NEW FACULTY

The Great Neck Public Schools is pleased to welcome more than 40 new teachers this year. In late August, the district hosted a twoday New Faculty Orientation program to provide new teachers with important information and tools for a successful start to their first year in the district.

New teachers and pupil personnel staff were greeted by Board of Education trustees, district administrators, building principals,

presidents from the Great Neck Teachers Association (GNTA) and the Association of Supervisors and Administrators (SAGES), who all expressed their support for our newest faculty. KERRI O'ROURKE Assistant Director for Special Education

Kerri O'Rourke joined the Great Neck Public Schools this summer as an assistant director of special education, following the retirement of Ellice Geller. Ms. O'Rourke comes to Great Neck from the North Babylon School District, where she was an assistant director of special education.

Her 16-year career in education also includes 10 years as an elementary and high school social worker, and three years as a CPSE and elementary CSE chairperson. In addition to her work in public schools, Ms. O'Rourke has also served as a clinical social worker in a hospital setting.



ADAM HOPKINS Interim Principal, South High School

In July, the Board of Education appointed Assistant Principal Adam Hopkins to serve as interim principal for the 2024–25 school year. Mr. Hopkins is well-known to the South High community, as this is his fifth year as a member of the school's leadership team. Mr. Hopkins was first

appointed as a South High assistant principal in 2020, and his resume includes 10 years as a building administrator and eight years as a school counselor. Before becoming a public-school educator, Mr. Hopkins enjoyed a successful seven-year career as a lacrosse coach in college athletics.



BRENDAN NELSON Principal, North Middle School

Brendan Nelson was named principal of North Middle School following the retirement of Dr. Jerry Cozine. Mr. Nelson has six years of experience as a middle school assistant principal, most recently serving as North Middle's assistant principal for the 2023–24 school year. His career in education spans 22 years as a high school social studies teacher,

a middle school counselor and an administrator. Mr. Nelson first established a connection with the North Middle community when he served as a school counselor at North Middle from 2015–18.



MICHAEL DIPASQUALE Assistant Principal, South High School

Michael DiPasquale has spent his entire 24–year education career in the Great Neck Public Schools, most recently serving as the South High School science department chair since 2018. Prior to working at South High, Mr. DiPasquale taught science at North Middle School for

Lakeville Elementary Named a 2024 National Blue Ribbon School

Lakeville Elementary School is one of only two schools on Long Island and 356 schools in the country to be recognized by the U.S. Department of Education as a 2024 National Blue Ribbon School. This designation is one of the nation's highest honors awarded to schools in recognition of exemplary academic performance.

This is the second time Lakeville Elementary has achieved National Blue Ribbon School status since the program's inception in 1982. Lakeville was previously recognized in 2009.

"Being named a National Blue Ribbon School is an honor, and one that affirms the hard work of Lakeville's students, teachers and families," says Lakeville Principal Emily Zucal, who attributes the school's trajectory of high performance to students' investment in their own learning, talented teachers and staff who are committed to



meeting the needs of each and every learner, and cooperative and supportive families who are eager to partner with educators to help students meet with success. "Lakeville is also fortunate to benefit from the expertise of district-level personnel and a supportive Board of Education who contribute to the success of our school community," she said.

District officials will represent Lakeville Elementary School at a two-day awards ceremony in Washington, D.C., in November to celebrate this prestigious recognition. The school is also in the process of planning a celebration of its own so the school community can participate.

E.M. Baker Elementary School **Designated an Apple Distinguished School**



Universal Pre-Kindergarten (UPK) Online Registration Opens Nov. 12, 2024

The online registration window for the district's Universal Pre-Kindergarten (UPK) program opens on Nov. 12, 2024. Any child who legally resides in the school district and will be 4 years old on or before Dec. 1, 2025, is eligible for admission to the 2025–26 UPK half-day program. Only applications submitted online by Nov. 30 will be considered if a lottery is needed for placement in an a.m. or p.m. class. UPK is offered to district residents at no cost; a supplemental half-day, tuition-based enrichment program called Fun for Fours is also available with limited enrollment.

Kindergarten Online Registration Opens Jan. 2, 2025

Online kindergarten registration for the 2025–26 school year will open on Jan. 2, 2025. Any child who legally resides in the school district and will be 5 years old on or before Dec. 1, 2025, is eligible to register. All children who will attend kindergarten at a public or private school must register with the school district. Note: Students who currently attend UPK at the John F. Kennedy School or Parkville School do not need to reregister; parents of these students only need to complete a new kindergarten application.
