COLLEGE APPLICATIONS

Where and How to apply

- Direct with School:
 - Students can apply directly to Colleges and Universities through that Schools website.

Common App:

 - This platform has expanded over the years and is the most used site for multiple applications, but not all schools participate, so make sure you check.
 - Common App: your school counselor will upload transcript and School Profile.
 - Make sure you get your counselor's email correct!
 - Know if your school requires a counselor letter of recommendation!
- Sending your "Official" transcript at the end of the year:
 - > Bring in an envelop to Ms. Bitts with the desired school's admissions address and a stamp on it.
 - Counselors will upload a final transcript to Common App as well.

Guaranteed Admissions Program

What is WAGAP: Students that meet criteria are guaranteed admission to one of the following College/Universities, by submitting an application. Please note, this does not mean they are guaranteed enrollment in a specific degree program. <u>Students doing WAGAP still need to complete the application process.</u>

Participating Institutions: Central Washington University, Eastern Washington University, Washington State University, University of Washington (Tacoma branch only), Western Washington University, The Evergreen State College.

What is needed to qualify for guaranteed admissions? To be eligible for guaranteed admission students must meet or be on track by fall 2025 admissions to meet two requirements:

- Earn a 3.0 cumulative GPA AND
- Complete ALL Washington's College Academic Distribution Requirements (CADRs)

RECOMMENDATION LETTERS

- When and Who to ask for Letters of Recommendation?
 - * When? The earlier the better, most people need a 2-week window to get the letter done.
 - When a college application or scholarship requests it.
 - * Who? Students should ask someone, that knows them well.
 - A teacher you have had more than once, or one you have a strong relationship with.
 - A coach that has seen the student grow in that sport/ as a musician/ as an actor/artist/dancer.
 - A mentor that has been helpful in the students personal and/or academic life.
 - Other ideas are an employer/manager, youth group leader, or a supervisor in places a student has volunteered.
 - ✓ Local Scholarship providers have been informed that school teachers/school counselors will not be providing letters of recommendation.

SCHOLARSHIPS

Different Types

- Academic: mostly given out through the College/University specifically.
- Athletic: given out only by specific Colleges/Universities.
- Community Service/Leadership: Local and National Scholarships that will require essays or documentation of skills.

FINANCIAL AID & CONSIDERATIONS

- Types or Financial Aid
 - > **Scholarships** Money that is not paid back
 - Grants- Typically Needs Based
 - Loans
 - Parent Plus Loans
 - Federal Loans
 - Private Loans

Compare apples to apples. Once you have offers in hand, scour them carefully. Though the bottom lines may be equivalent, one package may be more heavily tilted toward loans than another; colleges often are more generous in giving outright grants to students they really want.

- Take the cost of each school and subtract the grants and scholarships. What's left is the amount you'll pay out of pocket, which may or may not include loans.
- ✓ It's also important to consider how your burden will change in subsequent years. Some scholarships and grants will automatically renew, while others may be one-time awards or require that the student maintain a certain GPA. If those details are not in the offer letter, be sure to ask the financial aid office to clarify.

FAFSA (FREE APPLICATION FOR FEDERAL STUDENT AID)

6 things to have ready before you start filling out your FAFSA forms:

- 1. Set up a FSA ID for **both student and parent separately**, prior to starting your application.
- 2. Social Security Numbers on hand for both student and parent.
- 3. Driver's License Number for both student and parent.
- 4. 2023 Tax Records.
- 5. Records of your untaxed income.
- 6. Records of your assets (money).

FAFSA Deadlines: Class of 2025

- Federal Deadline: The FAFSA form must be submitted by 11:59 p.m. Central time (CT) on June 30, 2025.
- State Deadline: Washington College Grant https://wsac.wa.gov/wcg As soon as possible.
- College Deadline: Check the website of the college(s) you are interested in attending. You may also want to ask your college about its definition of an application deadline whether it is the date the college receives your FAFSA, or the date your FAFSA is processed.

WASFA (Washington Application for State Financial Aid)

The WASFA is only for those that do not qualify for the FASFA!

There are limited circumstances, beyond the applicant's immigration status, in which a person may choose to complete a WASFA instead of a FAFSA, including:

- ☐ Your parents are undocumented, or your family members do not wish to file a FAFSA.
- ☐ You or your parent(s) do not and will not file federal income taxes.
- You have federal loans that are in default.
- ☐ You owe a repayment on federal grants.
