♦ Adults, 18 years and older, who are residents of Hanford and surrounding areas.

How to Enroll

Students wanting to enroll in High School Diploma, Adult Basic Education, English as a Second Language, and GED Preparation classes are required to attend a testing and orientation. Please check in with Student Services for our upcoming testing and orientation dates. If you need help getting a transcript, the Student Services Office can assist you.

Students wanting to enroll in career technical education or community enrichment classes must complete the following:

- Complete a registration form in the Student Services Office.
- Make payment by money order or cashier's check, payable to Hanford Adult School.
- CNA Must take a placement test and be interviewed prior to registering

Fees

Fees are charged for career technical education and community enrichment programs. Payment of these fees are required at the time of registration. Refer to class listing for more information. Payment can be made by money order or cashier's check, payable to Hanford Adult School. <u>CASH IS NOT ACCEPTED.</u>

Thank you for your cooperation. NO fees are charged for high school diploma, GED preparation, adult basic education and ESL programs.

Grade Level Determination

Grade levels at Hanford Adult School are based on the following credits:

0 - 33 credits - 9th grade 34 - 65 credits - 10th grade 66 - 98 credits - 11th grade 99 - 130 credits - 12th grade Students who do not provide a transcript will be considered freshmen (9th grade).

Discontinuance Of Classes

The administration reserves the right to close any class where the minimum participation drops below the level required for efficient and economical operation of the school.

Earning Credits & Attendance

Attendance is an important part of earning credits at Hanford Adult School. Students are expected to attend class regularly.

Credits are earned based upon the following requirements:

- 1. Completion of the course work with a "D" or better.
- 2. Comprehensive Tests.
- 3. 85% attendance of the scheduled class time.

To ensure that you receive all the units you earn:

- 1. Make sure that you sign the class register for each hour of class attendance.
- 2. Keep a record of your daily attendance, indicating the dates you attended and how many hours you were in class.

Classes missed due to late registration count as missed classes.



<u>Welding</u>

This course is designed to produce trained proficient welders. Students will receive training and related instruction in shielded Metal Arc Welding, Gas Tungsten Arc Welding, Gas Arc Welding, Flux Cored Arc Welding, and Oxy-Acetylene Gas Welding and cutting Resistance Spot Welding. This course includes theory and practical application as well as safety techniques and care of equipment.

NURSING ASSISTANT PROGRAM

REQUIREMENTS TO ENROLL:

- Must be 17 years of age or older
- Must pass a comprehensive assessment test
- A criminal history, felonies or misdemeanors must be cleared prior to entering the program. A list of offenses that cannot be cleared is available from the California Department of Public Health.

*Students with convictions need to be advised that the CDPH evaluates criminal convictions for any offense and either grants or denies criminal record clearance. Due to processing times, the student may complete the class, and pass the competency examination and still not obtain a background clear ance thereby not becoming certified as a nurse assistant.

<u>COURSE DESCRIPTION</u>:

State approved course combining 200 hours within classroom and hospital training under supervision of instructor. Graduates qualify for testing to be certified as a nursing assistant by the State of California. This course also meets out-of-state nursing certification requirements. Students must be able to sit, stand, push, pull and lift 50 pounds. Prior to clinical training, Live Scan fingerprinting must be submitted to the Department of Health Services. (Eligible for State Certification at Completion of Program)

<u>REFUND POLICY</u>:

If program is dropped prior to the first day of class 100% refund will be returned.

When you graduate from Hanford Adult School you will be proud of your accomplishments. *Grades and credits are earned!* When you apply for admission to Hanford Adult School, we will evaluate your previous educational experience to determine how many additional credits you need to graduate. Students need 130 credits in the subject areas listed. You must submit an <u>Application for</u> <u>Graduation</u> to the Student Services Office for approval prior to graduation.

Adult Basic Education

Adult basic education classes are offered to students with skills below the high school level. Students may also enroll in these classes for basic skills review in the event they have been absent from an educational setting for an extended period of time. This program can lead to preparation for the high school diploma program, the high school equivalency tests, college entrance, employability, or career advancement.

Basic Language Arts

Basic instruction will cover reading and writing skills including vocabulary development, word analysis, reading comprehension, and writing conventions. Students will learn basic grammar rules and apply them in writing assignments.

Basic Math

Basic math instruction will cover whole numbers, fractions, decimals, and percent skills and more advanced math skills, including measurement, formulas, equations, proportion and algebraic thinking.

English as a Second Language/ Inglés como Segundo Idioma

English as a Second Language (ESL) classes are designed for the limited English proficient student to learn to speak, read, and write the English language.

GENERAL INFORMATION

ENGLISH AS A SECOND LANGUAGE

Alcohol/Drugs and Narcotics

Drugs, alcohol, and narcotics are strictly prohibited. Any student who unlawfully possesses, uses, sells, or otherwise furnishes, or is under the influence of any controlled substance, alcoholic beverage, or intoxicant of any kind, on or about the school campus, is subject to immediate suspension/expulsion and all existing laws that apply.

Cell Phones

Students may carry cell phones and other electronic communication devices at school, but these devices are not to cause a disruption during instructional time.

Electronic Vandalism

Electronic vandalism is a felony. Students found to be involved in electronic vandalism may be cited by the police and removed from the Hanford Adult School premises. Electronic vandalism includes, but is not limited to computer viruses.

Smoking

State Law and School Board Policy prohibits smoking anywhere on the adult school campus, including all classrooms, offices, and vehicles parked on the school grounds. Students may smoke across the street on Campus Drive.

Student Parking

Students are not to park in the front lot. Student parking is located in the back of the school. All parking laws are enforced. Vehicles parked improperly may be ticketed and/or towed away at the driver's expense. The school accepts no responsibility for the safety of your vehicle or the contents in your vehicle. In order to provide a secure environment, loitering near vehicles parked on schools grounds is not allowed. Make sure to lock your vehicle.

Visitor & Student Guests

All visitors and student guests must report to the main office of the adult school for permission to remain on the adult school campus longer than the time necessary to drop off or pick up a student. If the presence of any visitor or guest is deemed to be disruptive to the educational environment, the visitor or guest privileges will be suspended and they will be expected to leave the campus.

Uniform Complaint Procedure

The Governing Board of Trustees recognizes that the district is responsible for ensuring that it complies with state and federal laws and regulations governing educational programs. The district shall follow uniform complaint procedures when addressing complaints alleging unlawful discrimination based on ethnic group identification, religion, age, gender, color or physical or mental disability in any program or activity that receives or benefits from state financial assistance. The district shall also follow uniform complaint procedures when addressing complaints alleging failure to comply with state or federal law in adult basic education, consolidated categorical aid programs, migrant education, vocational education, child care and development programs, child nutrition programs and special education programs. The Board encourages the early, informal resolution of complaints at the site level whenever possible. Upon receipt of a written complaint from an individual, public agency or organization, uniform complaint procedures shall be initiated. The Superintendent or designee shall distribute full information about these procedures. The Board recognizes that a neutral mediator can often suggest an early compromise that is agreeable to all parties in a dispute. In accordance with uniform complaint procedures, whenever all parties to a complaint agree to try resolving their problem through mediation, the Superintendent or designee shall initiate a mediation process before beginning a formal compliance investigation. The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that mediation results are consistent with state and federal laws and regulations. The Board acknowledges and respects student and employee rights to privacy. Discrimination complaints shall be investigated in a manner that protects the confidentiality of the parties and the facts. This includes keeping the identity of the complainant confidential except to the extent necessary to carry out the investigation or proceedings, as determined by the Superintendent or designee on a case-by-case basis. The Board prohibits retaliation in any form for the filing of a complaint, the reporting of instances of discrimination or participation in complaint procedures. Such participation shall not in any way affect the status, grades or work assignments of the complainant.

DISTANCE LEARNING

The Hanford Adult School Distance Learning Programs is an optional alternative instructional strategy for adult students who are unable to enroll in selected classes due to schedule conflicts, employment, health problems or family obligations. Distance Learning allows students to study at home using videos and work packets. Students are required to meet with the teacher once weekly by **appointment only!**

Courses Available Include: English as a Second Language, Improving Parenting Skills, GED Preparation, and Citizenship preparation.

Requirements:

- Student must meet with the instructor once a week for about 30 minutes to discuss and correct homework.
- Student must be enrolled in Hanford Adult School.
- Student must have a score of 186 or higher on the CASAS exam.



HIGH SCHOOL DIPLOMA

Courses Available Include: Pre-Algebra, Algebra, English 1-4, Physical Science, Biology, US History, World History, Economics, Government, and various other courses to meet all the requirements for attaining a high school diploma. * Most courses are also available online.

Independent study is a voluntary program for students who meet the following criteria.

- Students must have a minimum test score of 226 for math and 236 for English on the placement test.
- Students must thoroughly complete an Independent Study Application and submit to the Student Services Office for processing.
- Complete Orientation Testing Class.
- Initial placement and termination of the student in the Independent Study Program shall be at the sole discretion of the designated teacher and the Adult School Administration.
- Students are required to complete a minimum of 10 hours per week of homework and meet with the teacher each week.
- Students are not allowed to miss 2 scheduled appointments unless it is a family emergency and a phone call has been made to the teacher.

GED TESTING

SCIENCE

Physical Science

This is a course that studies the physical and chemical interactions of nature. The study starts with atomic theory and explores chemical and physical changes. Use of several modules of the Chemical Education for Public Understanding Program will encourage the student to see the direct applicability of physical science to daily living.

ENGLISH/ LANGUAGE ARTS

<u>English 1</u>

English I, is a one-quarter course, which will teach students to write varied sentences and welldeveloped paragraphs using the writing process that includes stages called prewriting, drafting, and editing. An introduction to literature will be included from which students will develop comprehension and reading skills. Real life and work place topics are used to develop basic listening, speaking and study skills which will be included in this course.

<u>English 2</u>

English 2 is a course which emphasizes the mastery of well-developed paragraphs and the development of the multiple paragraph composition. An introduction to literary analysis as well as speaking, listening, and study skills will be included.

English 4 is a course which asks students to closely analyze world literature and consider how we humans define and interact with the unknown, the monstrous, and the heroic. Prerequisites: Successful completion of English 3 and CASAS test score of 236 and above.
