From the Administrator's Desk

I hope this message reaches you while you, your family, and loved ones are enjoying what has been a very pleasant August, September, and October. The outstanding weather has provided extended time outside for students and staff as we take advantage of the dwindling daylight hours. In the district, we are preparing for winter while also looking forward to what the remainder of the year will bring.

As many of you are aware, the school district is considering a referendum in the spring of 2025. This would be a referendum to maintain buildings - not to fund salaries, benefits, or other related items. It would be to borrow money above the limit that is allowed through the local levy limit established by the state. To gather information from the community regarding a possible referendum in the spring, a survey will be sent to each district address that outlines the three parts being considered as possible referendum questions. I will attempt to explain what each part is but encourage you to read and complete the survey when you receive it in the mail this month.

The first question involves maintaining our current buildings and grounds. In 1998, 26 years ago, the Tim and Vicki Anderson gymnasium, library, and elementary classroom wings were constructed through a building referendum supported by the community residents. I'm assuming that the passage of that referendum was accomplished with the thought that this should last 20-25 years which is the expected life span of roofs, boilers, asphalt surfaces, and most things mechanical. We have now reached the point where some of these items are failing and need to be replaced to last the next 20-25 years. The funding for building or maintenance projects is not included in equalization aid or other grants available through federal or state programs. This is evidenced by the fact that almost half of the school districts in

the state in the year 2024 have gone to referendum to support to address receive local building, maintenance, or operational needs. Specifically in our situation, we have roofs that are between 26-31 years old that are flat rubber membranes that are beginning to fail. We have patched some holes and seams that have opened up but the time to replace or risk catastrophic failure is here. Our track asphalt surface was paved in 1998. It received a rubberized surface that year and was resurfaced with a rubberized surface again in 2013. The life expectancy of the rubber surface is 8-10 years. We got 11 out of the current surface which is great but not the problem. The problem lies in the asphalt surface it adheres to. The asphalt is cracking and opening up large fissures making it unsafe to run on. The inside lanes have no rubber surface left. The drain tiles that once allowed water to be funneled to the east ditch are no longer functioning. As a result, the school district will no longer be able to host any competitions on the track until it is replaced. Track companies will no longer fill the cracks or guarantee any work done until the asphalt surface is removed and replaced. The science rooms in the secondary building are original rooms when the school was erected in 1965. The cabinets, plumbing, electricity, gas, and asbestos flooring need to be removed, replaced, and upgraded to meet the needs of our current population of students. Boilers, electrical systems, air handlers, and other mechanical equipment, some installed with the original buildings in 1965, are still operational but beginning to fail. Finding replacement parts for equipment 25-60 years old is nearly impossible. Within the elementary school, temporary walls were put up in 1998 as the classroom wings were added to the building. Those temporary walls which contain some classrooms, offices, bathrooms, and storage areas limit the capabilities of what has to be accomplished with our students at the elementary school. The walls themselves are 2" thick and contain no electrical outlets, telephone, or other communication cables necessary for meeting the needs of 20th-century learners. Our elementary school population continues to grow which is a positive thing. Unfortunately, the temporary walls installed in 1998 have taken on the image of being permanent which doesn't meet the changing needs of education and our enrollment. The cost to complete these projects is 4.3 million dollars. The impact upon property owners within the district would be an increase of \$7 in taxes per year for every \$100,000 of property owned for the next 20 years.

The second questions involve adding new areas to the district to address the growing needs of the community, students, and education. At this time, we do not have a dedicated space for music, drama, or any community groups to perform in. We have a stage in the gym at the high school built in 1965 but it is outdated, small, and currently doubles as storage for wrestling mats and equipment for our junior high school wrestling program. Coupled with the lack of a performance area for music, drama, 4H, FFA, or other community events, the cafeteria continues to be an area of congestion and overcrowding. Through expansion and creation of an auditorium and expanded cafeteria, both of these concerns could be addressed. The cost of this expansion paired with the 4.3 million dollar maintenance request mentioned above would cost \$82 per year for every \$100,000 of property value.

Another option to address the overcrowding and space needs would be to add a community fitness center and wrestling/archery space to the north end of the Tim and Vicki Anderson gymnasium. We currently have nearly 30 wrestlers out for wrestling. The wrestling room built in 1998 was designed to accommodate 18 wrestlers at the most. We cannot safely put 30 wrestlers in a space designed for 18. As a result, this year we will be moving our high school wrestling practices to a gym which displaces a basketball team to a different time. This in turn displaces youth basketball teams which begin as early as 3rd grade to practicing less or later into the evenings. This is not advantageous for students and families at any level. Our archery program continues to grow with over 70 students participating last year and more expected this year. They also have to use the gym to accommodate the distance and space requirements to compete. This creates more conflict in the scheduling of precious gym time. Evidence of this is the fact that our three gyms which sat empty except for a couple of Saturdays during the winter months as little as a couple of years ago, are now filled with practices and events from Friday evenings through Sunday evenings almost every weekend beginning in December through March. A dedicated wrestling/ archery space would allow these activities to be

scheduled out of the gyms where hoops are needed for basketball and provide for those requesting the gym space to be accommodated earlier rather than extending past 8:00 p.m. on school nights. A community fitness center would be available for the community to use and would contain weight machines, exercise bikes, treadmills, and other equipment that would be available through keyless access from the outside for those possessing a fob. The cost of this addition with the 4.3 million dollar maintenance proposal mentioned previously would be \$124 per year for each \$100,000 of property value.

The survey will provide more information and detail regarding each of these options. The survey is being conducted by an independent company who will collect and compile the results to inform the Board of Education what options mentioned would be supported. The results of the survey will be shared with the Board of Education at the December meeting. Based on the results of the survey, any referendum questions moving forward will have to be written and approved by the Board in January. If the Board of Education determines that they wish to pursue any of the three options or combinations mentioned above in an April referendum, more specific details, listening sessions, construction design, and community feedback opportunities will be frequent beginning at the end of January and concluding before a vote on the first Tuesday of April.

I am proud of our small community and our ability to see the quality of what our schools can offer. We have an increasing enrollment when most of our neighbors have a declining number of students. Our open enrollment numbers continue to rival those of our big neighbors that surround us. I'd like to think this is because of our location, facilities, small class sizes, variety of student organizations and opportunities that extend beyond the school day, individualized learning, and a willingness to work together with our students, staff, and community to achieve more.


National Honor Society


In collaboration with Mid-State and Northcentral Technical Colleges, the Heavy Metal Tour® is designed to introduce students to the many exciting possibilities within the manufacturing industry. For our rural students, it was an incredible opportunity to step outside the classroom and gain hands-on experience that could shape their future career paths.

Our students had the special privilege of exploring three local facilities: Marshfield Utilities, Loos Machine and Automation, and Innovative Machine. A huge thanks to these companies for welcoming our students and giving them firsthand access to the world of manufacturing. During the tour, students witnessed cutting-edge technology, learned about engineering, and saw how products are made—from the design phase to the production line.

One of the standout features of this year's tour was the hands-on approach. Students didn't just observe the process; they were able to engage with the machinery and get a feel for what working in manufacturing is really like. This interactive format made the experience even more memorable and exciting.

Each student was provided with safety glasses and guided through the manufacturing sites by industry professionals who shared their knowledge and answered questions. Every student also received a Tshirt emblazoned with logos from the participating companies, giving them a tangible reminder of the day. The Heavy Metal Tour® serves as an eye-opener for many students, helping them realize that there are numerous career options available after high school, especially in industries like manufacturing that play a critical role in our local economy. For students who might not be interested in traditional college routes, this tour highlighted pathways that are both fulfilling and vital to our community's future.

College Credits in High School

High School students can earn college credits while still in high school in a variety of ways. Auburndale High School offers Dual Credit courses in Agriculture, Business, English, Family & Consumer Sciences, Health, & Tech Ed. **Dual Credit** courses are taught by our Auburndale High School staff utilizing Mid-State Technical College standards. Students in those courses can opt to receive both HS credits and MSTC College Credits at the same time with no cost to the student. In the 2022-2023 school year, Auburndale students took a total of 685 college credits saving them a total of \$101,464! Similar to Dual Credit, Auburndale offers **CAPP** Physics in coordination with UW-Oshkosh. Students taking CAPP Physics can earn 5 college credits for free without stepping out of their Auburndale classroom.

AP Courses are another option for students to earn college credits. AP Courses are offered with Auburndale teachers as well as through Distance Learning. At the completion of the AP Course students can opt to take an AP Exam and earn 3+ credits based on their scores.

We continue to offer multiple options through our **Early College Credit Program** and **Start College Now Program**. Students with a 3.0 GPA or higher can request to take college courses at any UW, Private, or Technical College in the state. Course tuition is covered by the Auburndale School District as long as the course is approved by the School Board and successfully completed by the student. These college courses can be taken through Distance Learning, online, or on the college campus. Applications for these programs are located in the Counseling Office and are due by September 10th for Spring Semester courses and February 10th for Fall Semester courses.

Students interested in any of these amazing opportunities should schedule a meeting with Ms. Binder, the Middle/High School Counselor.
