate impact in eight-Man Football, taking the opening kickoff at Sauquoit Valley back for a touchdown! Our Cheerleaders also

continued the mutual support with Field Hockey dating back to last fall, and supported their great event at a game in early October against Mount Markham.

Our Girls Tennis team featured a few returners and many new players this season who tried the sport for the very first time. The girls made great progress through the season, improving along the way, winning some matches, and just missing in many others, as most of their losses were by a very close margin. Eva Stone and Claire Morford qualified for Individual Sectionals, and left the tournament with a Sectional win in doubles against a team from South Jefferson. Charlotte Gale also qualified for Individuals, and notched a Sectional win over an opponent from General Brown.

Boys and Girls Cross Country teams have both competed extremely well all season, and both remained in the mix for Center State Conference titles as they approached the CSC Championship Meet at Westmoreland in the final weekend of October. The team's second home meet of the season was held at the Kirkland Town Park, which provided for a great course, despite the "challenging" weather of that day. The Cross Country program's continued strength and success comes from the "community" of the team and sport.

The Athletic Programs at all levels continue to foster opportunities for our student-athletes. This fall, Clinton has 266 different student-athletes participating, supported by more than 24 paid and volunteer coaches. CODING WITH LEGOS IN THE ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

During library time, students in multiple grade levels recently explored beginner coding concepts using LEGOs. Students in older elementary grades used the LEGO Education SPIKE Essentials kit and app on iPads to complete a learning challenge that involved building a camping scene, then coding a color sensor to recognize a blue monster and light a 3x3 color matrix to "alert" the LEGO mini-figure camper. Students in pre-K and kindergarten used the LEGO Coding Express to build a train track, an engine and car, and used LEGO action bricks to program the train to stop at a desired point.

Exploring coding at an early age can help students to develop problem solving and critical thinking skills, as well as an understanding of logic and algorithms. Providing students with the opportunity to code can lay a foundation for future success in computer science and beyond!





DOT DAY

Elementary students enjoyed DOT Day, or International Dot Day, a global celebration of creativity, courage and collaboration, inspired by Peter H. Reynolds' children's book "The Dot." The day is celebrated annually on September 15, for the purpose of encouraging people of all ages to harness their creativity and make their mark in the world, much like the story's main character.

- Field work (pole vault, long jump, shot put).

- Ongoing Turf field construction;
- Ongoing lighting, flooring and classroom updates.
