Assessment Information

- Every term, students are assessed on knowledge of BOE approved sexual health education goals and objectives:
 - Anatomy, physiology
 - Abstinence
 - Communication about sex and limit setting
 - Healthy relationships
 - HIV/AIDS and other STIs knowledge and prevention
 - Pregnancy prevention and contraception
 - Violence and harassment
 - Access to reliable information
- Every two years, SHEAC reports assessment results.


- The assessments are scored, and results are color coded for ease.
- The performance bands below are for all district common assessments, including middle and high school reproductive health.

Middle School: Assessment Details

- Middle school students have one quarter (~9 weeks) of health class in 7th grade. (Some variations in K8/IB buildings - students may have this content at a different time or structure.)
- Reproductive health is one unit of instruction, approximately 2-3 weeks
- Students take a district common assessment at start and end of the unit to assess learning.
 - 30 questions
 - Multiple choice, true or false questions
 - Identical pre and post test


Middle School: Assessment Results



High School: Assessment Details

- High school students have one term (semester or trimester) of health class in 10th-12th grade.
- Reproductive health is one unit of instruction, approximately 3 weeks
- Students take a district common assessment at start and end of the unit to assess learning.
 - 45 questions
 - Multiple choice, true or false questions
 - Identical pre and post test

- COVID disruptions to data, attendance challenges continue.
- From the assessment results, it is clear students are showing growth in reproductive health knowledge.
- We look forward to comparing this data to 2026, and hope to see improved post test achievement.



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
